HISTORY OF 6TH RANGER INFANTRY BATTALION DECLASSIFIED (000 Dir. 5200.9, Sept. 27, 1958 NWD by Carlo 200.9

The six rifle companies, headquarters and headquarters company, and the medical detachment of the 6th Ranger infantry Battalion were formed were formed out of the 98th Field Artillery Battalion on August 20th, 1944, in preparation for the long-awaited Ranger Infantry table of organization. This quasi-official organization was in effect and intense Ranger training in progress when the Battalien Executive was called to Sixth Army Headquarters in Hollandia September 21st.


On the 27th the Battalion Executive returned, bringing with him the General Order officially designating the unit as the 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion and information that he had been in conference relative to a combat mission in which the battalien would soon take part. There were myriad details to be worked out in connection with this mission, and at once the Staff started laboring.

The company commanders were called in and apprized of the situation and briefed on what had to be done in the way of readying equipment. Ammuni tion and rations had to be drawn, weapons checked, and the battalion brought to T/E strength in weapons and all major items. New clothing was drawn and impregnated against typhus. Every detail, no matter how small, relating to the operation had to be painstakingly checked. The battalion staff figured units of fire, loading and unloading plans, and prepared maps and operational sketches for distribution to the companies.

We had assigned to us at this time a group of photographers who were making a picture history of the battalion and who later accompanied the battalion on its mission. With a minimum of interference the photo group caught the sequence of events in the preparations underway. What was commonplace to the battalion impressed them as being unusual. The men were calm but not depressed and there was no evidence of hysteria. These Rangers had waited nearly two years for this. Most of them were what they themselves called "Old Soldiers," and they took calmly the prospect of the mission with grinning faces giving evidence of a willingness to work twenty-four hours a day until we were on the way.

By October 2d the company commanders had received the Battalion Field Order and had submitted for approval their Company Field Orders. Minor changes were made but for all practical purposes the orders were satisfactory and everything in order. On the 3d all officers were called to the "War Room" and the final briefing got underway.

Our mission was to land on Dinagat and Homonhon Islands of the Philippine Group and secure the entrance to Leyte Gulf. Intelligence led to the belief by higher headquarters that these two islands were fortified with coastal artillery, anti-airdraft installations and radar posts since they were in strategic positions astride the gulf. We were



to clear these positions and hold the islands until the main landing had been effected. An Day for the main operation was October 20th, 1944, and the battalion was scheduled to land on A -3. It wasn't necessary to impress anyone with the evident truth that we were landing in the Philippines, 50 miles from the main Japanese bases on Leyte in the teeth of a large enemy garrison, and that there would be no ground support until the main invasion started. It was what we wanted and what we were made for. We were to be the first combat troops to keep General MacArthur's pledge and Come Back.

The plan for carrying out the mission was gone over in detail. Company B, reinforced by one platoon from Headquarters Company, would land on the southern side of Homonhon Island, cache extra supplies near the beach, and then proceed to Colasie Foint on the eastern tip of the island to destroy any enemy installations guarding the entrance to Leyte Gulf. The remainder of the battalion would land on the northwestern shore of Dinagat Island in the order of Companies A, D, C, Erand F. Companies A and D were to seize and hold a beach-head while Companies C, E, and F, under the command of the Battalion Executive, were to reform and proceed north along the coast to Desolation Point, destroying any enemy installations encountered. Extra supplies were to be unloaded inside the beach-head held by A and D Companies. After Desolation Point was cleared, C, E, and F Companies were to return to the beach-head where A and D Companies would be relieved and sent to reconnoiter the area south as far as the town of Lorette. It was evident to all that the success or failure of our mission would have a definite bearing on the conduct of the entire Philippine campaign. Everyone accepted this fact with the determination to justify the faith that had been placed in the battalion.

By October 7th all details of logistics had been worked out, equipment and supplies drawn, and the job of loading the ships was well under way. The battalion was assigned five APD's for movement to the target area. They were to be loaded in the order of Headquarters and A Companies aboard the SCHLEY, B Company aboard the HERBERT, C Company the KILTY, D Company the CROSEY, and E and F on the WARD. By 1700 on the 8th all supplies had been loaded and last minute checks of personal equipment being made.

At 0800 on October 9th the battalion, less the Second Echelon of 63 enlisted men under the command of Warrant Officer Clins, formed in front of Headquarters and stood retreat before moving to the point of embarkation. The troops were leaded aboard the APD's by Ducks, and at 1300 all were on board, personal gear stowed in the troop compartments. All came on deck for a final look at Finschhafen.

Our convoy of five APD's sailed at 1700 October 9th, and arrived at Hollandia at 1700 the 11th. The trip was uneventful, but served to accustom the men to life aboard an APD and give them an opportunity to get their sea legs before the longer voyage to the target area was begun.

While at Hollandia orders were received that in addition to landing on Dinaget and Homenhon Islands one company would also land on the island of Suluan (approximately 12 miles east of Homenhon Island. The landing was to be simultaneous with landings on Homenhon and Dinaget, with the mission

of capturing enemy documents and destroying and enemy radar and observation post that was known to be on the island. This necessitated the preparation of a new battalion Field Order and the employment of Company B of the 21st Infantry Regiment that had originally been attached to the battalion for use as a floating reserve. Company D of the Rangers was selected to make the landing landing on Suluan and Company B of the 21st was to used to replace D in the beach-head perimeter on Dinagat. The remainder of the operation was to be as originally planned.

On the 12th the battalion was joined by the 10th Portable Hospital and the 10th Signal Platoon. These organizations were attached to the battalion for the mission and were to land with the main force on Dinagat.

Before leaving "ollandia the Commanding Officer and company commanders of the Rangers and all ship Captains were assembled aboard the destroyer HUGHES for a final conference and briefing by Admiral Struble who was to command the Naval Task Force. Plans for Naval gun fire and air support were explained, the disposition and mission of each ship given, and instructions issued as to the action to be taken in the event the convoy was dispersed by typhoons or enemy action.

At 1500 on October 12th the convoy moved out of the harbor and proceeded in a northwesterly direction. We all realized that we had seen New Guinea for the last time and although there were few regrets there were many memories.

On the lith the convoy was met by two Naval Tankers and Borty mine-sweepers. The APD's and the escorting destroyers were refueled at sea. Joined by the minesweepers, we again headed for our objective. Out of Hollandia we had heavy storms and constantly overcast skies. This was accepted as unusually good luck as it prevented any enemy air action against us. The night of the 15th the wind reached gale propertione and everything was secured aboard ships in the event of a typhoon. The storm continued through the night and the next day. It was feared that the storm would prevent us from landing on schedule, but by the morning of the 17th it had moderated enough for the landing to be effected.

At dawn on the 17th the convoy, led by three minesweepers, entered Leyte Gulf and moved down the west side of Dinagat to the vicinity of Kanamong Point. The weather had cleared by the sea was still rough. It was obvious that at best we would have a "wet landing." By 0900 the prearranged Naval fire had begun and the assault waves were in the landing craft ready for the run to the beach. The beach at first appeared to be well suited for an amphibious landing, but as the boats neared shore it became necessary for them to reduce speed and virtually feel their way through narrow channels in the coral reefs that lay just under the surface of the water. Approximately one hundred yards off shore the boats grounded on the reefs and it was necessary for the men to wade in the remaining distance. Some stepped into deep holes in the coral and had to swim part way, while others were knocked off their feet by the heavy surf.

Typical of the general attitude of the men was the action of one soldier who, having lost his rifle when he fell, was heard to say, "To hell with it!" and was seen moving into the jungle armed only with a trench knife and hand grenades.

By 1230 all companies were ashore, the Battalion CP established, and C, E, and F Companies had moved out for Desolation Point. As there had been no opposition, a part of the troops were put to unloading extra rations and ammunition while the remainder continued digging in on the perimeter.

At 1300 word was received from the Battalion Executive that an enemy force of unknown strength had moved inland from positions on the coast approximately two miles north of the Battalion CP. Abandoned stores of food and ammunition and the general condition of the enemy camp gave evidence that it had been left in great haste. Documents abandoned by the Japanese revealed that the unit was officially known as the Dinagat Island Garrison and had had the mission of reporting air and sea activity and securing the island against guerilla activity. Efforts to make contact with the enemy force had failed, and the three companies again moved towards Desolation Point.

During the afternoon of the 17th another storm came up and the unloading of supplies had to be discontinued until the following day. The APD's
and the escorting destroyers moved out to sea until morning while the troops
sattled down for their first night in the Philippines. In spite of the fact
that we were surrounded by enemy-held islands, that we had no protection
of our own against enemy planes, and that we were faced by a force of unknown size on the island itself, there was no evidence of apprehension or
undue concern among the men. Each man performed his duties with the
thoroughness that had been part of his training and an air of unconcern
that the battalion officers had not thought possible.

On the afternoon of the 18th (A-2), C, E, and F Companies returned from Desclation Point. In addition to the enemy bivouse previously mentioned they had knowled pillboxes and observation posts on the northern tip of the island, but all had been abandoned. On the return march a thorough search of the bivouse was made. Among the personal effects of a Japanese officer an American flag was found. It had been carefully folded and placed in the bottom of a footlocker, and apparently was being kept for a souvenir. This was the first American flag recaptured in the Philippines and later it was presented to the Commanding General of the Sixth Army by members of the battalion.

On the same day Company D returned from Suluan and Company B of the 21st Infantry re-embarked on the ARIADNE. Plans were made for Companies D and A to move approximately six miles south to Lorette on the following day. They were to travel aboard the CROSEY and return the same day if the town was clear of enemy troops.

All troops were now at the beachmhead perimeter with the exception of one plateon from C Company that had been left at Desolation Point to guard Naval personnel operating a navigation light. The personnel and their

equipment had been landed on the 17th and had moved to Desolation Point behind the troops that had reconncitered that area. During the night of the 18th the Japs attempted to infiltrate the perimeter of the defense platoon but were driven off leaving one dead.


At approximately 1800 on the 18th thirty six members of the Filipine Guerillas, led by Captain Hemingway, an American who had been in the US Army Air Force at the time of the surrender of Batasn, arrived at our perimeter. This was his first contact with Americans in more than two years. The information that he gave us was that the enemy garrison that had been bivouaced north of Kanamong Pointwas the only Japanese force on the island at that time. However, in the past the Japs had moved troops to and from Dinagat in small oraft and could easily reinforce the garrison.

On the morning of the 19th A and D Companies moved to Lorette as scheduled. There were several air alerts during the time that they were aboard the AFD CROSBY and Jap planes were identified over the area, but no attack was made. The troops were met by friendly natives when they landed at the town. Information received there was that the enemy garrison that had been in the town had been evacuated approximately two months prior to our arrival. The troops spent two hours in Lorette before returning to the beach-head.

October 20th was the first day since we had landed that we were free of air raids. This was A Day for the invasion of Leyte and the absence of enemy planes over Dinagat, at least for the present, was not only quite understandable but also a welcome relief. Prior to A Day the sight of Jap planes had been very common and the entire command had become experts at diving into for-holes when a plane was heard. On the 22d Japanese planes were again over us and sporadic raids continued until the time we left the island.

On October 25th a plateon from Company C that had been sent to Loretto to secure that aread against the landing of Jap reinforcements, reported that Imperial Navy survivors were coming ashere on the beaches approximately five miles south of the town. Patrols were immediately sent out from the main perimeter to reinforce the plateon at Loretto and to make contact with any Japanese that tame takenes. By neon of the 27th all of the survivors had been accounted for. Some had carried small arms ashere with them and offered resistance, while others attempted to escape into the survivors had been accounted for the server able to take ten of them as prisoners of war to be sent to Sixth Army Headqueters for interrogation. The prisoners of war to be sent to Sixth Army Headqueters for interrogation. The prisoners, guarded by Technician Third Roth and Technician Fifth Starkovich, were put about an loff for transportation to Leyte on the 26th. During the trip the beat was bombed and strafed by two Jap planes. In this action the ship's erow suffered eleven easualties, Starkovich received a leg wound, and one of the prisoners was killed. As a result of the Naval casualties there were insufficient men to man all the ship's gums. Roth voluntarily manned one of the caliber fifty mashine gums for the remainder of the trip, and for this action was later awarded the Brance Star Medal.

From October 21st to the 26th sembst patrols had covered the entire northern and of Dinagat in an effect to lesste the Japanese garrison that had fied to the hills upon our arrival. Evidence that the Jap were still



in the area was found on many occasions, but all efforts to make contact with them failed. On the 27th word was received from the natives at Loretto that the enemy force had been seen in the area east of the town. Three companies were immediately sent to Loretto and from there they were able to operate as patrols covering the area to the east and south. They were to be supplied with rations by native boats that would operate between the town and our beach-head.

Factorise patrolling from the 27th through the 29th had still failed tolocate the Japs. The weather was bad and this coupled with the fact that the
patrolling was being conducted over terrain that varied from deep swamps to
steep mountainous areas covered with heavy jungle had a marked effect on the
physical condition of the men. Fractically all had skin infections as a result of constantly wet clothing. Some had completely worn out their shoes,
while all suffered from bad blisters and fungus infections on their feet. In
spite of this the men's morale was high and all were anxious to keep on until
they could make contact with the Japs. It was during one of these patrols
that Technician Fourth Gilbert B. Smith, of Headquarters Company, at risk of
his life, saved from drowning a fully armed and equipped fellow soldier whe
had sunk out of sight in a fast-flowing river that the patrol was fording; and
for this deed Smith was later awarded the Soldier's Medal.

On the afternoon of the 29th a fifteen man patrol, including Lieutenant Colonel Mucci, moved out from Loretto to investigate a report that the enemy force was in the vicinity of Siningog, a small village about 12 miles south of Loretto. The members of this patrol had had little or no rest for the previous two days, yet all had voluntarily gone out again. On the morning of the 30th the patrol was in the vicinity of Siningog, but as no indications of the enemy had been found, they were moving back towards Loretto. During rest period at the foot of a steep hill the patrol, without any warming. was caught by Jap mortar and machine gun fire. The enemy was located on the hill above the patrol and thus had the advantage of being on commanding ground with superior firepower. Netwithstanding the fact that the heaviest weapon carried by the patrol was a Browning automatic rifle, the men immediately formed a skirmish line and started to attack up the hill. One Jap machine gun and two knee mortars were put out of action and several riflemen killed before the Japs broke and attempted to escape from the area. Mineteen Japs, including their Commanding Officer, were k lled in this action with no cas ualties to our patrel. Immediate aggressive action and superior marksmanship had made it possible to overcome a force greater in both numbers and firepow During the action let Lieutenant Clifford K. Smith, without regard for his personal safety had secured the BAR and moved into a position from which he could bring fire on the drew of the Jap machine gun. Much of the success in the engagement was accredited to this act for which Lieutenant Smith was later swarded the Silver Star Medal.


On October 31st the battalion was re-supplied with ten-in-one type rations and a gratuitous issue of tobacco and endy. This made a welcome treat, having eaten "O" rations for the past ten days. Medical supplies were dropped to us by parachute on Nevember 12th. We had not received medical supplies during the entire time we had been on the island and many of the items that were sent were badly needed. All of the boxes dropped

landed within a radius of two hundred yards of the battalion command post, making a one hundred per cent recovery possible.

During the period from October 31st until we left on November 11th, patrols were sent out to guard against any attempt by the enemy to re-occupy the island. On November 11th the battalion was relieved and moved to Leyte aboard one LSM and one LCI. The trip took approximately le hours and was uneventful until we arrived off Leyte on the morning of the 15th. Japanese planes were after the shipping in the harbor, but no bombs fell in the immediate vicinity of our boats; however, were glad of it when we able to unload and get back on solid ground.

From the 15th of November until the last days of that month the battalian comped in the vicinity of Tanuan, Leyte, and beside Sixth Arry Headquarters. The battalian, and Sixth Army, moved close to Tolosa when it was decided to convert the first site into an airfield. Patrols were operating constantly and other duties of the battalian were the guarding of Sixth Army Headquarters and later the Navy's "SeaBees." Early in December a force of Japanese parashutists seized an air strip a few miles away. This situation kept the battalian fully alerted for several days making it necessary for the rifle companies to occupy certain defensive positions protecting Sixth Army units in the event further attacks by larger bodies of enemy paratrops. When the strip was re-captured the battalian returned to its guard and patrolaties and the usual activities connected with camping in a swampy, tropical location. All through Recember the staff was occupied with the job of preparing the battalian for the next mission, and by Christmas Day every man of the organization knew there were not many days to pass before the 6th Rangers closed again with the soldiers of Japane.

The emplacement of artillery on these islands to dominate the approaches to LEYTE GULF is a strong probability.
  - b. Forces of the Southwest Pacific, covered and supported by the Third Fleet, will continue the offensive to reoccupy the PHILIPPINES by seizing and occupying objectives in the LEYTE and western SAMAR area, and will establish therein, naval, air, and logistic facili-




(2) Co B. 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion - vicinity Black Beach 2.

#### OPERATIONAL REPORT

LOCATION OF TROOPS: 72.2 - 04.9

WEATHER AND VISIBILITY: Strong wind accompanied by heavy rain. Visibility poor.

#### OUR OPERATION FOR THE PERIOD:

A-3:

Oct. 17, 1944 at 0805, Company "D", 6th Ranger Inf. En landed at Black Beach # 3, on Sulvan Island, Philippines. Its mission was to proceed as quickly as possible to a lighthouse on the southern end of the island, destroy enemy installations in the lighthouse area and recover any enemy material of value. Upon completion of its mission, Company "D" was to return to Black Beach # 3 to be reembarked to the A.P.D. Crosby.

Under leaden skies and a driving rain, Comapny "D" landed one hundred yards south of the village of Granadas. No opposition was an countered at this point and a dry landing was effected.

Immediately after reorganizing, the company moved south along a coastal trail misch led through the village of Granadas. The point was followed by the 1st and 2d Platoons respectively. The point was from the 1st Platoon and fland guards from both platoons. March centinued uninterrupted to a point 500 yards south of Granadas. At this point, where the trail turned east toward the lighthouse, the scouts discovered four enemy buildings. These buildings were recompitered and found to have been used by the enemy as store houses and living quarters. One radio was found in one of the mildings. These installations were set on fire and completely destroyed.

The march toward the lighthouse was again resumed when the enemy opened fire on the scouts killing Pfc Darwin C. Zufall and wounding Pfc Donald J. Gannon. Enemy withdrew into dense jungle berdering the trail when the company went into attack. Earch was again undertaken and the company gained the base of the hill on which the lighthouse was situated without further exposition.

the lighthouse was situated on a sheer pinnacle of rock rising approximately 400 feet, with a single set of concrete steps leading up the side. Learning the let and 2nd Platoons deployed around the base, the Company Commander with one assault section proceeded up the steps. Gaining the top they found the lighthouse and adjoining buildings deserted of the enemy. Two power units, one radar antenna and one set of binoculars were discovered and destroyed by this party. The beacon in the lighthouse was destroyed by cruiser gun fire earlier in the acoming. Mission was completed approximately 1200 hours, and company withdrew to Black Beach / 5 bringing the two casualties. Weather had assumed the proportions of a typhoon by this time

At Black Beach 23 the Naval Officer in charge of the four landing boats reported that all four boats were broached and radio contact with the Grosby had been broken.

A perimeter was established, wounded man placed under shelter and the company spent the night on the island.

A-2:

Yext morning weather had cleared and radio contact with the Prosby was regained. A combat patrol was sent out to determine location of the enemy. The patrol had been gone about three hours and was returning to Black Beach ? 3 when it was suddenly fired on from a small hut almost hidden by the tall grass that grew profusely in this area. No enemy targets were visible never-the-less the hut was subjected to fire by the patrol. Upon investigation the hut was found to be empty of the energy. Two enemy dead were reported found not far from the hut. Later reports from the Fillipino people added three more enemy dead found in this area making a total of five. One man, Pro Rosson Dick was wounded in this action. Patrol returned to Black Beach 5 at approximately 1166 hours.

Additional landing boats arrived at Black Beach # 5 to convey company to A.P. . Crosby. Entire company was aboard the Crosby by 1500 hours.


Shortly before the company left the island funeral services were held for Pro Darwin C. Zufall. He was laid to rest in a park in the center of the village of Franadas and the Fillipino people promised to care for his grave.

Once back on the A.P.D. the two wounded men recieved the best medical attention possible. In spite of this, early in the morning of Cat. 19, 1944, Ffc Roscoe Disk died of his wound recieved on Suluan Island. He was buried later on Dinagat Island.

Company "D", 6th Fanger Inf. In. landed on Black Beach 7 1, Dinagat Island, Philippines at 1530 hours.

- 1. (a) Current intelligence reports on observation and reporting station located in a lighthouse and adjoining buildings on Suluan Island.

  A power house, radio and radar station are located at the same place.
- (b) Reliable reports indicate a garrison varying from 30 to 100. Post is believed manned principally by Navy personnel.
- (c) Co. "D", 6th Ranger Inf. Bn. disembark from USS Crosby at 0540 in order to land on Black Beach #3, Suluan Island at F hour (0600) 100 yards south of the village of Granadas.
- 2. (a) Co. "D", 6th Ranger Inf. Rn. will raid Sulvan Island in order to destroy enemy forces and installations at the lighthouse area and to recover any enemy material of value.
- (b) One cruiser and one destroyer as designated by G.T.U. 784.3 will execute gun fire tasks in support of the landing on Sulvan Island.
- (c) Intermittent air bombing and strafing are scheduled from F hour to F plus 45 minutes during which time it is estimated the Rangers will be able to be in a position near the lighthouse for the raid.
- (d) At F plus 45 minutes, when planes previously engaged in intermit tent strafing and bombings are clear, cruiser will put down harrassing fire not less than 500 yards to the eastward of the lighthouse to keep enemy personnel under cover. This casual fire will continue for 60 minutes unless notified sooner that the raid is over. Ammunition allowance 50 rounds.
- (e) If weather or other conditions prevent air bombing and strafing from F hour to F Plus 45 minutes, cruiser will put down harrassing fire during that period, including air burst over the area, designed to force enemy personnel to cover, such fire to be shifted from the immediate vicinity of the lighthouse at F plus 45 minutes. Assumition allowance 100 rounds.



(f) Destroyer following minesweeper, if available, and leading Crosby arrive off Black Beach Three Transport Area at F-25 minutes (0535), at F-2 minutes Fire 5 rounds air burst about 1000 yards south of the village of Granadas. Oall fire may be necessary for destroyer to assist reembarkation of the Rangers. Note that Rangers after landing will go south along the beach and coastal road toward the lighthose.


3. (a) Upon landing on Black Beach # 3, teams will proceed directly east, reorganise at Phase Line # 1, which is 50 yards east of the coastal read. Order of march will be Company in section columns lat section, lat Platoon will act as point with secuts out. Gompany Eqs. will follow point. 2nd Platoon will follow 2nd Section of the lat Platoon. Second Platoon will furnish rear guard. 2nd Section, lat Platoon and lat Section of 2nd Platoon each, will furnish two rifleman to act as flank patrols on east side of coastal road when company is marching south. Sections will march in staggered columns of two's. Each column will march on extreme sides of road.



Subject: Historical Data.

To : The Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. (Through Channels).

1. The following is a narrative account of the attacks on Nomonhon and Suluan Islands, Philippine Group, during the months of October and November, 1944, by Company "B," 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion:

"The troops aboard the APD USS HERBERT were piped to General Quarters at 0830 18 October 1914. Aboard the converted flush-deck destroyer were the men of Company "B," 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion, the 21st Ground Observer Platoon, an Amphibious Scout party of one officer and two men, and an Army-Navy fire support officer.

"For the past 21 hours the HERNERT, a destroyer and a frigate had been lying off the coast of Homonhon Island in Leyte Culf waiting for the typhoon to lift so a landing could be made. The troops, in spite of the delay, were calm and even unconcerned about the landing. Mavy personnel had long since remarked that these were the calmest group of men they had put ashore during the six operations they had participated in. Great boilers of coffee had been prepared the night before to give the men something to do while they fidgeted the night away before the landing. The men had gone to bed and an amased Mavy crew took the still-filled tanks of cold-coffee out staking their heads. Now at last the ship's address system clanged out the GQ that meant tend of the line." The men looked at one another and hurried below to get their gear on and check weapons for the last time.

"At 0900 the voice from the bridge came down cool and distinct,
'First wave prepare to debark.' The 1st Assault Platoon boiled up the ladders and spilled out over the deck to the davits. The boats were lowered away and the 3d Platoon was loaded into the remaining two boats. The plywood LCPR's circled 700 yards offshore, churning the water, in a frency to get headed for the not-too-distant beach. The Boat Officers' flag dipped. Men oroughed down in the boats. The boats ran ahead, two abreast in two minature waves, and headed for the narrow coral entrance that would admit only a pair of these little craft at one time.

"As the boats surged forward the naval barrage rattled out to the shore line. The three and five inch shells whistling over their heads provoked many of the men to come erect and have a lock at the show. They nodded their heads in approval and grinned at each other. The boat trip in was figured at 15 minutes. The barrage lifted 12 minutes after the landing oraft had started the run. Three minutes later the first two craft grounded ashore on the coral sand bottom 40 yards from the beach itself. The ramps clanged down and the men slipped off into the chest-deep water holding rifles and machine guns over their heads.

"Slowly the men waded in and waited for the first burst of fire that would locate enemy treeps. The water got knee deep, then ankle deep and the men began to run for the cover of the scrub brush on shore. Not a shot had been fired at them and, typical of the troops in the Battalion, they had held their own fire because they could see nothing to shoot at. The beachhead perimeter was organized immediately according to plan, and the landing was secured. At 1038 the Company Commander sent to the Battalion Commander, Beachhead secured, supplies ashers. He resistance. No casualties. Contacted natives, they report no Japs on Island.

"Patrols were immediately sent out to insure the protection of the perimeter and cenfirm, if possible, the reports of the natives that the enemy had left the island two months provious. In the magnitude the perimeter was due in and supplies were brought ashore through the 50 yards of heavy surfaced enched inside the perimeter.

"By 1315 all supplies were secured. At 1400 the Ranger Company was on its way to Colasi Point. The original mission assigned had been to clear Colasi Point of all enemy installations to safeguard the passage of the main task force due to come through the channel between Hemonhon and Dinagat Islands on D-Day 20 October 1914. The mission now had resolved itself to being sure there were no installations at Colasi Point and, in the meantime, assisting the Amphibious Scout party in setting up a channel light at a suitable point to permit the fleet to obtain a fix on the swept channel through the mine field that barred Leyte Bay.

"At 1400 the Amphibious Scouts stopped at Pagbabangnan Point, decided it was the best spot around and, since the light weighed nearly 300 pounds, there was no point in going further than necessary. The 3d Platcon was left as security for the light which would be vital to the operation. The rest of the Company continued up the coast to Nasomo Point and settled down for the night inside a tight perimeter blocking the trail along the shoreline.

"As the day curled up to rest then the men began to realize that they had taken part in as dramatic a landing as could have been thought up even by themselves." The chances of being wiped out on such an operation were excellent and had they encountered resistance there was no doubt in any one's mind about the percentage of casualties that would have been suffered. As it was, they grumbled about the lack of fighting and the air was laced with tired talk to the effect that 'here we are with all these Goddam bullets and no Japs.'

Colasi Point to make sure the point was clear and, if necessary, to clear it.

By 1100 the Platoon was back and reported that the entire coast was free of energy. The let and 2d Platoons then returned to Black Beach #2 and researched the perimeter.

"At 1515 on the afternoon of the 19th a company formation stood at Present Arms while the American flag was raised slowly to the top of a cocanut palm with 200 hundred natives from surrounding barries standing with devout and awe-inspired eyes at the sight of the Stars and Stripes fluttering in the breeze. It was as if each man's heart reached out and pushed the flag a little higher.

"At 1615 that evening a report came in from Suluan Island by guerrilla runner that the Jap garrison there was killing the civilians in reprisal for our landing there on the 17th. A request was sent to Battalion Headquarters for permission to land on the island and wipe out the Japs there. The request was denied due to the tactical necessity of keeping clear the islands guarding the channel entrance until the fleet units had passed.

"Starting on the 20th patrols were sent out over the island continually and contact was maintained with all barries. On the 25d permission was again requested for the Sulvan mission and permission was granted provided transportation could be secured. The transportation became the greatest difficulty since it became evident by the 26th that no Navy or Amy transportation could be spered at the time.

"By the 27th permission had been granted to use any native transportative available and a sufficient number of native craft had been gathered to transport 80 men. The guerrilla band on Suluan Island had been notified of the landing and instructed to secure the beach area if pessible, which they did. A wast amount of confision realted from the indefiniteness of the native boatmen concerning the correct moment to start, and since the 'fleet' was composed of three sailbeats and 11 small cames the wind, tide, current, and crystal ball had a great effect on the time table. The decimient was reached to start loading the traces at 24.00 on the 27th and have the entire convoy on the way by 0000 on the 25th.

"According to schedule the loading was started at 2400 and 0150 all boats were under weigh on the 15 mile trie, but it was not to be quite that simple. At 0400 the wind freshened and 0500 a first whise wind storm was on the way. To white caps increased in size until 14 because necessary to bail out the boat continually, and the ground small started to force the smaller beats to shore. By 0500 a disastrous processing of boats was headed

for the bottom, and in the cold grey morning seven of the small cances capsized within 500 yards of the shore of Homenhon sland. The remainder proceeded to Cagastan and landed to wait for those not so fortunate.

"The men in the capsized boats had lost a considerable amount of equipment and the Company Commander decided to re-equip them from the 3d Flamtoon which had returned from the light station and was then at Black Beach #2.

The men walked back, got the arms and gear they needed and returned to Cagasuan.

By 1600 on the 28th the entire force was collected at Cagasuan and ready to go one

"The 2d Platoon left for Suluan at 0830 on the 29th in five sailboats and arrived safely at Suluan Barrie at 1130 that morning and established a perimeter around the village. The crossing had been made in broad daylight under any enemy air umbrella. Plans had taken this into account and the men had been stripped and all equipment covered in the bottom of the boats so as to avoid arousing any suspicion. The 1st Platoon that was to cross later had been ordered to fellow the same procedure and it worked in both cases since the Japs evidently saw nothing amiss in a group of fishing boats full of what appeared to be natives crossing the eight mile channel.

"The remainder of the troops crossed to Suluan on the 30th and arrived at 0330 on the 31st after an 11 hour fight with the current and winds by this time patrols had recommoitered the island on the side towards the channel, poisoned the Jap watter supply, and plans for the attack had been definitely settled. The patrols had secured a considerable amount of radio equipment of the enemy and it had been pack for shipment.

end of the island. he lighthouse was on the top of a 300 feet eliff with apparently no passage except a trail leading to a flight of 150 steps straight up the east face of the cliff. The trail and the stairs were propertied by the lighthouse itself and two men could have held off 500 coming up the steps, so another approach had to be found. The western side of the island had been deliberately avoided but reconnoitered at night to find a possible approach. Information brought back by patrols revealed that the west side of the island presented a possible but very difficult route of approach. he eastern side would be too costly in men and the alternative presented the picture of a 300 feet coral eliff straight under the lighthouse to be scaled without being seen or heard. The latter was selected as the most advantageous route and the plan called for a night attack.

"The attack plan in brief was for two assault squads and one LMG squad, accompanied by Filipine guides, to cross the island under cover of darkness, proceed up the west coast, scale the cliff, and be in position before dawn on 2 November. This attack group was under the command of the Company Commander. The remainder of the Company was to travel down the east coast of the island and deploy facing the trail that ran up to the lighthouse. As first light on the 2d the bulk of the Company was to attack across the trail and isolate the lighthouse garrison from the security guard at the foot of the cliff. At the same time the attack group on the cliff was to wipe out the Japs in the lighthouse itself and clear the stairway down the cliff to command the rest of the Company. The enemy were then to be forced to the example of the island and destroyed. In order to definitely establish the phases of the attack flare signals were provided. A red flare from the top of the cliff would mean that the attack group there had control of the lighthouse and a yellow flare would indicate that the stairway was under communication of the treeps on the cliff, an orange flare would be the signal for the treeps at the base of the cliff to press the attack to the south as rapidly as possible.

Job was to insure coordinated action and obtain maximum surprise which was absolutely essential for the small group scaling the cliff since any move that disclosed the group would mean sure annihilation.

"At 2115 the attack group that was to socie the cliff left the bivour area and created the island to the most side. A very bright mean made traveling easy but rather dangerous since the landscape, washing unoffice softing twee two and the ground was as open as an love prarie

single file about ten yards apart. The point moved out until it was thirty yards ahead of the rest of the group and picked the softest ground and the most shadow to go through. The terrain became extremely rocky and jagged but the trail was still clear and the going good.

By 24.00 the assault group was on a very indistinct trail over solid coral. Footing was insecure and the men were feeling their way along with their feet and hands and breathing silent prayers that the coral wouldn't crumble and give them away. At this point orders were issued for all men to take off their socks and put them on over their shoes to decrease the possibility of noise and slipping. The men pulled off the trail, such as it was, and followed the order. In ten minutes hand signs indicated that they were ready to travel again. In the dead stillness they knew the rough part was about to start.

"At 0100 the group was directly under the lighthouse that steed out like a spectre overhead. The point turned ninety degrees to the right and started up. The going was slow, painfully slow since there was no trail and the soral was chopping the meat off fingers and palms. At points the men pulled themselves up hand over hand on the vines where there was no focing at all. Up to this time there had been no noise of any kind and everybedy was breathing a little easier when a rifle stock hit a coral come and it rang like the voice of doom in the stillness. Everyone stopped moving and breathing at the same time. The silence screamed at the men as they waited for a rifle shot from above that would indicate the guard had heard us. For ten minutes the men waited and hoped and waited. The point moved out again and the sleeprocession crawled on up the cliff.

the cliff. The rest of the men started moving into position on the marrow platform. The Jap latrine is five feet ahead. The furthest building is twenty yards away and the nearest eight yards to the frent. The full mean light up the four white buildings and the Japs are talking in the nearest one, still no alarm. The first men feel maked in the bright light at they keep their guns trained on the 60 foot easent tower. Still no sound but the unintelligible grunts of the enemy in the nearest building. Then suddenly it breaks. A sleepy Jap is coming to the latrine. As he puts his feet on the first of two wooden steps leading to the board platform the lead men knew he's getting to close for comfort and one of the guides raises his sub-machine gun and crashes three slugs through his chest.

"The body is five or six feet from the Company Commander and the fight has started whether it was planned that way or not. White phospherus grenades shower into the buildings and the machine gun comes crawling up the cliff as fast as it can be moved. In a remarkably short time it is in position. The gumer is helding one leg down and firing the gun. The Genapany Commander is helding the other leg and the ammunition hem. The third leg is free. The Squad leader of the 1260 squad is keeping the gun elear of the crawling man gaing by to the rear and tracers are lacing the sky in a gretesque pattern under the mean.

"The Jape are taken completely by surprise and they run into the fire, back up and go ever the cliff where the grandes and rifles pick them eff as they fail. The machine gun fire lifts and the two hashald squade go through the buildings and clear them out with grandes and rifle fire. Everything has been secured but the tower itself. The first shet was fired at GRIG. At GRIG the firing has dwindled to an occasional shet from the tower. The man wait and watch. Another shet from the tower and a fusic lade enswers it. and threw it into the building. Sgt Potts collapsed. Both these men were
later awarded the Bronse Star for their action.

In accordance to the plan the remainder of the Company left the bivouac area at 0500. They had seen the red flare fired at 0245 and knew the first group is in the lighthouse. By 0415 they were in position below the cliff and they opened fire according to schedule at 0505. The move was carried off as anticipated with the enemy continually moving back towards the scuthern end of the island. As the Japs retreated they brought an automatic rifle to bear on the top of the cliff and wounded three more men. Pfc Prokopovich had been posted on the ledge to watch the trail below. The Japs picked up his position and two bullets struck his shoulder seriously wounding him. He later died from loss of blood. Pfc Bilich was wounded by a fragment that hit his abdomen, Pfc Bilich was later awarded the Bronse Star for his action in rushing the buildings on the initial assault. Pfc Sombrano was slightly wounded when a bullet grazed his wriste

A message was sent to the commander of the second group which had then crossed the trail below the cliff and the enemy rifleman was located and driven out or killed by mortar and machine gun fire.

"At 1000 the company withdraw since it was known that all but five or six of the enemy had been killed and it was unprefitable to pursue them. A demolition team was left on the cliff and as the treeps withdraw they blow up the lighthouse, all buildings and destroyed all food and fuel supplies in the area. The wounded were carried back to the bivouse area and evacuated from there aboard an LGI that had been signaled at sea. The men, enhausted from the fight and climb relaxed and slep inside a well guarded perimeter.


The gunner on the machine gun that was taken up the cliff was awarded the Silver Star for his injective and skill in getting the gun into action. Had it not been for his action the fight might have been a good deal more costly since the men were spread out on the cliff when the initial fire fight started. Pro Ortis rushed the gun to the front and brought it into action in a remarkably short time considering the almost impassable terrain he had to contend with.


"The company rested on the 2d and third with small patrels out looking for the remaining five Japs. All this time the entire Company had lived on native food since no rations had come from the mainland. The ration ship showed up on the 3rd and they had their first sight of army food in seven days.

"On the 4th, two Japs were located scarching for food on the northcastern tip of the 1212nd. They were out off and killed by a patrol with no difficulty. On the 5th two more were unfortunate enough to some the same way and not the same fate after they had shot a native to death.

"From the 6th to the 12th the island was combed by patrels but the remaining Japs could not be found. On the 13th the Company was evacuated from the island. The third plateon was picked up on Black Beach #2 and the entire force reached Layts on the morning of the lith to rejoin the Battalion.



1750 - Lt. O'Connell returned to LORETO from TUBAJON (see sketch) minus S/Sgt. Karns patrol with six (6) POW. Turned POW over to S-2 at 2000. Reported that he had sent two (2) patrols south from TUBAJON. One patrol led by Tech. Sgt. Anderson (see sketch) to proceed along coast south of TUBAJON to TAMDYANAS POINT and return. One patrol led by S/Sgt. Karns was to proceed to SEMENA via SANTA CRUZ, GAYON, and CAZTIRASS and return. At 1500 Anderson's patrol returned to TUBAJON, no enemy encountered. Many Japanese Naval Personnel found dead on beaches, some from exhaustion, many killed by natives. At 1500 O'Connell minus Kearns patrol and six (6) POW left TUBAJON for LORETO.

1950 - Lt. Jacobs returned from Hibuson Island reported no enemy on Island.

1130 - Enemy reported north of LORETO in vicinity of CANSEMONG.

1200 - Lt. Nowak, and Lt. O'Connell sent to investigate report of enemy activity north of LORETO, Colonel Mucci accompanied patrol (see sketch).

1430 - Lt. Nowak returned to LORETO reported that patrol had reconnoitered along KANIBINILA RIVER, no trace of enemy. At 1400 "C" Company had left patrol to return to BLACK BEACH \$. Lt. Strandfelt returned from Tubujon reported no enemy activity (see sketch).

1500 - Lt. Ditmars with patrol returned from TUBUJON, no enemy encountered (see sketch).

1600 - Received word that seventeen (17) enemy were sighted on Kanaibaan Island off west coast of Dinagat Island, twenty (20) miles south of LORETO.

1750 - Lt. Nowak with fifteen (15) man patrol left LORETO by Banca (Native Sail Boat) to investigate report of enemy's presence on Kanaibaan Island.

2555 - Lt. Meacham, and Lt. Mobley arrived at LORETO from BLACK BEACH I. Colonel Mucci arrived Black Beach I by Boroto. In route from LORETO to BLACK BEACH I observed fires in vicinity of CANSEMONG where enemy had previously been reported to be. At 2545 Major Garrett was sent to LORETO by Boroto with orders to attack north from LORETO with three (50 platoons, leaving LORETO at 0400 on 28 October 1944. Colonel Mucci with one (1) reinforced platoon would move South from BLACK BEACH I, and be in pesition to attack at 0600 from ridge north and east of CANSEMONG.

1200 - Major Garrett, Lts. Ditmars, Strandfeldt, Meacham with platoons returned to Loreto from Cansemong. Reported that enemy had slipped trap. Colonel Mucci arrived from Black Beach I.

1215 - Colonel Mucci with Lts. Strandfeldt and Mobley platoons left Loreto to investigate enemy activity reported at Himbasen.

1400 - Lt. Meacham and twelve (12) man patrol left Loreto for Mabini.

1825 - Colonel Mucci, Lts. Mobley and Strandfeldt returned to Loreto from Himibasen. Reported they had arrived at Himibasen 1515, enemy had eaten and left about 1350 moving south toward Mabini.



Reported that after leaving Loreto at 1750, 27 October 1944, by Bonka (native sail boat) they encountered unfavorable winds and a strong current, after four (4) hours they landed in the vicinity of Tubajon, point X on sketch. Decided to leave Bonka and continue on mission by Borotoes. After a few hours rest continued on mission at 0100, 28 October 1944, along the coast. Arrived at Osmenia Saturday morning at 0600. Upon arrival we met Guerilla Officers and informed that all Japs on Kanaibaan Island were killed, sent fifteen (15) natives to check that report. I followed later but did not reach islands, was met by returning natives which confirmed report that enemy were all dead. At 1450 I started on return trip to Loreto in native boats. At 1850 the Borto I was in sunk. (Point 0 on sketch.) Myself and five (5) men walked eight (8) miles overland to Tubajon, there we met the remaining men of the patrol at 2150. Remained at Tubajon overnight. Left Tubajon at 0800, 29 October 1944.

1200 - Patrol reported that twenty-nine (29) armed Japs were in vicinity of Mabini headed south-east toward Dongoan (see sketch).

1500 - Colonel Mucci with Lt. Clifford Smith, thirteen (15) men patrol and four (4) native guerillas left for Mabini (see sketch) to investigate reported enemy patrol in that vicinity.

1600 - Replacements arrived Loreto by Borto from "A" Company Black Beach I.

2100 - Colonel Mucci, Major Garrett, and all patrols (Lts. Smith, Nowak, Strandfeldt) returned to Loreto from Tubajon. Lt. Clifford Smith reported that he had contacted enemy at Sinongag (see sketch), had killed eighteen (18) men and one (1) officer, his patrol suffering no casualties, three native Guerillas killed. The following is a detailed report of Lt. Smith's patrols

29 October 1944 - Left Loreto at 1500 for Mabini. Arrived at Mabini 1400, natives there confirmed report that enemy had passed thru Mabini. Left Mabini at 1410 for Dongoan. Enroute patrols met two (2) native guerillas who informed us that enemy had attempted to leave in Borotoes for Malina on east coast of Dinagat Island (see sketch #2 of Annex 15) also that guerillas had killed four (4) enemy while attempting their escape, the remainder of the enemy group returned to shore.

1600 - Arrived at Dongoan, searched area, no Japs.

1700 - Arrived at home of guides father. Guides father reported Japs had been there at 1500 and had stolen food. Patrol remained there over night. On reconnaissance found trail that indicated the Japs had left Dongoan for Sinongag.

#### A-10 (Cont'd):

#### 30 October 1944.

0600 - Patrol left Dongoan for Sinongag cross country, after short while came on trail, found evidence of enemy presence. Continued on trail to Sanongag.

0700 - Arrived Sinongag, natives reported no enemy. Put out security post's and searched immediate vicinity.

0750 - Fired upon by Japs from rear (see sketch) located enemy position and started attack, Japs withdrew approximately 100 yards. In face of withering fire advanced and eliminated all enemy resistance. Fifteen (15) men and one (1) officer of the enemy were killed.

0830 - Patrol reorganized and departed for Mabini, 600 yards west of scene of first action patrol over took the fleeing enemy, fire fight followed which resulted in three more enemy being killed. Three native guerillas accompanied my patrol were killed, reorganized and headed for Tubajon.

1750 - Arrived Tubajon met Major Garrett with patrol sent there to cut off fleeing enemy.

1900 - Left Tubajon by Banca (native sail boat).

2100 - Arrived Loreto. Enemy killed nineteen (19) three native guerillas killed by enemy.

#### OPERATIONAL REPORT

No. 1

LOCATION OF TROOPS: 72.2 - 04.9

WEATHER AND VISIBILITY: Strong wind accompanied by heavy rain. Visibility poor.

#### OUR OPERATION FOR THE PERIOD:

A-3:

Oct. 17, 1944 at 0805, Company "D", 6th Ranger Inf. Bn landed at Black Beach # 3, on Suluan Island, Philippines. Its mission was to proceed as quickly as possible to a lighthouse on the southern end of the island, destroy enemy installations in the lighthouse area and recover any enemy material of value. Upon completion of its mission, Company "D" was to return to Black Beach # 3 to be reembarked to the a.P.D. Crosby.

Under leaden skies and a driving rain, Comapny "D" landed one hundred yards south of the village of Granadas. No opposition was encountered at this point and a dry landing was effected.

Immediately after reorganizing, the company moved south along a coastal trail which led through the village of Granadas. The point was followed by the 1st and 2d Platoons respectively. The point was from the 1st Platoon and fland guards from both platoons. March continued uninterrupted to a point 500 yards south of Granadas. At this point, where the trail turned east toward the lighthouse, the scouts discovered four enemy buildings. These buildings were reconncitered and found to have been used by the enemy as store houses and living quarters. One radio was found in one of the Buildings. These to installations were set on fire and completely destroyed.

The march toward the lighthouse was again resumed when the enemy opened fire on the scouts killing Pfc Darwin C. Zufall and mounding Pfc Donald J. Cannon. Enemy withdrew into dense jungle bordering the trail when the company went into attack. March was again undertaken and the company gained the base of the hill on which the lighthouse was situated without further opposition.

The lighthouse was situated on a sheer pinnacle of rock rising approximatley 400 feet. with a single set of concrete steps leading up the side Lieuwing the 1st and 2nd Flatoons deployed around the base, the Company Commander with one assault section proceeded up the steps. Gaining the top they found the lighthouse and adjoining buildings deserted of the enemy. Two power units, one radar antenna and one set of binoculars were discovered and destroyed by this party. The beacon in the lighthouse was destroyed by cruiser gun fire earlier in the marning. Mission was completed approximately 1200 hours, and company withdrew to Black Beach # 5 bringing the two casualties. Weather had assumed the proportions of a typhoon by this time

At Black Beach # 5 the Naval Officer in charge of the four landing boats reported that all four boats were broached and radio contact with the Crosby had been broken.

A perimeter was established, wounded man placed under shelter and the company spent the night on the island.

A-2:

Next merning weather had cleared and radio contact with the Crosby was regained. A combat patrol was sent out to determine location of the enemy. The patrol had been gone about three hours and was returning to Black Beach # 3 when it was suddenly fired on from a small hut almost hidden by the tall grass that grew profusely in this area. No enemy targets were visible never-the-less the hut was subjected to fire by the patrol. Upon investigation the hut was found to be empty of the enemy. Two enemy dead were reported found not far from the hut. Later reports from the Fillipino people added three more enemy dead found in this area making a total of five. One man, Pfc Roscoe Dick was wounded in this action. Patrol returned to Black Beach # 3 at approximately 1166 hours.

Additional landing boats arrived at Black Beach # 3 to convey company to A.P.D. Crosby. Entire company was aboard the Crosby by 1500 hours.

Shortly before the company left the island funeral services were held for Pfo Darwin C. Zufall. He was laid to rest in a park in the center of the village of Granadas and the Fillipino people promised to care for his grave.

Once back on the A.P.D. the two wounded men recieved the best medical attention possible. In spite of this, early in the morning of Oct. 19, 1944, Pfc Roscoe Dick died of his wound recieved on Sulvan Island. He was buried later on Dinagat Island.

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

## FROM JANUARY 2, 1945 TO JULY 1, 1945

On to Luzons.—That seems to be all one can hear as we are loading our four (4) LCI's with rations, munitions and asundry equipment. It's two days after New Years and between the talking of the fun we had New Years Eve and other quips the men are speculating and every one concurs that it will be Luzon. We know we will be briefed aboard ship, but we are all hoping we can really get in and do a bang up job as a whole battalion, and not divide us up. The morale of the men is extremely high and the loading is done with alsority.

After everything was on ship, we moved out in the Leyte Gulf and for two days we waited for the convoy to form. The LCI Commanders have given the companies the use of the ships' galleys, so we were assured two hot meals a day. We alternated with the crews mess and all of the small mistakes which were made were soon ironed out.

The first day in the Gulf we had an air alert, but thank God it was on the shore about two miles away where they hit a fuel dump. This raid being that close didn't break up the card games and sun bathers. We have made so many voyages that we feel as if we'er part of the Navy-at least we'er seamen 1st class at heart.

The anchor was hauled at day break on January Lth and we proceeded to take our place in the convoy. It really was a gratifying sight to see the carriers and warships on either side and though the sea was rough we just had to gawk and comment.

After being out at sea about six (6) hours, we were all called together and briefed and were told we were to land at the Lingayen Gulf in Luson, P. I. We were informed that a formidable Jap garrison would be on hand to greet us. After the briefing, comments heard at various times during the day were, "The more the merrier" and "the sconer the better". Everyone is anxious to get a good look at Manila as it will be the first modern city that two thirds of the men have seen since leaving the States in 1942 for New Guinea, as they have had no furloughs since that time—As on the last mission, the unconcerned manner and horseplay of the troops confounds the Mavy, and they come time to remark that they have never encountered such nonchalance bearfore an attack by any troops.

In the days to follow intermittent air raids were made on our convoy and the only damage we saw was when a suicide dive bomber crashed dived a destroyer causing a fire to break out aboard. We could not see the extent of the damage, but the ship never left the convoy. Our convoy was so huge it was hard to estimate the number of planes over at any given time, but it seemed as no ships were seriously damaged. The men take it all in stride and the wise cracks range from firing Ml's and mortors at the Jap planes or help the Navy man its guns.

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On the 9th of January 45, we entered the Lingayen Gulf and were awed by the barrage layed down by our warships. Men were running from one side of the LCI's to the other to try and see it all. We were expecting to be landed immediately, but were deeply disappointed when they told us we would land the following day. At noon on the 10th of January, the beachmaster told us we could land one LCI at a time, so the one carrying MAR Company beached. A ten foot surf was running and and was breaking completely over the fantail of the beached LCI. Both ramps were lowered and Pfc. Leon Bailey and Capt. Lever, both of MAR Company were the first men down the ramps. Pfc. Bailey was carrying a flame thrower, and although the ship was beached fifty (50) yards from shore, it seemed safe to land. As Capt. Lever and Pfc. Bailey jumped clear of the ramps both disappeared beneath the water. Capt. Lever was rescured by members of the ships crew after submerging twice. Technical Sergeant George Tainter without removing his clothes, immediately jumped into save Pfc. Bailey, but after vainly searching was unable to find him. We hated to lose a good man this way and those that knew about it felt bad. After that episode they proceeded to remove the troops by DUMKS and we finally were all unloaded at four in the afternoon.

The Battalion Commander had upon reaching shore, had gone inland to pick out a bivouac area for the battalion. We moved to this area about 1000 yards from the beach and established our perimeter near a road running parallel to the beach and proceeded to dig in. At 2000 hours the battalion commander had a meeting at his CP when a Jap plane glided in and strafed us and dropped a bomb. Col. Mucci and most of the officers scrambled for holes and the closest one available was one being dug by Cpl. Louis Weiss, so they proceeded to pile in on top of him. When they dragged him out he was almost suffocated and he really told all the officers to get in their own holes. The same situation prevailed throughout the perimeter and all the humorous stories told later-on really boosted our spirits. The plane was really aiming for trucks running up this road near our perimèter, but as usual Mr. Tojo was off his target and almost made us his target. We were glad as the battalion suffered no casualties.

The next morning the Battalion formed and we moved out to a new area near Dagupan Barrio where we established a perimeter. As yet we had not heard from our second echelon who were aboard IST's. We were low on rations and we borrowed a days supply from the 6th Division. On the 13th of January our equipment and supplies arrived in our camp area and the men were elated as their duffle bags were there and they could afford a change of clothes. That was important as we had to set up a perimeter to defend the 6th Army Headquarters and the dirty clothes were very uncomfortable. Our present location is a temporary camp and we hear we'er moving to a semi-permanant location in the vicinity of Calasio approximately two miles south of Dagupan. The usual details are up there now erecting tents for the occupancy tomorrow evening.

On January 16th, we heard that there was a mission on and the usual rumors prevail—a recommaissance patrol is going to the island of Santiago which is situated at the north of Lingayen Gulf. The recommaissance patrol will consist of three officers, 9 enlisted men,

one Filipino guide, one radar technician and one Mavy enlisted man and they will go there aboard PT boats. G-2 reports estimate 4000 to 5000 Jap troops there. It seems that Santiago Island is ideally situated for the operation of a Radar Station to intercept enemy planes from Formosa. We are to see that they get on and stay there and everyone in the battalion wants to go. Everytime Japs are mentioned, every one wants to go and engage them. The spirits of the men are excellent.

On January 15th, the patrol left for Santiago Island and they were under command of Capt. Simons, C.O. of Company "B", who was to remain aboard the PT and keep contact with the patrol. The patrol inland was under command of 2nd Lt. Elsworth of Company "E". With him was lst Lt. Luddeke, a Signal Corp Movie Camerman, T/Sgt.

Crocker, Company A, S/Sgt. Potts, Company B, T/L Smith, T/5 Betsner were from Headquarters Company and were to operate the radios.

Pfc. Straube also from Headquarters Company was to be the scout. Two PT Boats are to take them as close to shore as possible and the landing is to be made during darkness in rubber boats. During the two days this patrol was gone, we really worried as we had no means of communicating with them. On January 18th, at 1530 hours they returned and we all crowded around for information, but no seap until a report was made to the Battalion Commander. After that we were told that on January 15th at 2200 the patrol disembarked from the PT boats and by some mistake they were let out at Saipar Island which is 22 miles from Santiago Island. After two hours of rowing by smashed Jap ships which the Air Corp had destroyed, they finally made Santiago Island and immediately approached the first house they The people were so frightened that the screaming of men, women saw. and children were heard out on the PT boats. After they found out that they were Americans the island was theirs. It seemed that the day previous there were about 6000 Japs there, but pulled out to the mainland. The next morning the patrol split into two patrolss one under Lt. Elsworth and one under S/Sgt Potts, and they proceeded to cover the island. They made soundings and found a suitable landing beach as a lot of heavy equipment was to be brought ashore. They also found a suitable spot for a Radar Station and a road leading to it. All in all, the patrol was a success and "B" and "E" Companies were assigned to go there just in case trouble should arise. I know the men will relish a little of that. Rations were drawn for about 20 days and both companies were anxiously waiting the go ahead sign from 6th Army. To add to all the excitement a native woman living in our perimeter was about to give birth to a child and Capt. Fisher, our Battalion Surgeon did the honors. Not only did he bring the little boy into the world, he is to be the Godfather. Poor "Doc", is getting a terrific ribbing. We think he overcharged.

At 1730 on January 19th, "B" and "E" Company departed for Santiago Island fully prepared to take on all corners. After an uneventful trip in ISM boats, they landed with all equipment including a bull dezer, Jeep and one truck. The inhabitants of the island were very excited as it was the first time a vehicle of these types had ever landed there. By January 21st, the Radar was up and a perimeter

thrown about it. Security and other patrols were sent out to other islands, but no Japs. When the Japs moved out they forgot to take their rum and beer and a wonderful time was had by all for the next few days. In the days to follow Jap planes made numerous flights over the island at a low altitude and as they did not fire at us or drop bombs, we didn't fire on them. We were afraid they had spotted the radar, so, Capt Simons asked for AA which was promptly dispatched.

Meanwhile the patrols were sent to the mainland of Luzon and into the mountains and did not contact any Japs, but discovered a lot of abandoned Japanese equipment which was turned over to the Guerrilla forces.

With "E" and "B" Companies on Santiago Island, the rest of the battalion moved to our new camp near Calasio. The men immediately started work improving the area, and within a short time we had a miniature "Barrio", as outside of our tents we had no other equipment, but an ample supply of bamboo which soon took from into frames and shelves for our tents, and a mess hall with all the fine adornments of a modern restaurant. All this work on continually improving our area and cleaning of our equipment paid dividends as on the 27th of January, Colonel West, assistant chief of staff, G-3, of Headquarters, oth Army inspected the battalion. Colonel West's comments after the inspection, were more than gratifying to all.

At 1130 that same morning Col. Mucci was told to report to the G-3 section as they had another mission planned for us. Immediately, the old game of "Wild Rumors" started all over again. As every company is loudly claiming that it is their turn to go, and the claims grew louder upon the return of Col. Mucci with the information that a unit was to penetrate the enemy lines, move inland 24 miles, and attack a POW stockade, release and bring back American prisoners.

The personnel selected was "C" Company under the command of Capt. Prince, plus the second platoon from "F" Company under 1st Lt. Murphy.

On the morning of the 28th of January this group was briefed and immediately transferred seventy miles southwest to the front line town of Guimba, held by a unit of the 6th Division. They detrucked and then proceeded on foot through the enemy lines, outside of town, and marched approximately 24 miles to the town of Plateros east of Guimba, in which sheadquarters of the guerillas operating in that area is located. There a team of Alamo Scouts joined them. It seemed funny at the end of the briefing that the volunteers from the other companies began to swarm Col. Mucci, and although, he stated that he could not, and would no take any, lst Sgt. Hedrick of "A" Company, lst/Sgt Bosard and S/Sgt. Moore of "F" Company and Sgt. Killough of "E" Company somehow managed to change his mind and were included in the force.

Meanwhile 6th Army Headquarters notified us today that we would furnish a guard company to accompany the advance echelon of their Hq, when it moved to its new location. So, with the defense of Santiago Island completed, it was decided to withdraw "E" Company from that island in order to have sufficient troops in camp to fill the guard called for, and all patrol activity was to cease except on Santiago Island.

On January 28th at 1800, "E" Company returned to the camp, which fitted right in as a six man security guard for the 16th Signal Bn. Relay station located at San Miguel had to be sent. This guard is to remain there until further orders.

On the 29th of January, Major Garret our executive officer was called to the Sixth Army Headquarters and when he returned, he told us that approximately one thousand Japs had penetrated our lines and were marching toward three main bridges with intentions of destroying them. As Guerrilla reports have a notorious inclination to exaggerate, we are suspicious, but "A" Company under the command of Capt." Lover and the 1st Platoon of "D" Company commanded by Lt. Anderson formed with full combat equipment and departed by truck. At the town of Bayam Bang, a patrol of "A" Company contacted six Japanese soldiers and killed three and wounded two. Sgt. Rongstead who commanded the patrol accounted for the first Jap with the first shot right through the forehead.

On the 31st of January, Captain Lever in addition to his own troops was given a company of Infantry, a company of Tanks, and a Reconnaissance Troop under his control to be used as he saw fit. Throughout the day there was intermittent fire and the one platoon engaged the Japanese in a field of Coogan grass. They were fired upon and in the ensuring fight two enemy were killed and one wounded. There was no further contacts made during the remainder of the day.

At 1630 a jeep pulled into camp, occupied by two rough looking characters, carrying a three day growth of beard on their faces, plus dirt and dust and carrying their shoes in their hands. It took a few seconds to recognize the pair as being Colonel Mucci and It. Indexe, returning from the mission of releasing the POW's. All present gathered around him in a state of ill concealed curiosity, anxiety and impatience. Them began one of the most fantastic stories of daring that any of us had heard in life or fiction and will not be forgotten in many years to come.

When the men entrucked at Guimba, they left a radio communication team with an SCR 694 to establish communication with the one being carried by our forces. Meanwhile the force to release the POW at Cabanatuan were including the Guerrilla Forces in their plans. Capt. Pajota, was to lend assistance as follows: Guerrilla troops were to establish and maintain all around security in depth. Civilians already in the area north of the Cabanatuan Cabu road were to remain there and any other personnel entering the area were to be held in the area until the rescue had been effected. All chickens were to be

penned up, and all dogs tied and muzzled. The guerrillas were to secure and organize an ox cart train of sufficient size to haul 200 men, and, finally food was to be obtained to be distributed to the forces. In addition the force was augmented by attaching Captain Pajota's group of 90 armed and 160 unarmed men. The latter to be used as litter bearers. Captain Jason and his Guerrilla force of 80 armed men were attached. With this force and a two day supply of "K" rations and normal combat equipment, the force moved out.

At Balincarin the Rangers met the Alamo Scout group who had not yet been able to secure definite information on the stockade, but had sent civilian and guerrilla scouts to maintain a continuous watch on it. A radio message was sent to Sixth Army requesting air coverage along the planned route of withdrawal, with the mission to attack trucks and tanks only. This cover it was believed might aid in materially retarding an armored or motorized pursuit, which was considered the greatest hazard to a successful withdrawal.

The force departed from Balincarin at 1800, 29 January 1945 for Pateros where the Guerrilla scouts reported that many Japs were spending the night in the stockade area, and also that a large body of enemy troops was moving north on the road past the camp. In view of this information, it was deemed advisable to postpone the attack one day.

At 0900 hours, 30 January, one man of the Alamo Scouts guided by a guerrilla Lieut Tombo, left the bivouac area to scout the prison camp for final definite information on the routine, personnel and installations in the camp. When they returned the main body moved out and the tasks assigned were as follows: The 80 armed guerrillas under Captain Jason would establish a road block 800 yards southwest of the POW camp to block enemy vehicles, tanks and troops moving from Cabanatuan towards Cabu. Anti tank protection would be furnished by a Ranger troupe of six men. Eighty armed guerrillas under Captain Pajota would establish a road block at a small bridge 300 yards north east of the POW camp to prevent enemy vehicles, tanks and troops them in Cabu from reenforcing the garrison. One Ranger would accompany this force to insure liason.

The second platoon, Company "F" would send a six man squad to destroy the pill box at the northeast corner of the stockade, a three man group to kill the sentry in the watch tower at the center of the east side, and a small group to kill the sentry in the watch tower at the southeast corner of the stockade. The remainder of the platoon would kill the enemy guards at the rear entrance of the stockade and in the nearby buildings, would then dispose of the Japs in the transient quarters, and would in addition prevent the enemy from moving into the section of the compound occupied by the prisoners.

The 1st plateon, Company "C" would force the front gate, push through rapidly, and destroy the enemy personnel, tanks and trucks

whose locations had been determined by the preliminary recommaissance. The lst section of this platoon would kill the guards posted at the gate and those sleeping at the guard houses nearby. The 2d section from initial positions on the right of the lst section would fire through the fence at enemy installations covering the lst section's attack. The weapons section would follow the lst section through the gate and then move straight ahead to destroy the tanks and trucks in the shed with bazooka fire. As the weapons section passed through the gate, the 2nd section would cease firing, move through the gate, and occupy positions from which they could cover the west edge of the stockade to prevent any enemy from escaping in that direction.

To the 2nd Platoon, Company "C" fell the task of opening the prisoners section of the camp and at the same time augmenting the fires of the 1st platoon, and of the 2nd platoon, Company "F". In accomplishing this the 1st section would follow the 1st platoon through the main gate, force the entrance to the prisoners enclosure, push rapidly to the rear of this enclosure and open fire on the buildings occupied by the Jap transients. The 2nd section would follow the 1st section in, and would occupy positions on the west flank of the enclosure and fire on the Jap officer's and enlisted men's quarters, thus preventing the enemy from entering the enclosure. The weapons section, in force reserve, and the Alamo Soout group would assemble the prisoners and direct them through the main gate.

Telephone lines leading from the camp would be cut by guerrilla Lieutenant Tombo on the north and a Ranger on the south while other designated Rangers would seek and destroy any radios in the camp.

Signal for the attack would be the opening burst of fire by the platoon attacking the rear entrance, since this force had the greatest distance to traverse in reaching its assault position. Signal for the withdrawal of the Rangers would be a red flare fired by the company commander after the last prisoner had cleared the stockade. The Rangers would then form a rear guard and assist in carrying the invalids and wounded. When the column had proceeded a mile from the camp, the company commander would fire a second red flare, the signal for the two guarrilla forces to withdraw from their road block positions and form a rear and flank guard for the column.

At 1700 January 30th, they moved to a final assembly area 700 yards north of the stockade. After a grueling march under a blazing tropical sun, the men then proceeded to crawl to their positions in anticipation of opening the attack.

At 1915, the 2nd plateon of Company "F" opened fire, and the attack began. The action proceeding exactly according to plan, the surprised enemy force was destroyed before it could organize effective resistance. At 2015, the company commander, after satisfying himself that all prisoners had been evacuated, fired the first red flare, the signal to commence the withdrawal. Captain Fisher, our

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battalion surgeon, while rushing to the aid of some of the litter cases was struck down by a burst of a Jap mortor shell and was severely injured. In that same s hell burst Cpl. Estesen, Pfc. Peters and T/Sgt. Alfinzo of the Alamo Scouts were injured. In removing the litter patients, the men were taking their fatigue jackets and using them for stretchers by placing their Ml rifles in the sleeves of their jackets. Some of the men picked up the prisoners who couldn't walk, carrying them in their arms, others on their backs until they reached the assembly area where the natives had brought up Carabec Carts. Meanwhile, approx imately 800 Japs moved up the road and ran into Captain Pajota's road blook and the guerrillas opened fire and many of the Japs were slaughtered in this trap, in which they retreated wildly in utter disorganization. Soon afterwards Jap tanks appeared and opened fire, but did not cross the bridge. When the signal for withdrawal came, Captain Pajota's men were still engaged with the enemy, but soon broke in small groups and melted away into the darkness. Some 24 hours later when the last of Captain Pajota's force had joined the column it was found that in accomplishing their mission, they had killed or wounded approximately 300 Japs while they themselves suffered only nine casualties which later turned out to be that none were killed. In this particular fire fight, a stray round struck Cpl Sweezey as he was helping evacuate the prisoners from the enclosure. Meanwhile, coming back the men had a bad time in getting the Carabac Carts to move fast as the muddy road kept spilling most of the carts and they had to hand wheel them most of the way.

The column halted at Plateros to reorganize, gather more carts and give food and water to the men. Cots were set up in the school house by the local guerrilla doctor, plus the medical men who were rescued. They treated the sick and wounded with medicine which was gathered from the country side.

Those rescued men able to walk were dispatched in groups guarded by Rangers to Balincarin as fast as they could be organized. The litter cases were transported in Carabac Carts. An American medical officer and an aid man both among those rescued, volunteered to remain at Plateros with Capt. Fisher and Cpl. Sweezey who could not be moved at the time. The Alamo Scout group and about eight Rangers, with a guerrilla force, remained to guard these men, and to construct a cub strip for possible evacuation of the wounded.

On the 31st of January, both Captain Fisher and Cpl. Sweezed died and were buried near Plateros where the natives renamed the place—Fisher Park and Sweezey Park. Thos of us who knew Captain Fisher and Cpl. Sweezey were heart broken and we knew that they would want us to carry on.

After much trouble with securing carts and carabaos to haul the rescued men and to get food and water from the civilians, we left Sibul where we contacted 6th Army who had assembled ambulances and trucks just for the purpose of evacuating the prisoners who had been rescued. They immediately dispatched these vehicles and removed the prisoners to an evacuation hospital where they were properly taken care of.

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Meanwhile, the men themselves returned to the base camp. The men were tired, dirty and scratched up from crawling so great a distance. They felt that they had done a good job, and all that they wanted was a good nights sleep and a good meal under their belt. (See S-3 Journal for narrative)

On February 1st, "F" Company was alerted, and under the command of Captain Shearon, left camp by truck on a mission. They were to patrol the Cabaruan hills where enemy troops were reported to have infiltrated. In one of "F" Company's engagements with the enemy, two men, Sgt. Troedel and S/Sgt. Comners were missing in action. The civilians were evacuating the barries in the hills, so it did not look like it would be a wild goose chase. If the civilians were running there are usually Japs around. (See S-3 Journal for Narrative)

On February 3, we were on the move again as "A" Company leaves this morning to establish a security guard for the advance echelon of 6th Army at Gerona. Company "B" who have just returned will join them later.

One of our patrols out of "D" Company killed three Japs adjacent to the 1178th Engineers in the Port Sual Area. So far we have had no casualties out of the three companies on patrol.

The 1th of February was a day to remember as we had as our guests some of the prisoners who were freed and the stories they told were heart breaking. The camp was full of correspondents, photographers and radio men who were heaping praise on the men who accomplished this feat. The men were so proud that if it lasted one more day, more buttons would have to be sewed on and larger hat sizes secured. To top it all off, a message came from General Mac Arthur te Gen Krueger commanding 6th Army and this message was the crowning glory. The message stated I quote, "Your commando raid was magnificient and reflects extraordinary credit to all concerned. I have awarded the DSC to the Commander, Col. Mucci; the Silver Star to all other officers and the Bronze Star to all enlisted men. Request these awards be presented by you in person in whatever ceremony you may desire." The men are walking on air.

With T/Sgt. Conners and Sgt. Troedel still missing, "F" Company and "C" Company who had relieved "E" Company continued the search for them as the men would not rest until they could find out for sure what became of them. After three days of search, they found T/Sgt. Conner's body, but no trace of Sgt. Toredel. It was puzzling as they fell near each other. All of the personal effects and clothes of Sgt. Toredel was scattered around. The next day "C" Company went out again and found him in a Carabac hole all shot up and still alive. He was rushed to the hospital and his only words were, "I guess I'm to tough to be killed."

Here it is Feb 8th and miracles of miracles we found out that the "Rotation Plan" is not a legand. Capt. Moss and Pfc. Marshall left for

reassignment in the States and Pfc. Sedgie Smith left for furlough back home. It's not much, but at least it's a start. We'er still sending out patrols and mopping up the Cabaruan Hills.

February 10th will always be remembered as the battalion suffered a great loss today, and it was felt down to the lowest rank. It. Col. Mucci left to command another organization. We've been suspecting this for a long time, but hoped it would never come about. It didn't do the morale of the men any good as he founded our organization and trained us. We shall miss him. Major Garrett our Executive Officer, assumed command.

On February 12th, the Cabaruan Hills were finally cleared of Japs and all companies reported into camp.

Just when we had really fixed up a good camp at Colasie, we were told to move to San Fernando where the 6th Army was to establish there permanent Headquarters. "A" and "B" Company were sent there and they were perfectly content as they are quartered in the heart of a fairly large city and in houses with all the comforts of home.

Capt. Simons the Company Commander of  $^{8}$  B\*\* Company was appointed executive officer and It. Strausbaugh made C. O. of  $^{8}$  B\*\* Company.

On the 15th of February, the battalion was given a mission that every single member of the battalion wanted to be included in. We were to send two (2) Officers and eight (8) enlisted men to the States for 21 days leave at their homes and a forty day tour of the States to further the interest in the war in this theater. The reaction of the men when told of the coming event were really something. They were stunned first and afterwards, they were just plain hilarious.

The next week was one of routine and when on the 23rd of February heard of a mission, all were ready to go. Company "A" was alerted and they were told that they would form the spearhead for the 37th Division to assault the walled city in Manila. When the 37th Division heard it was a company of Rangers who were to do this, they changed their plans as they said we had toomuch publicity now. I don't blame them as it would look silly for a company of sixty-five men to show the way for a division. In the week to follow the rest of the battalion moved up to San Fernando and between cleaning up our living area and going on patrols which were dry runs, we were kept pretty busy. The native population are always reporting Japs and they keep us on the run. It's like the old story of "Cry Wolf".

We are now garrisoned in twelve houses of fairly large size and in good condition directly across from Headquarters 6th Army. Work was immediately begun to clean up these filthy rat holes and make them liveable. The previous occupants, Mips, were a very dirty mob and made no effort to maintain sanitation.

On March 3rd all members of the battalion who participated in the Frison Raid were decorated personally by Lt. Gen. Krueger, Commander of

6th Army. He wan wonderful as he pinned the decoration on each man and shook his hand. He had a kind word for every one.

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We received our first beer issue of six cans today and it sure hit the spot. Living in this fairly large city with its dens of inequities, our venerial rate has started to climb. I should say started as there was no chance to contact any in New Guinea. The battalion Medical Department is taking the necessary steps to forestall anymore. The men themselves have not done anything to discredit the organization, but for some the temptation is too much and a few minor infractions of the regulations are broken. One thing that has been our privilege to have is fresh vegatables. The first for over two years.

For the next week our routine was still guarding 6th Army Head-quarters and the usual patrols.

On the 10th of March, Major Garrett, was called to 6th Army Hqs. and on his return he told us a hot mission was assigned to us, and as usual everyone wanted to go. Companies MAM and MBM and a platoon of MFM Company would compose the force and their mission is to penetrate the enemy lines and reconnoiter a reported enemy strong hold of approximately 8,000 to 10,000 men. This area was north and south of the Ipo Aqueduct-Metropolitan Road.

Patrols from the 112th Cavalry and 6th Division had made numerous attempts without success to penetrate this area, but each time had been picked up by the Japs and had to return to their lines. The area itself is mountainous, with thick jungle in parts. Maps of the area were available, but inaccurate to a large degree and the terrain was the worst yet encountered. All personnel were briefed before departure at the base camp and they were especially werned that they were not combat patrols and as a result would not fire at anyone unless absolutely unavoidable. We traveled by truck through the 1st Inf. advanced lines and bivousced approximately 2000 yards in front of them. The same day five patrols were dispatched to recommoiter the area. The maximum they were to stay out was three days and three nights and not to try to enter our perimeter during the night. During the day it was very hot and at night very cold. We were plagued with huge flies all the time as near by were hundreds of dead Japs and destroyed vehicles which we presumed were destroyed by the Air Corps.

During the daylight hours we were fired upon by Jap artillery which were also shelling two companies of Infantry farther back. A patrol led by Lt. Kruger spotted them the first day out, and said he could hear the Jap officer give fire orders as he was so close. Upon his return, Lt. Kruger was taken top on a Fiper Cub and a battery of Artillery brought in. He did some accurate spotting as all guns were knocked out but one. He also had them shell a Jap bivouac area. Lt. Kelly's patrol walked right through a Jap perimeter and being at night, most of them were asleep. He said it was peculiar as some of the Japs

were awake, but paid no attention to them. They drew no fire and brought back the information wanted. A patrol under Capt. Lever, ran into a huge number of Japs and in the ensuing fire fight some Japs were killed, but how many, could never be ascertained as the men took off for obvious reasons. It. Strandfeldt, who was on the same patrol claimed

The other two patrols met up on the 3rd day, and during the night they decided to change perimeters as they were afraid they were spotted. It was wisely done as one hour after changing, the Japs attacked only to find them gone. They moved up close to our bivouse area and not wanting to enter our perimeter at night, they spent the night sleeping amongst the dead Japs. The only comment they had was that they kept them warm as the nights were very cold. It seems that the hand of God guarded us as out of all this successful reconnaissance and danger, we hadn't had one casualty.

that they were so well dressed and fed it looked like they were ready to

mount guard for the Emperor.

Back at camp, the same routine of guarding 6th Army Headquarters and security patrols prevailed. On the 18th March, Major Garret, our battalion commander was ordered to report to General Eddelman, G-3, 6th Army. Another mission, behind the enemy lines has been givenus. This looks like a tough one. "D" and "E" Companies were alerted. After four days of waiting, both companies departed for a special recommaissance with I Corps Sector, for G-2 of 6th Army. They were traveling light and were issued the new type Field Jacket. The rumors have it the mountains. Their mission was that "D" Company is to penetrate the enemy's line and continue for three days to arrive at a designated location from which further recommaissance will be made. "E" Company will also cross the enemy's line at another point and gather all available information as to what and why the 32nd Division has been stopped and have been unable to advance since being halted. (See S-3 Journal for Marrative)

On the 26th of March, the battalion commander was ordered to report to 6th Army in person. Immediately all personnel began to check guns, gear and clothing. General Krueger who has been visiting the 6th Division headquarters this morning asked Major Garrett, our battalion commander if he would send a company to them for reconnaissance work.

"F" Company departed to the CP of the 6th Division with the usual light equipment.

successful. On the last evening, before departure, they spent the night in an Infantry Company's perimeter, where the Japs dropped 155mm mortors into the perimeter. Sgt. Mortenson had both legs amputated from mortor fragments, and Sgt. White and Pfc. Dykes were lightly wounded, by the same round that accounted for Sgt. Mortenson. Sgt. Mortenson soon died, but both the other men were hospitalized, but should return to duty shortly. The effect of these mortors is so great that the concussion will kill our men in their fox holes. It. Murphy was blown completely out of his hole by one of these mortor shells. Luckily it didn't do

any harm to him, but knock him silly for a few moments.

With three companies out on reconnaissance, the other three companies were still guarding 6th Army Headquarters, and go on the usual patrols where they are picking Japs up one and two at a time.

It. Kelley of "F" Company had an interesting experience when on a patrol on very difficult terrain, fifty or more Jap soldiers walked right into the middle of his platoon column. Being at night, the Japs did not notice them. It. Kelley, acting quickly on the fact that his recomaissance had been halted and the fight could not be avoided, became the attacker, ordering all twenty-nine men of his platoon to lob grenades. He set the example and let go. Each man had two grenades. The group of Japs had not time to disperse, and fifty-eight grenades from a column of twenty-nine men at a few feet resulted in a grand concentration. It. Kelley immediately had his platoon fall back one hundred yards and for the next few hours kept changing his position to avoid the possibility of a concentration of knee mortors falling upon him. The Japs could be heard chattering, squaling, and making stretchers. In the morning light, eleven enemy dead were counted.

On the 7th of April, "F" Company returned from their reconnaissance that had been patroling night and day, spending two and three days at a time behind the enemy lines. Ten days of little sleep, with no change of clothing and little opportunity of shaving, gives them the appearance of a murderous looking crew. The men were certainly glad to be back.

By the 12th of April, "D" and "E" Company minus the commanding officer, Capt. Gray of Company "D" who was on recommaissance in the Bokad Area had returned and both companies as a whole had several narrow escapes during there recommaissance behind the enemy lines deep in the mountains of the Baguio, Trinidad, Atok, Ambuclao, Bokad area, and all seemed satisfied with the various exciting incidents that occurred. The men were glad that no men were lost on their mission.

With all the companies back at our base camp, our guard and patrol responsibility has lessoned for each company and being with more time on their hands the men were cautioned about the venerial disease rate that has risen. The Medical Department and officers have started a series of lectures, pictures and also the benefit of the prophilactic. There may be serious consequences for not taking care of ones self.

The "Rotation Plan" has raised its ugly head again. The battalion has found that their quota is one enlisted man for Rotation and one for Furlough to leave shortly. That the battalion will carry on with this loss is obvious.

On the 15th of April, another mission was assigned to us-this being a combat reconnaissance in the Dingalan Bay Area in Eastern Luzon for I Corps. It seems that a large number of Japs are working their way down the Eastern coast of Luzon and "A" and "C" Company were assigned

to this mission. This Dingalan Bay Area is very mountainous and full of rain forests and traveling through this terrain makes it very difficult. It seems to be that the isolated Jap Garrisons in this particular area are trying to withdraw to their main body of troops in the Baguio area. Their job is to prevent this and to work in coordination with a battalion of Infantry stationed there now. The hunting was very good and after spending fifteen days there, "F" Company relieved them to do the same kind of work.

"F" Company is now operating with Guerrillas and they are being very successful in eliminating the stray Japs being found.

On the 7th of May, that battalion commander was informed that our battalion had been given the job of forming two nondescript Filipino Army Companies of Guerrillas into a well trained body of men. Our battalion Master Sergeant and ten picked N.C.O.'s will compose the cadre. It is very hard for the cadre to make themselves understood, as most of these Guerrillas do not speak English, but they are very cooperative. Capt. Shearon and M/Sgt. Copenhaver are in charge of this cadre. Copenhaver is looked upon in awe, and it embarrasses him to have the guerrillas keep saluting him; he tells them to stop it, but to no avail. He states that they will work out into a very fine body of men.

It seems to be that more and more wild goose chases are coming into our battalion, as the Philippine Populace seem to see Japs everywhere they look, and meanwhile, they have us send patrols all over the country side.

On the 25th of April, one of these patrols left, seemingly on we wild some chase under command of Lt. Evans. Lt. Evans has another wild goose chase under command of Lt. Evans. been with us only a week or so and is fresh from the States from the Infantry School at Fort Benning. All the officers seem to want to watch him in action, so they accompany him on this patrol. When we left there, two sailors had stowed away on the truck and upon reaching the area, we found that one hundred or so Guerrillas armed with Carbines, M1's, Machine guns, and sub machine guns, had bottle up quite a few Jap Officers -- all rank included, and were waiting for us to dispose of them which is normal for most guerrillas. They were told to remain where they were until we were through. A base of fire and a manuvering force was established and the attack began. Lt. Evans commanded a small manuvering force and under covering fire reached the flank position on the left of the pill box. Turning aside, he had discovered that the battalion commander joined him. Major Garrett bet him a beer that he would account for the first Jap. As he spoke one raised up from the pill box no more than eight feet away, and started to bring his rifle to his shoulder. A bullet from Lt. Evan's M1 put an end to that Nip and a second one jumped up and Lt. Evans shot him. It seems that the Major lost two beers. Pfc. Stinson, then threw two grenades right into the pill box and with the constant fire upon the pill box all Japs were exterminated. On examination of the pill box brought loud exclamation from all. There were seventeen

Jap Officers and lying amongst them were seventeen gleaming sabers. It is believed that this is the first time in the history of the Pacific War, that such a concentration of officers has ever been accounted for in such a short time and in such a manner. It all lasted approximately five minutes.

On the 30th of April, which was pay day for both officers and enlisted men a talk on the benefits of the Soldier's Deposits were impressed upon the men as a good thing, and a great deal of the men have taken advantage of this as it will put temptation out of the way. Everyone is surprised on the good behavior of the men.

Instead of running in and out off every wild goose chase, we have decided to have a roving patrol, consisting of one radio patrol car, and one three-quarter ton weapons carrier, and one officer and twelve men. This patrol was a good idea as it will control the number of rumors we have been forced to investigate in the past. Our Command Post radio here at San Fernando will be constantly in contact with this patrol and it will save us a lot of work. The accuracy of the reports of the natives and other sources is still something to be yearned for.

On the eight of May, "B" Company had been alerted to relieve "F" Company at Dingalan Bay. The entire battalion outside of "B" Company seemed to be back on routine garrison duty still guarding 6th Army Headquarters and numerous patrols.

On the 12th of May, the conversation of off duty hours has turned from food, sex and liquids to the counting of credits to the hope of being declared surplus.

On the 19th of May, we finished training the two companies of guerrillas assigned to us. After a bad start with supplies and equipment being hard to get, the NCO's and the officers of the battalion did a grand job.

General Krueger with his G-3, General Eddelman along with his aides arrived to inspect the camp and the men. The battalion commander and especially the NCO's are still a glow from General Krueger's praise and satisfaction.

On the 20th of May, "D" Company left to relieve "B" Company in the Dingalan Bay area. It seems that this particular area is very hard to operate from as between the myriads of insects, rain and high mountains it deemed advisable to keep changing the men. Throughout the rest of the month of May, the usual routine of the camp was carried

On 29th of May, "B" Company departed for a new mission for I Corps.

This one to form a small task force which will operate in enemy territory.

against a force of Japanese, nine thousand strong, composed of the Jap 103rd Division and the 80th Brigade. At present no American Troops are in that area. Only elements of the Philippine Army are operating in this area. Be Company has a rough trip ahead of them as they have approximately 450 miles to go and the roads have been under heavy rains for the last three days. The engineers have been commandeered to precede them with sorapers and bull dozers to improve the road. The task force was assembled at Candon, Illocos Sur and from there proceeded to Lacag, Illocos Norte where final instructions and briefing were given. At Lacag, one of the men met a Filipino friend of his from the States, and through him, he had ninety-six quarts of ice cream made to be served to practically all the task force. It certainly hit the spot as all the men had been eating were "C" rations and 10-1. From Lacag, the convoy proceeded to Ballesteros where a CP was established. (See S-3 Journal for Narrative)

On June 4th, Company "A" was placed under the control of I Corps. They departed to take up a position at Camiling. Tarlac where they will begin combat reconnaissance patrols to clear out groups of enemy troops living in that area. On the 7th of June, Company "C" was placed under the control of I Corps and left to take up positions at Tibag, Tarlac. Each company has three half tracks at their disposal. It seems that "A" and "C" Company are having a field day as everytime they go out they meet up with Japs. If they keep that up souvenirs may become a glut on the battalion market. The more souvenirs we get the happier the Navy as they are our best customers. We'er liable to wind up with a Battleship in our T/O1

On one of these particular missions, Sgt. Swain of "C" Company while searching a Jap that he had just killed, hit the jack pot. As the contents of the deceased pocket revealed to Sergeant Swain's startled eyes a roll of American pesos to the tune of three hundred. He proceeded to divide this amongst the patrol.

On June 10th, our Battalion Commander, Major Garrett, was promoted to Lt. Colonel. The men in the organization are well pleased as we feel he has earned it with a job well done.

On the 29th of June, Company "B" rejoined us after their mission to northern Luson. The men were tired and sick as they had been living on "C" rations for approximately thirty days. Their morale was high as a result of the humorous incident that happened up there. Company "B", had taken Aparri and the adjoining air strip, and information had been forwarded to higher headquarters, but it had not reached the lith Air borne in time to call off the jump. The paratroopers were briefed to expect heavy opposition and when they landed and founded, all that they saw was a bunch of grinning Rangers waiting for them. We felt pretty bad as they had eighty jump casualties which we felt was unnecessary as they could have just as easily come in from the sea. Company "B" was relieved and returned to base camp via C-47's which was another experience for men of the battalion as this is the first time so large a group from the battalion has been moved by air.

Where it had taken them ten days to reach their objective, they were flown out in 55 minutes.

With all companies in, we were informed that today, July 1st, 6th Army is relieved of further operations and 8th Army will take over. It also was the end of the old order for the men of the battalion. The "Point System" is in effect and we have 215 men with more than the required number of points. Of these, forty-six men are leaving soon to the United States. As a result of all this we have received 253 replacements, and two thirds of them have just reached nineteen--Physically they are much smaller than the original men of this battalion and as a consequence they are being kidded. They, the new men are cognizant of this and they loudly proclaim they will uphold the fighting tradition set down by the men gone and leaving. We believe this and with "On to Tokyo" as our desired ambition, we hope that the benevolance of Him above shall continue to guide our destiny as He has in the past.

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
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Historical Report - 6th Hanger Bastalic

SUBJECT: HISTORICAL REPORT

Commanding General, Headquarters Sixth Army, APO 442
Attention Historical Section

The fellowing is a historical narrative for the 6th Ranger Inf. Bn. August 15, 1945 to Nevember 30, 1945

The war is ended! With all the peace feelers put out by Japan and with the final ending of the war a quiet elation and satisfaction has swept the Battalian. The men have received this news with dignity as there were no emetional out bursts or any spentaneau celebrations. In effect it seemed to say, "Well, we made it."

All the men with 89 points are preparing for their departure. The date of departure has been set up the 20th of August as all shipping has been temperarily frezen on account of the ending of the war. These men finally left on the morning of the 20th August and emetions were very hard to control.

These of us left watched this group of 139 men leave with a heavy heart as we saw the core of the Battalien sent home. These men were with us from the conception of the 6th Ranger Bn. and previous to that in the 98th F. A. Pack.

With the ending of the war our training program has been greatly curtailed. The rumers have it that its strictly garrison from here on out. All the men have a feeling we're going to Japan as occupation troops and the wild rumers to where we're going and what we are going to do would asteund the average listener.

The three Company's that were at our training camp at BamBam were ordered to terminate their training, disselve the company and return to our base damp.

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The 30th of August found all training at an end and with the new replacements coming in, drilling seems to be the order of the day.

It seems very definite that our next move will be Japan as 27 men and 2 efficers were picked to be a special guard for General Kreuger, when he goes to Japan.

On the 5th of September 58 of the old men left for home. Very few of the old men remain and most of these men are likely to leave as soon as they have reduced the points once again.

nere at our base camp drilling and practice reviews are being stressed as our preparations are being made to embark for Japan. The men who were picked for General Krueger's guard are under special training every day under the guiding hand of Lt. Jernigan and Lt. Querie.

Preparations for our departure continues and everyone is packing semething and getting their equipment in shape for a long sea veyage. It seems that everytime we have to move it really pours, but in the final da, of our crating and packing the sun shown in its full glory. On the 14th of September at 0915 our convey was formed and with all the Battalian personnel in 10 trailers and a motor cycle escert the procession started for Fior No. 11 and amidst a steady down pour started to lead on APA #77. The usual chaes and switching from one compartment to another kept the men quite susy. The ship we are on is equipped to show movies and entertainment is planned. The best part is that there will be no blackout.

After all the personnel and equipment were leaded en beard the ship, the APA #77 pulled out to Manila Harber and anchored. In the details leading the ship 2 men from "A" Company were injured when a cable broke and both men were hespitalized.

On the 15th September at 1330 hours the ship get under way and when Cerrigeder at the entrance to Manila Harper was being passed most of the men


crowded to the railing to get a last glimpse of the Island Fertress. The sea is a little rough and a few cases of sea sickness occur. Details have been alloted to the various units aboard and everything is running very smoothly. There was a general drill which received a hearty cooperation from the men. The ship is preceeding to Lingayen Gulf to meet up with the rest of the convey. We heard that it will be quite large.

At 0630 hours on the 16th September our ship arrived at the Lingayen culf and proceeded to join the other elements comprising the convoy. All day the ships moved from one end of the harber to the other in an effort to secure their position in the convoy.

The next three days found us still anchored in the Lingayen Gulf. During this period amphibious training was held and the men took to these exercises with alacrity. The morale of the men is very good and everyone is trying to guess when we pull out. The ships personnel are certainly doing everything in their power to keep us entertained with movies, band playing and entertainment.

On the 20th September at 0630 hours we left in convey towards Japan. Our convey consisted of approximately 24 APA's and AKA's plus a communication ship. The weather was very clear and a brilliant meen shone at night. The usual entertainment continued and outside of our everyday drill the veyage was just routine duties and the u sual activities of troops aboard a troopship.

The 24th of September was a day of preparation as we are to land temorrow. All units drew their ammunition and "K" kations. Instructions were held from time to time throughout the day to familiarize the men on the plan of debarkation, landing on shere, setting up in their respective areas and duties assigned them for unleading the supplies. They reported ever the loud speaker system that an accompanying Destroyer had destroyed a mime to the East of the convey. Between the Jap mines and our own mines it should be interesting.



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In the early merning of the 25th of September we reached the coast of Japan and heard we were to unload at Wakayama Beach, Honshu, Japan. It seemed to a let of us that we had come a long way and was the termination of a cherished dream. We never thought that landing here would be as easy as it was. We all expected to get here semeday but with a loaded rifle in our hands.

We were all set to put into effect the initial phase of the landing when the already surfaced units circling in the assembly area and awaiting the signal to depart were notified to return to the ship and await further orders. The landing had been postponed until later in the afternoon.

Major Arthur D. Simons, our Executive Officer who had been in the States on DS joined the Battalien aboard ship this morning after traveling half the length and breadth of Japan trying to find our landing spet. Immediately Lt. Cel. Garrett and Major Simons went ashore and proceeded to Kyote our next destination. During our waiting to disembark the vehicles and equipment were unleaded.

At 1715 hours the first group started to debark. This time it was the "McCey" and the first wave beached at 1745 hours. The landing was a wet one.

The second wave beached at approximately 1830 hours.

"A" and "D" Companies remained on the ship to unload the supplies while the remaining Companies unleaded on the beach. All the companies that came ashere spent the night on the beach. It was damp and chilly and the fires lewed for miles up and down the beach. The ships in the harber were se numerous and well lighted that it gave one the impression of a well lighted large city back in the States. It was a welcomed sight and for most of the men it revived eld memeries.

The 26th of September we were still unleading our beats and everyone really pitched in. The tide was high and a good many of the men worked in

water up to their thighs. The work was a todious affair and the sudden change of temperature didn't help matters as some of the men developed heavy colds. Our equipment was spread all ever the beach and the chaotic condition of the beach didn't help much. Throughout the 27th of September it was wet and miserable and the men have been working the clock around unleading the supplies. This work is continuing as "F" Company departed for Kyete to set up for the Battalien.

On the 28th of September word arrived that we would leave for Kyete.

After a last pelice up of our bivouac area we moved out to a rendezvous area.

Upon our arrival it was made known to us that we wouldn't leave until the fellowing morning.

On the 29th of September at 0630 hours elements of the remaining companies marched to the depot at Wakayama and boarded the train for Kyote. At 1000 hours we left Wakayama enroute to Kyote. After  $4\frac{1}{2}$  hours of riding we arrived at Kyote at 1530 hours unleaded our gear outside of the station and awaited transpertation to our new home.

The Japanese Cemmander of the military post we are to occupy surrendered to Lt. Col. Garrett yesterday. It's a huge place with every sort of facilities for a comfortable stay but the usual Jap dirt prevails all ever. It seems where ever the Japs live they turn it into a "rats nest." The men set to work cleaning up the barracks which are lousy with fleas and rats and DDT is being brought in to fumigate the area and buildings. The administration building now occupied by Hq's Co. was in the best condition, but still requires a great deal of effort to put it in class "A" shape.

The remainder of the companies, one plateen from each, remained at the rail head at Wakayama beach to load our supplies.

The name of the barracks we are moved into is Fujinimori Barracks and it housed a Jap Infantry outfit out of there 37th Corp. Lt. Col. Garrett, our

Commanding Officer, immediately changed the name of the post to Camp Fisher.

All the eld men said he couldn't have made a better choice. Capt. Fisher our former Medical Officer who was killed at Cabanatuan was leved and revered by all the men.

Our first night here was spent in tents for most of the personnel as the deleusing of this place has started. Communication lines are being restrung through out the area.

They may call this country the "Land of the Rising Sun", but where the sun is supposed to shine is beyond us as rain and more rain greets us every day. Deleusing and the preparing of our respective barracks for living quarters continues. The kitchen is set up in a temperary place and hot meals are served instead of rations. Our mail started to arrive and we have even had a show. The remainder of our men have arrived from the railhead at Wakayama Beach with all our equipment and every company is hard at work putting their area in real shape.

In the two weeks to follow garrison life here at Camp Fisher is in full swing. The men are hard at work putting the post into a place to live in. It seems that our job here is to quell any disturbance that may arise. We are the only tactical force assigned to the 6th Army in this area. As of the 31st of October not once have we been called out for any disturbances. The people are very decile and cooperative. As a result of all this it has been work at the post and time to see the sights.

By the 1st of Nevember the points have been lewered again and mere of the eld men are going home. Our retreat parades continue and with practice parades in the merning as General Krueger, Commanding Officer of Sixth Army, is coming here to review the men. It will be the first time since he has been everseas that a review is held for him.

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As the end of Nevember drame to a close a review was held for General Krueger and General Eddleman. "is G-3 and both officers seemed well satisfied with the performance of the men. More of the old men have gene home on the point system and at present about 40 men of the old volunteers remain. These men should be leaving seen as our organization is in the process of inactivation. By the 30th of December the 6th mangers will be inactivated.

Our Battalien at present is at half strength and with no trouble from the Japanese the men here are pulling Interior Guard as their only duty. A sport program and scholastic activities take up most of the remaining time until they who are left are sent to fill up the organizations which are remaining here as an occupational force.

During the menth of Nevember a transition takes place here at Camp Fisher. When we moved in here a more decrepit, filthy hole never was encountered that was supposed to be an Army rest undamaged by war. After the barracks were . fumigated the men really went to work to make them liveable. Steves were brought in fer warmth and placed uniformly in each reem. Each building eccupied by treeps was completely dene ever until it was as good er better than the barracks in a pest back home. Each area was landscaped, trees planted, air raids shelters filled up and smoothed ever and paint applied where ever needed. A parade ground was fixed and is being used for both parades and athletic activities. When the Japanese Army moved out they inactivated most of the mechanical equipment but by our own ingenuity we have here en the pest a tailer shep, shee shep, machine shep, laundry, pressing shop, and every ether facilities to carry out our ewn maintenance. Two ef the empty barracks were cleaned and fixed up to house a shew which is not only pleasant to see a picture in but pleasant to be in. Another barracks has our P.X. on the ground floor and upstairs a Non-Coms club which is comparable to most back home. Our streets in the camp area were smeethed out and named after the deceased Generals of this war. To sum up the work the

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men did was to see and hear the Japanese efficer who commanded this post when he observed all this. He was staggered and couldn't believe his eyes. He had nothing but praise and said he wouldn't have believed it if he hadn't seen it.

As the men have more of an eppertunity to get around and see the city of Kyete and the different sections of the country they cannot fathem the attitude of the people who were recently our enemies doing everything to make our stay pleasant. The regimentation of a people who were ruled by eligarchy for centuries seem out of another world to we who have had so many liberties. The mixture of crient and the modern bewilders one. After seeing what the Japanese people had and the way they live one cannot understand how they had the audacity to plunge their country into a conflict with a country like ours. The country itself is and enigma to us who have had the freedom and the conveniences of our own country. The Japanese people accept all the restrictions and restraints with a steeism of a trained animal. Everywhere one looks the poverty of the people leave a lasting impression. Maybe in the days to come their way of life will be a little better and with their wounds bound will find a place in the world of free people.



With utter disregard for the dangers involved, he led his men over the ground in a daring and capable manner, fully realizing that at any time the Japs might observe him and that the virtually complete lack of cover would render him defenseless. He then worked his men to within twenty-five yards of the Jap position before launching a hand grenade assault. By his courage, coolness and soldierly skill, Sergeant Watson enabled his unit to make a successful attack, killing all Japs without suffering a single casualty among his own men. 

Technical Sergeant THOMAS H. CONNERS, 20760924, Infantry, United. States Army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 4 February 1945. Sergeant Conners was second in command of a combat patrol when it was engaged in a fire fight with an enemy force of unknown strength. During the fight which ensued one of the scouts was seriously wounded and lay where he fell approximately 10 yards to the front of the enemy positions. After aiding in deploying the patrol, Sergeant Conners exposed himself fearlessly to intense rifle, machine gun and mortar fire, in a gallant attempt to save the wounded comrade. Before he could accomplish the rescue his courageous act cost him his life. Sergeant Conner's heroic and valiant act reflects great credit upon himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Next of kin: Mr. J. H. Despite the intense mortar and machine gun fire laid down by the enemy, Sergeant Harris, armed with a Browning automatic rirle, voluntarily moved forward to a vantage point and poured a deadly base of fire into the Japanese. As a result of his courageous and skilful action, Sergeant Harris killed at least five enemy troops, destroyed a mortar and a light machine gun, thus enabling his platoon to withdraw and reorganize without further casualties. 

### Award of the Silver Star

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, I Corps, to the following named officer and enlisted men for gallantry in action against the enemy at Aparri, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 21 June 1945. Immediately prior to the assault and occupation of Aparri it was necessary to send a patrol into the city to make a complete reconnaissance of the enemy system of defense and to locate a safe portion of the beach on which the main force could effect a landing. Because of the extremely hazardous nature of this mission volunteers were requested for the patrol. Without hesitation First Lieutenant Ewans, Staff Sergeant Williams, Sergeant Griffith and Private First Class Lalande volunteered and at 0200 hours the patrol crossed the Cagayen River under cover of darkness and entered the city. Although continuously exposed to the probability of being discovered by enemy they completed their mission and returned to the beach where they signaled to their company to effect a landing. From the information the patrol obtained the company was able to quickly and safely occupy the city and establish a strong perimeter defense in order to repulse any possible counterattack by the enemy. At dawn the patrol again volunteered to lead a detachment which assaulted and secured the Aparri Airfield. The courage and gallantry displayed by the members of the patrol made possible the closing of the last supply and escape port for the enemy and thereby contributed much to the success of the Corps in the Luzon campaign:





Major (then Captain) ARTHUR D. SIMONS, 0410287, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Leyte and Luzon, Philippine Islands, ffom 17 October 1944 to 1 July 1945. As a company commander in a Ranger Battalion, Major Simons landed on Homonhon Island three days prior to the main attack in Leyte, leading vigorous reconnaissance patrols and secured the island for our forces. On 1 November 1944, he led his company across twelve miles of open sea, moving by native bancas at night to attacks the enemy force located on Suluan Island. In spite of high seas and adverse weather conditions the entire company was landed safely through the constant supervision and initiative of this officer. The next night he personally headed an assault on the strongly fortified lighthouse. In this action he was the first man to scale the four hundred foot cliff and engage the enemy in rifle fire. On 15 January 1945, he again led a small task force to Santiago Island, Luzon. Although this island was reported to be in the control of a superior number of the enemy, he fearlessly led a night reconnaissance landing by rubber boats from a Navy P. T. Boat and returned with sufficient information to allow the main body to land. During May 1945, he led patrols throughout the Dingaian Bay Area over torturous trails and through enemy territory. These patrols contacted enemy evacuating from Infanta and succeeded in closing the northern escape route from the enemy stronghold. The following is a narrative account of the attacks on Homonhon and Suluan Islands, Philippine Group, during the months of October and Nov-

ember, 1944, by Company "B," 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion:

"The troops aboard the APD USS HERBERT were piped to General Quarters at 0830 18 October 1944. Aboard the converted flush-deck destroyer were the men of Company "B," oth Ranger Infantry Battalion, the 21st Ground Observer Platoon, an Amphibious Scout party of one officer and two men, and an Army-Navy fire support officer.


"For the past 24 hours the HERBERT, a destroyer and a frigate had been lying off the coast of Homonhon Island in Leyte Bulf waiting for the typhoon to lift so a landing could be made. The troops, in spite of the delay, were calm and even unconcerned about the landing. Navy personnel had long since remarked that these were the calmest group of men they had put ashore during the six operations they had participated in. Great boilers of coffee had been prepared the night before to give the men something to do while they fidgeted the night away before the landing. The men had gone to bed and an amazed Navy crew took the still-filled tanks of cold coffee out shaking their heads. Now at last the ship's address system clanged out the GQ that meant 'end of the line." The men looked at one another and hurried below to get their gear on and check weapons for the last time.

"At 0900 the voice from the bridge came down cool and distinct, 'First wave prepare to debark." The 1st Assault Platoon boiled up the ladders and spilled out over the deck to the davits. The boats were lowered away and the 3d Blatoon was loaded into the remaining two boats. The plywood LCPR's circled 700 yards offshore, churning the water, in a frenzy to get headed for the not-too-distant beach. The Boat Officers' flag dipped. Men crouched down in the boats. The boats ran ahead, two abreast in two minature waves, and headed for the narrow coral entrance that would admit only a pair of these little craft at one time.

"As the boats surged forward the naval barrage rattled out to the shore line. The three and five inch shells whistling over their heads prowoked many of the men to come erect and have a look at the show. They nodded their heads in approval and grinned at each other. The boat trip in was figured at 15 minutes. The barrage lifted 12 minutes after the landing craft had started the run. Three minutes later the first two craft grounded ashore on the coral sand bottom 40 yards from the beach itself. The ramps clanged. down and the men slipped off into the chest-deep water holding rifles and machine guns over their heads.

"Slowly the men waded in and waited for the first burst of fire that would locate enemy troops. The water got knee deep, then ankle deep and the men began to run for the cover of the scrub brush on shore. Not a shot had been fired at them and, typical of the troops in the Battalion, they had held their own fire because they could see nothing to shoot at. The beachhead peri-meter was organized immediately according to plan, and the landing was secured. At 1038 the Company Commander sent to the Battalion Commander, Beachhead secured, supplies ashore. No resistance. No casualties. Contacted natives, they report no Japs on Island.

"Patrols were immediately sent out to insure the protection of the perimeter and confirm, if possible, the reports of the natives that the enemy had left the island two months previous. In the meanting the perimeter was dug in and supplies were brought ashers through the 50 yards of heavy surf and cached inside the perimeter.



"By 1345 all supplies were secured. At 1400 the Ranger Company was on its way to Colasi Point. The original mission assigned had been to clear Colasi Point of all energy installations to safeguard the passage of the main task force due to come through the channel between Homonhon andDinagat Islands on D-Day 20 October 1914. The mission now had resolved itself to being sure were no installations at Coladi Point and, in the resulting resisting the Amphibious Scout party in setting up a channel light at a suitable point to permit the fleet to obtain a fix on the swept channel through the mine field that barred Levte Bay.

"At 1400 the Amphibious Scouts stopped at Pagbabangnan Point, decided it was the best snot around and, since the light weighed nearly 300 nounds, there was no point in going further than necessary. The 3d Flatoon was left as security for the light which would be vital to the operation. The rest of the Company continued up the coast to Masomo Point and settled down for the night inside a tight perimeter blocking the trail along the shoreline.

"As the day curled up to rest then the men began to realize that they had taken part in as dramatic a landing as could have been thought up even by themselves. The chances of being wiped out on such an operation were excellent and had they encountered resistance there was no doubt in any one's mind about the percentage of casualties that would have been suffered. As it was, they grumbled about the lack of fighting and the air was laced with tired talk to the effect that 'here we are with all these foddam bullets and no Japs.'

"It 0500 on the 19th the 1st platoon proceeded down the coast to Colasi Point to make sure the point was clear and, if necessary, to clear it. By 1100 the Platoon was back and reported that the entire coast was free of enery. The 1st and 2d platoons then returned to plack Beach #2 and restablished the perimeter.


"At 1515 on the afternoon of the 19th a company formation stood at Present Arms while the American flag was raised slowly to the top of a cocanut palm with 200 hundred natives from surrounding barrios standing with devout and awe-inspired eyes at the sight of the Stars and Stripes fluttering in the breeze. It was as if each man's heart reached out and pushed the flow a little higher.

"At 1015 that evening a report came in from Suluan Island by guerrilla runner that the Jap garrison there was killing the civilians in reprisal for our landing there on the 17th. A request was sent to Battalion Headquarters for permission to land on the island and wipe out the Japs there. The request was denied due to the tactical necessity of keeping clear the islands guarding the charmel entrance until the fleet units had passed.

"Starting on the 20th patrols were sent out over the island continually and contact was maintained with all barrios. On the 23d permission was again requested for the Suluan mission and permission was granted provided transportation could be secured. The transportation because the greatest difficulty since it became evident by the 20th that no Mavy or Army transportation could be spared at the time.

"By the 27th per ission had been granted to use any native transportation available and a sufficient number of native craft had been gathered to transport 80 men. The guerrilla band on Suluan Island had been notified of the landing and instructed to secure the beach area if possible, which they did. A vast emount of confusion resited from the indefiniteness of the native boatmen concerning the correct moment to start, and since the 'fleet' was composed of three sailboats and 11 small cances the wind, tide, current, and crystal ball had a great effect on the time table. The decision was reached to start loading the troops at  $2l_100$  on the 27th and have the entire convoy on the way by 0200 on the 28th.

"According to schedule the loading was started at  $2l_100$  and 0150 all boats were under weigh on the 15 mile trip, but it was not to be quite that simple. At  $0l_100$  the wind freshened and 0500 a first class wind storm was on the way. The white caps increased in size until it became necessary to bail out the boat continually, and the ground swell started to force the smaller boats to shore. By 0600 a disastrous procession of boats was headed



for the bottom, and in the cold grey morning seven of the small canoes capsized within 300 yards of the shore of Homonhon Island. The remainder proceeded to Cagasuan and landed to wait for those not so fortunate.

The men in the capsized boats had lost a considerable amount of equipment and the Company Commander decided to re-equip them from the 3d Platon which had returned from the light station and was then at Black Beach #2.

The men walked back, got the arms and gear they needed and returned to Cagasuan.

Ey 1600 on the 28th the entire force was collected at Cagasuan and ready to go or

"The 2d Platoon left for Sulvan at 0830 on the 29th in five sailboats and arrived safely at Sulvan Barrio at 1130 that morning and established a perimeter around the village. The crossing had been made in broad daylight under and enemy air umbrella. Plans had taken this into account and the men had been stripped and all equipment covered in the bottom of the boats so as to avoid arousing any suspicion. The 1st Platon that was to cross later had been ordered to follow the same procedure and it worked in both cases since the Japs evidently saw nothing amiss in a group of fishing boats full of what appeared to be natives crossing the eight mile channel.

"The remainder of the troops crossed to Suluan on the 30th and arrived at 0330 on the 31st after an 11 hour fight with the current and wind. By this time patrols had recommoitered the island on the side towards the channel, poisoned the Jap watter supply, and plans for the attack had been definitely settled. The catrols had secured a considerable amount of radio equipment of the enemy and it had been pack for shipment.


"The Jap garrison had been located in the lighthouse on the south end of the island. he lighthouse was on the top of a 300 foot cliff with apparently no passage except a trail leading to a flight of 150 steps straight up the east face of the cliff. The trail and the stairs were propertied by the lighthouse itself and two men could have held off 500 coming up the steps, so another approach had to be found. The western side of the island had been deliberately avoided but reconnoitered at night to find a possible approach. Information brought back by petrols revealed that the west side of the island presented a possible but very difficult route of approach. he eastern side would be too costly in men and the alternative presented the picture of a 300 fox t coral cliff straight under the lighthouse to be scaled without being seen or heard. The latter was selected as the most advantageous route and the plan called for a night attack.

"The attack plan in brief was for two assault squads and one LMG squad, accompanied by Filipino guides, to cross the island under cover of darkness, proceed up the west coast, scale the cliff, and be in position before dawn on 2 November. This attack group was under the command of the Company Commander. The remainder of the Company was to travel down the east coast of the island and devloy facing the trail that ran up to the lighthouse. At first light on the 2d the bulk of the Company was to attack across the trail and isolete the lighthouse garrison from the security guard at the foot of the cliff. At the same time the attack group on the cliff was to wipe out the Japs in the lighthouse itself and clear the stairway down the cliff to contact the rest of the Company. The energy were then to be forced to the extreme tip of the island and destroyed. In order to definitely establish the phases of the attack flare signals were provided. A red flare from the top of the cliff would mean that the attack group there had control of the lighthouse and a yellow flare would indicate that the stairway was under control of the troops on the cliff. An orange flare would be the signal for the troops at the base of the cliff to press the attack to the south as rapidly as possible.

"All the troops were carefully briefed in the mission and each man's job was to insure coordinated action and obtain maximum surprise which was absolutely essential for the small group scaling the cliff since any move that disclosed the group would mean sure annihilation.

"At 2115 the attack group that was to scale the cliff left the bivouac area and crossed the island to the west side. A very bright moon made traveling easy but rather dangerous since the landscape was lit up like a Christmas tree and the ground was as open as an Townstall Themen moved along in

single file about ten yards apart. The point moved out until it was thirty yards ahead of the rest of the group and picked the softest ground and the most shadow to go through. The terrain became extremely rocky and jagged but the trail was still clear and the going good.

solid coral. Footing was insecure and the men were feeling their way along with their feet and hands and breathing silent prayers that the coral wouldn't crumble and give them away. At this point orders were issued for all men to take off their socks and put them on over their shoes to decrease the possibility of noise and slipping. The men pulled off the trail, such as it was, and followed the order. In ten minutes hand signs indicated that they were ready to travel again. In the dead stillness they knew the rough part was about to start.


"At 0100 the group was directly under the lighthouse that stood out like a spectre overhead. The point turned ninety degrees to the right and started up. The going was slow, painfully slow since there was no trail and the coral was chopping the meat off fingers and palms. At points the men pulled themselves up hand over hand on the vines where there was no focing at all. Up to this time there had been no noise of any kind and everybody was breathing a little easier when a rifle stock hit a coral cone and it rang like the voice of doom in the stillness. Everyone stopped moving and breathing at the same time. The silence screamed at the men as they waited for a rifle shot from above that would indicate the guard had heard us. For ten minutes the men waited and hoped and waited. The point moved out again and the slow procession crawled on up the cliff.

"C200 and the guides and the Company Commander were on top of the cliff. The rest of the men started moving into position on the narrow platform. The Jap latrine is five feet ahead. The farthest building is twenty yards away and the nearest eight yards to the front. The full moon light up the four white buildings and the Japs are talking in the nearest one, still no alarm. The first men feel naked in the bright light at they keep their guns trained on the 60 foot cement tower. Still no sound but the unintelligible grun's of the enemy in the nearest building. Then suddenly it breaks. A sleepy Jap is coming to the latrine. As he puts his foot on the first of two wooden steps leading to the beard platform the lead men know he's getting to close for comfort and one of the guides raises his sub-machine gun and crashes three slugs through his chest.

"The body is five or six feet from the Company Commander and the fight has started whether it was planned that way or not. White phosphorus grenades shower into the buildings and the machine gun comes crawling up the cliff as fast as it can be moved. In a remarkably short time it's in position. The gunner is holding one leg down and firing the gun. The Company Commander is holding the other leg and the ammunition box. The third leg is free. The Squad leader of the IMG squad is keeping the gun clear of the crawling men going by to the rear and tracers are lacing the sky in a grotesque pattern under the moon.

"The Japs are taken completely by surprise and they run into the fire, back up and go over the cliff where the grandes and rifles pick them off as they fall. The machine gun fire lifts and the two assault squads go through the buildings and clear them out with grandes and rifle fire. Everything has been secured but the tower itself. The first shot was fired at 0210. At 0230 the firing has dwindled to an occasional shot from the tower. The men wait and watch. Another shot from the tower and a fussilade answers it. The firing stops completely and the red flare is sent up. A check shows two of the men badly shot. Three dead Japs in a heap and the rest scattered over the side and bottom of the cliff. The men on top relas and look at the eight holes in the tin roof on the shack where the Battalion Surgeon is working over the wounded with quick sure hands. Guards are posted and the men watch the moon travel across the clear sky.

The two casualties occured on the lighthouse platform itself. The first, Pvt Couture, was wounded in the abdomen by a rifle bullet. He was one of the members of the First Assault Sound and was struck while



rushing the nearest building. The second casualty was Staff Sgt Potts. Sgt Potts was in the act of hurling a hand grenade into a building when he was shot over the left shoulder blade. He had turned around as he pulled the pin to yell something to his men when the shot struck him. He staggered, stumbled a step or two and called to one of his men to take the live grenade before he dropped it. One of the men took the grenade and threw it into the building. Sgt Potts collapsed. Both these men were later awarded the Bronze Star for their action.

"In accordance to the plan the remainder of the Company left the bivouac area at 0300. They had seen the red flare fired at 0245 and knew the first group was in the lighthouse. By 0415 they were in position below the cliff and they opened fire according to schedule at 0605. The move was carried off as anticipated with the enemy continually moving back towards the southern end of the island. As the Japs retreated they brought an automatic rifle to bear on the top of the cliff and wounded three more men. Pfc Prokopovich had been posted on the ledge to watch the trail below. The Japs picked up his position and two bullets struck his shoulder seriously wounding him. He later died from loss of blood. Pfc Bilich was wounded by a fragment that hit his abdomen, Pfc Bilich was later awarded the Bronze Star for his action in rushing the buildings on the initial assault. Pfc Sombrano was slightly wounded when a bullet grazed his wrist.

"A message was sent to the commander of the second group which had then crossed the trail below the cliff and the enemy rifleman was located and driven out or killed by mortar and machine gun fire.

\*At 1000 the company withdrew since it was known that all but five or six of the enemy had been killed and it was unprofitable to pursue them. A demolition team was left on the cliff and as the troops withdrew they blew up the lighthouse, all buildings and destroyed all food and fuel supplies in the area. The wounded were carried back to the bivouac area and evacuated from there aboard an LCI that had been signaled at sea. The men, exhausted from the fight and climb relaxed and slep inside a well guarded perimeter.

The gunner on the machine gun that was taken up the cliff was awarded the Silver Star for his iniative and skill in getting the gun into action. Had it not been for his action the fight might have been a good deal more costly since the men were spread out on the cliff when the initial fire fight started. Pfc Ortiz rushed the gun to the front and brought it into action in a remarkably short time considering the almost impassable terrain he had to contend with.


\*The company rested on the 2d and third with small patrols out looking for the remaining five Japs. All this time the entire Company had lived on native food since no rations had come from the mainland. The ration ship showed up on the 3rd and they had their first sight of army food in seven days.

\*On the 4th, two Japs were located searching for food on the north-eastern tip of the island. They were cut off and killed by a patrol with no difficulty. On the 5th two more were unfertunate enough to come the same way and met the same fate after they had shot a native to death.

"From the 6th to the 12th the island was combed by patrols but the remaining Japs could not be found. On the 13th the Company was evacuated from the island. The third platoon was picked up on Black Beach #2 and the entire force reached Leyte on the morning of the 14th to rejoin the Battalion.

On the 27th the Battalion Executive returned, bringing with him the General Order officially designating the unit as the 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion and information that he had been in conference relative to a combat mission in which the battalion would soon take part. There were myriad details to be worked out in connection with this mission, and at once the Staff started laboring.

The company commanders were called in and apprized of the situation and briefed on what had to be done in the way of readying equipment. Ammunition and rations had to be drawn, weapons checked, and the battalion brought to T/E strength in weapons and all major items. New clothing was drawn and impregnated against typhus. Every detail, no matter how small, relating to the operation had to be painstakingly checked. The battalion staff figured units of fire, loading and unloading plans, and prepared maps and operational sketches for distribution to the companies.


We had assigned to us at this time a group of photographers who were making a picture history of the battalion and who later accompanied the battalion on its mission. With a minimum of interference the photogroup caught the sequence of events in the preparations underway. What was commonplace to the battalion impressed them as being unusual. The men were calm but not depressed and there was no evidence of hysteria. These Rangers had waited nearly two years for this. Most of them were what they themselves called "Old Soldiers," and they took calmly the prospect of the mission with grinning faces giving evidence of a willingness to work twenty-four hours a day until we were on the way.

By October 2d the company commanders had received the Battalion Field Order and had submitted for approval their Company Field Orders. Minor changes were made but for all practical purposes the orders were satisfactory and everything in order. On the 3d all officers were called to the "War Room" and the final briefing got underway.

Our mission was to land on Dinagat and Homonhon Islands of the Philippine Group and secure the entrance to Leyte Gulf. Intelligence led to the belief by higher headquarters that these two islands were fortified with coastal artillery, anti-airdraft installations and radar posts since they were in strategic positions astride the gulf. We were

to clear these positions and hold the islands until the main landing had been effected. "A" Day for the main operation was October 20th, 1944, and the battalion was scheduled to land on A -3. It wasn't necessary to impress anyone with the evident truth that we were landing in the Philippines, 50 miles from the main Japanese bases on Leyte in the teeth of a large enemy garrison, and that there would be no ground support until the main invasion started. It was what we wanted and what we were made for. We were to be the first combat troops to keep General MacArthur's pledge and "Come Back."


The plan for carrying out the mission was gone over in detail. Company B, reinforced by one platoon from Headquarters Company, would land on the southern side of Homonhon Island, cache extra supplies near the beach, and then proceed to Colasie Point on the eastern tip of the island to destroy any enemy installations guarding the entrance to Leyte Gulf. The remainder of the battalion would land on the northwestern shore of Dinagat Island in the order of Companies A, D, C, E and F. Companies A and D were to seize and hold a beach-head while Companies C, E, and F, under the command of the Battalion Executive, were to reform and proceed north along the coast to Desolation Point, destroying any enemy installations encountered. Extra supplies were to be unloaded inside the beach-head held by A and D Companies. After Desolation Point was cleared, C, E, and F Companies were to return to the beach-head where A and D Companies would be relieved and sent to reconnoiter the area south as far as the town of Loretto. It was evident to all that the success or failure of our mission would have a definite bearing on the conduct of the entire Philippine campaign. Everyone accepted this fact with the determination to justify the faith that had been placed in the battalion.

By October 7th all details of logistics had been worked out, equipment and supplies drawn, and the job of loading the ships was well under way. The battalion was assigned five APD's for movement to the target area. They were to be loaded in the order of Headquarters and A Companies aboard the SCHLEY, B Company aboard the HERBERT, C Company the KILTY, D Company the CROSHY, and E and F on the WARD. By 1700 on the 8th all supplies had been loaded and last minute checks of personal equipment being made.

At 0800 on October 9th the battalion, less the Second Echelon of 63 enlisted men under the command of Warrant Officer Cline, formed in front of Headquarters and stood retreat before moving to the point of embarkation. The troops were loaded aboard the APD's by Ducks, and at 1300 all were on board, personal gear stowed in the troop compartments. All came on deck for a final look at Finschhafen.

Our convoy of five APD's sailed at 1700 October 9th, and arrived at Hollandia at 1700 the 11th. The trip was uneventful, but served to accustom the men to life aboard an APD and give them an opportunity to get their sea legs before the longer voyage to the target area was begune

While at Hollandia orders were received that in addition to landing on Dinagat and Homonhon Islands one company would also land on the island of Suluan (approximately 12 miles east of Homonhon Island. The landing was to be simultaneous with landings on Homonhon and Dinagat, with the mission



of capturing enemy documents and destroying and enemy radar and observation post that was known to be on the island. This necessitated the preparation of a new battalion Field Order and the employment of Company B of the 21st Infantry Regiment that had originally been attached to the battalion for use as a floating reserve. Company D of the Rangers was selected to make the landinglanding on Suluan and Company B of the 21st was to used to replace D in the beach-head perimeter on Dinagat. The remainder of the operation was to be as originally planned.

On the 12th the battalion was joined by the 10th Portable Hospital and the 10th Signal Platoon. These organizations were attached to the battalion for the mission and were to land with the main force on Dinagat.

Before leaving "ollandia the Commanding Officer and company commanders of the Rangers and all ship Captains were assembled aboard the destroyer HUGHES for a final conference and briefing by Admiral Struble who was to command the Naval Task Force. Plans for Naval gun fire and air support were explained, the disposition and mission of each ship given, and instructions issued as to the action to be taken in the event the convoy was dispersed by typhoons or enemy action.

At 1500 on October 12th the convoy moved out of the harbor and proceeded in a northwesterly direction. We all realized that we had seen New Guinea for the last time and although there were few regrets there were many memories.

On the 11th the convoy was met by two Naval Tankers and Borty minesweepers. The APD's and the escorting destroyers were refueled at sea. Joined by the minesweepers, we again headed for our objective. Out of Hollandia we had heavy storms and constantly overcast skies. This was accepted as unusually good luck as it prevented any enemy air action against us. The night of the 15th the wind reached gale proportions and everything was secured aboard ships in the event of a typhcon. The storm continued through the night and the next day. It was feared that the storm would prevent us from landing on schedule, but by the morning of the 17th it had moderated enough for the landing to be effected.

At dawn on the 17th the convoy, led by three minesweepers, entered Leyte Gulf and moved down the west side of Dinagat to the vicinity of Kanamong Point. The weather had cleared by the sea was still rough. It was obvious that at best we would have a "wet landing." By 0900 the prearranged Naval fire had begun and the assault waves were in the landing craft ready for the run to the beach. The beach at first appeared to be well suited for an amphibious landing, but as the boats neared shore it became necessary for them to reduce speed and virtually feel their way through narrow channels in the coral reefs that lay just under the surface of the water. Approximately one hundred yards off shore the boats grounded on the reefs and it was necessary for the men to wade in the remaining distance. Some stepped into deep holes in the coral and had to swim part way, while others were knocked off their feet by the heavy surf.

Typical of the general attitude of the men was the action of one soldier who, having lost his rifle when he fell, was heard to say, "To hell with it!" and was seen moving into the jungle armed only with a trench knife and hand grenades.

By 1230 all companies were ashore, the Battalion CP established, and C, E, and F Companies had moved out for Desolation Point. As there had been no opposition, a part of the troops were put to unloading extra rations and ammunition while the remainder continued digging in on the perimeter.

At 1300 word was received from the Battalion Executive that an enemy force of unknown strength had moved inland from positions on the coast approximately two miles north of the Battalion CP. Abandoned stores of food and ammunition and the general condition of the enemy camp gave evidence that it had been left in great haste. Documents abandoned by the Japanese revealed that the unit was officially known as the Dinagat Island Carrison and had had the mission of reporting air and sea activity and securing the island against guerilla activity. Efforts to make contact with the enemy force had failed, and the three companies again moved towards Desolation Point.

During the afternoon of the 17th another storm came up and the un-loading of supplies had to be discontinued until the following day. The APD's and the escorting destroyers moved out to sea until morning while the troops settled down for their first night in the Philippines. In spite of the fact that we were surrounded by enemy-held islands, that we had no protection of our own against enemy planes, and that we were faced by a force of unknown size on the island itself, there was no evidence of apprehension or undue concern among the men. Each man performed his duties with the thoroughness that had been part of his training and an air of unconcern that the battalion officers had not thought possible.

On the afternoon of the 18th (A -2), C, E, and F Companies returned from Desolation Point. In addition to the enemy bivouac previously mentioned they had located pillboxes and observation posts on the northern tip of the island, but all had been abandoned. On the return march a thorough search of the bivouac was made. Among the personal effects of a Japanese officer an American flag was found. It had been carefully folded and placed in the bottom of a footlocker, and apparently was being kept for a souvenir. This was the first American flag recaptured in the Philippines and later it was presented to the Commanding General of the Sixth Army by members of the battalion.

On the same day Company D returned from Suluan and Company B of the 21st Infantry re-embarked on the ARIADNE. Plans were made for Companies D and A to move approximately six miles south to Loretto on the following day. They were to travel aboard the CROSEY and return the same day if the town was clear of enemy troops.

All troops were now at the beachphead perimeter with the exception of one platoon from C Company that had be the Desolation Point to guard Naval personnel operating a navigation between the personnel and their

equipment had been landed on the 17th and had moved to Desolation Point behind the troops that had reconnoitered that area. During the night of the 18th the Japs attempted to infiltrate the perimeter of the defense platoon but were driven off leaving one dead.


At approximately 1800 on the 18th thirty six members of the Filipino Guerillas, led by Cartain Hemingway, an American who had been in the US Army Air Force at the time of the surrender of Bataan, arrived at our perimeter. This was his first contact with Americans in more than two years. The information that he gave us was that the enemy garrison that had been bivouaced north of Kanamong Pointwas the only Japanese force on the island at that time. However, in the past the Japs had moved troops to and from Dinagat in small craft and could easily reinforce the garrison.

On the morning of the 19th A and D Companies moved to Loretto as scheduled. There were several air alerts during the time that they were aboard the APD CROSBY and Jap planes were identified over the area, but no attack was made. The troops were met by friendly natives when they landed at the town. Information received there was that the enemy garrison that had been in the town had been evacuated approximately two months prior to our arrival. The troops spent two hours in Loretto before returning to the beach-head.

October 20th was the first day since we had landed that we were free of air raids. This was A Day for the invasion of Leyte and the absence of enemy planes over Dinagat, at least for the present, was not only quite understandable but also a welcome relief. Prior to A Day the sight of Jap planes had been very common and the entire command had become experts at diving into fox-holes when a plane was heard. On the 22d Japanese planes were again over us and sporadic raids continued until the time we left the island.

On October 25th a platoon from Company C that had been sent to Loretto to secure that area against the landing of Jap reinforcements, reported that Imperial Navy survivors were coming ashore on the beaches approximately five miles south of the town. Patrols were immediately sent out from the main perimeter to reinforce the platoon at Loretto and to make contact with any Japanese that came ashore. By noon of the 27th all of the survivors had been accounted for. Some had carried small arms ashore with them and offered resistance, while others attempted to escape into the survivording jungle. In spite of this we were able to take ten of them as prisoners of war to be sent to Sixth Army Headquarters for interrogation. The prisoners, guarded by Technician Third Roth and Technician Fifth Starkovich, were put aboard an LCI for transportation to Leyte on the 26th. During the trip the boat was bombed and strafed by two Jap planes. In this action the ship's crew suffered eleven casualties, Starkovich received a leg wound, and one of the prisoners was killed. As a result of the Naval casualties there were insufficient men to man all the ship's guns. Roth voluntarily manned one of the caliber fifty machine guns for the remainder of the trip, and for this action was later awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

From October 21st to the 26th combat patrols had covered the entire northern end of Dinagat in an effort to locate the Japanese garrison that had fled to the hills upon our arrival.



in the area was found on many occasions, but all efforts to make contact with them failed. On the 27th word was received from the natives at Loretto that the enemy force had been seen in the area east of the town. Three companies were immediately sent to Loretto and from there they were able to operate as patrols covering the area to the east and south. They were to be supplied with rations by native boats that would operate between the town and our beach-head.

Extensive patrolling from the 27th through the 29th had still failed to locate the Japs. The weather was bad and this coupled with the fact that the patrolling was being conducted over terrain that varied from deep swamps to steep mountainous areas covered with heavy jungle had a marked effect on the physical condition of the men. Fractically all had skin infections as a result of constantly wet clothing. To me had completely worn out their shoes, while all suffered from bad blisters and fungus infections on their feet. In spite of this the men's morale was high and all were anxious to keep on until they could make contact with the Japs. It was during one of these patrols that Technician Fourth Gilbert B. Smith, of Jeadquarters Company, at risk of his life, saved from drowning a fully armed and equipped fellow soldier who had sunk out of sight in a fast-flowing river that the patrol was fording; and for this deed Sm th was later awarded the Soldier's Medal.

On the afternoon of the 29th a fifteen man patrol, including Lieutenant Colonel Eucci, moved out from Loretto to investigate a report that the enemy force was in the vicinity of Siningog, a small village about 12 miles south of Loretto. The members of this patrol had had little or no rest for the previous two days, yet all had voluntarily gone out again. On the morning of the 30th the patrol was in the vicinity of Siningog, but as no indications the enemy had been found, they were moving back towards Loretto. During a rest period at the foot of a steep hill the patrol, without any warning, was caught by Jap mortar and machine gun fire. The enemy was located on the hill above the patrol and thus had the advantage of being on commanding ground with superior firepower. Notwithstanding the fact that the heaviest weapon carried by the patrol was a Browning automatic rifle, the men immediately formed a skirmish line and started to attack up the hill. One Jap machine gun and two knee mortars were put out of action and several riflemen killed before the Japs broke and attempted to escape from the area. Nineteen Japs, including their Commanding Officer, were kelled in this action with no casualties to our patrol. Immediate aggressive action and superior marksmanship had made it possible to overcome a force greater in both numbers and firepower. During the action 1st Lieutenant Clifford K. Smith, without regard for his personal safety had secured the BAR and moved into a position from which he could bring fire on the drew of the Jap machine gun. Much of the success i Much of the success in the engagement was accredited to this act for which Lieutenant with was later awarded the Silver Star Medal.

On October 31st the battalion was re-supplied with ten-in-one type rations and a gratuitous issue of tobacco and candy. This made a welcome treat, having eaten "C" rations for the past ten days. Yedical supplies were dropped to us by parachute on November 12th. We had not received medical supplies during the entire time we had been on the island and many of the items that were sent were bad all of the boxes dropped






landed within a radius of two hundred yards of the battalion command post, making a one hundred per cent recovery possible.


During the period from October 31st until we left on Movember 14th, natrols were sent out to guard against any attempt by the enemy to re-occupy the island. On November 14th the battalion was relieved and moved to Leyte aboard one LSM and one LCI. The trip took approximately le hours and was uneventful until we arrived off Leyte on the morning of the 15th. Japanese planes were after the shipping in the harbor, but no bombs fell in the immediate vicinity of our boats; however, were glad of it when we able to unload and get back on solid ground.


From the 15th of November until the last days of that month the battalion camped in the vicinity of Tanuan, Leyte, and beside Sixth Army Headquarters. The battalion, and Sixth Army, moved close to Tolosa when it was decided to convert the first site into an airfield. Patrols were operating constantly and other duties of the battalion were the guarding of Sixth Army Headquarters and later the Navy's "SeaBees." Tarly in December a force of Japanese parachutists seized an air strip a few miles away. This situation kept the battalion fully alerted for several days making it necessary for the rifle companies to occupy certain defensive positions protecting Sixth Army units in the event further attacks by larger bodies of enemy paratroops. When the strip was re-captured the battalion returned to its guard and patrol duties and the usual activities connected with camping in a swampy, tropical location. All through december the staff was occupied with the job of preparing the battalion for the next mission, and by Christmas Day every man of the organization knew there were not many days to pass before the 6th Eangers closed again with the soldiers of Japan.














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# CABARUAN HILLS.

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## HEADQUARTERS 6TH RANGER INFANTRY BN APO 74

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8 February 1945

## Narrative of Company E in the Cabaruan Hills from 1 Feb 45 to 6 Feb 45.

Enemy strength in the Cabaruan Hills had been estimated at one thousand Japs, scattered and unorganized throughout the Hills. These troops had either been bypassed or had infiltrated through our lines during our recent drive in this sector.

Company E, 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion was given the mission of scouting and patrolling the Cabaruan Hills in order to locate and destroy these troops.

On the 1st of February 1945, Company E left base camp at Calasiao at 1720 hours. After traveling approximately thirteen miles a company perimeter was established along the Laguna Ingalera River near Talospatang at 1830 hours. Darkness settled in quickly and the night was clear and cool.

On the morning of the 2nd after a breakfast of 10 in 1 rations, the company was split into patrols. The 1st Flatoon patrol was under the command of 2d Lieutenant Elsworth and the 2nd Flatoon patrol under the command of 1st Lieutenant Mobley. A third patrol of three jeeps with machine guns, each under the control of a machine gun squad sergeant, was sent out to patrol the roads throughout the hills. The patrols left the company perimeter at 0730 hours. The company commander remained at the C.F. located at the perimeter. The native Filipinos were all evacuating the hills toward Malasiqui, carrying all their possessions in carts or on their backs. Most of them that were questioned told of small parties of Japanese at several different places and of the Japanese stealing their rice, chickens and pigs and in some cases, the shooting of Filipino civilians.

At approximately 1015 hours, a small party of Japs were raided by the 2nd platoon killing two and wounding one. The wounded Jap escaped.

The patrol then proceeded to the barrio of Fareg Lareg where one sick Jap Officer and seven enlisted men had been reported. On arriving there however, no Japs could be found.

The patrol then ate lunch and proceeded on its mission of investigating another report of approximately fifteen Japs at the Barrio of Taloy. The route of march passed close to the place where the previous engagement had taken place so the platoon leader decided to investigate to see if any enemy had returned for their dead. The platoon was thrown around the place and sure enough the Japs had returned but this time they had a light machine gum and one grenade discharger. The Japs were located on the reverse side of the hill in dense cover.

Sergeant Ebinger with his squad of four men were covering the left flank and were also to be used as a reserve. His position, however, was in a small clearing and as he was moving into position, the Japs opened up on him with

their machine gun, wounding him in six places and knocking his BAR from his hand. Despite having two fingers of his right hand shot away, he recovered his gun and fired, killing two machine gunners and the man operating the grenade discharger. The remainder of the platoon opened up killing three more Japs, one of which was a sniper in a tree. There was one remaining Jap who grabbed the machine gun and fled. This action took place at approximately 1530 hours and lasted for ten minutes.

Sergeant Bbinger's wounds were immediately dressed and a stretcher made for carrying him back to the read. Despite his wounds, Sergeant bbinger was in good spirits and showed no evidence of shock. He was later recommended for the Silver Star for his gallant action. The men took turns at carrying him the 1500 yards to the road where a command car was waiting to take him to the hospital.

The patrol, then tired and hungry, returned to the company perimeter, arriving there at 1700 hours.

The first platoon returned to the perimeter at  $1820~{\rm hours}$ , tired and low in spirits because no Japs had been encountered and all the reports they had investigated had proven false.

one of the jeep patrols connanded by 3/Sgt Futzke, got a report that there were two Japs inside a hut eating dinner with several fillipinos. Being unable to fire inside the hut for fear of killing the civilians, 5gt. rutzke decided on a plan to get the Japs outside the house. He had the Filipino boy, who had given him the report, walk into the hut and trab the two Jap rifles, which were leaning up against the wall, and run out with them, knowing that the Japs would immediately give chase. That is exactly what happened and two sons of hip on were sent to glory.

.gt. lutake returned to the company perimeter at 1545 hours and made his report. The other two jeep patrols had also arrived but had nothing to report.

The morning of the 3rd came around brisht and hot. The company commander received a report that approximately thirty Japanese were digging in in the same position where the 2d platoon had had their two engagements the day before.

He decided to attack the position with the full company, using the mortars. The company left at 0800 and the 1st ogt remained at the perimeter with instructions to move the C.F. to the schoolhouse at the barrio of Ganan.

The company went into position at 1130 hours and after some difficulty with a couple of rounds of faulty ammunition the mortars registered in and shelled the place with 100 rounds of 60 mm Nortar ammunition.

After the concentration lifted the company moved in on the position. Everyone was expecting hostile fire out none came. The Japs had evidently seen us moving in to position and decided not to fight. There was evidence of their attempts at digging in and also one grenade discharger and several rifles were left laying around.

The company then proceeded to comb the surrounding area for approximately  $10\,\%$  yards but no enemy could be found.

### Narrative (Co. E) Cont'd:

The weather had turned cloudy and it began to rain, so the company reformed and returned to the new Command Fest arriving there at 1600 hours. By now the rain was coming down so fast that visibility was reduced to almost firty yards.

A perimeter was established and the men had a cold supper and prepared to settle down for a miserable night in the mud. The men's feet were beginning to get in bad shape from so much hiking up and down the hills and the company aid man used up practically all his supplies in doctoring their feet.

The morning of the 4th came around with the sky clear out a dense fog hung over the hills. At 0845 hours the fog began to show signs of lifting so the company again split up into two platoon patrols and were sent out.

At 1115 hours the 2d Flatoon surprised twenty Japanese living in two muts. In the bitter firefight that followed, sixteen Japs were killed including one officer.

The 2d 11 toon withdraw and reorganized for another attack on the position. A small patrol was sent out to see that the flanks were not endangered and also to sain information on the remaining Jags. The patrol returned and reported that the flanks were secure and that no enemy action was observed.

The platoon leader decided to bring up a light machine gun and spray them completely before launching his second attack. As the machine gun was firing the platoon rowed into position and at a given signal the machine gun fire lifted and the platoon moved in. No return fire was received until the position was taken and this came from a sniper in a tree. He was quickly killed and the area we thoroughly searched but the remaining Japs had eso ped. The booty taken was one grenade discharger, several ribles and ammunition and the maker that the officer had carried.

The day being exceptionally hot and steamy from the rain of the previous night and the men being weary and footsore, the platoon returned to the perimeter arriving there at 1620 hours:

The first platoon, after patrollin all day and encounter ar no enemy opposition were returning to the perimeter when they heard the machine cun fire of the 2d flatoon. The platoon leader, thinking that the 2d platoon was in trouble decided to move into the area to give as istance. And he reached a point about 100 yards from where the michine gun fire was neard he left the platoon with the platoon surgeant, and with his two scouts and messenger he started making his reconnaissance. After he had moved about 100 yards, two Jais were seen making off into the brush in a ravine and were soon lost from sight. The reconnaissance party followed down in the ravine when the two Japs opened up on them, wounding Sergeant Proedel. One of the Japs was killed and the other one fled. While the platoon leader was giving first aid to the wounded man, several more Japs opened up on them from the flank, wounding lieutenant alsworth, the platoon leader. The messenger was immediately sent back to bring up the platoon and the other scout stayed with the wounded men to give covering fire.

The platoon sergeant gave his section leaders their instructions and they started moving into position. He then went down to the platoon leader to get further instructions. The platoon leader then weak from loss of blood but still able to walk, told the platoon sergeant to wait until the platoon opened fire and then to remove Sergeant Troedel. He then moved back to the rear of a small knoll and Tay down.

#### Narrative (Co. E) Cont'd:

Just as the platoon was moving into a line into position they were attacked 1.0m the flank by the balk of the enemy force which numbered aware sixty. The ways used mortars, grenneds, machine cur and witte fire in a territie convention, which immediately pinned the platoon down.

The section leaders tried to flank the enemy position but the bulk of the platoon was pinned down. One BAR opened up and killed six of the enemy while riple fire accounted for four more.

At this time the platoon sergeant, T/Sgt. Conners, was causht by a burst of machine gun fire which killed him. Lieutenant Elsworth, knowing that his men were outnembered and under a superiority of fire power, sent instructions to them to fall back and sent to the Command Fost for help.

, Sergeant Nicholsen, a section leader, withdrew the remainer of the platoon leaving three men with Lieutenant Elsworth and sending three men back to the perimeter with a rejort of the situation.

The company commander immediately left with the 2d Flatoon, taking the messenger of the 1st platoon to guide the way to where the action took place. When the 1st platoon was contacted, the company commander, seeing that they were badly shaken up and several of them were suffering from heat exhaustion, ordered them to return to the perimeter.

By this time dusk had set in and when the 2d platoon arrived in position, darkness had fallen. One squad was sent forward with the platoon leader to search for he bodies of the two men, T/Sgt Conners and Sergeant Troedel. Due to the darkness and nature of the termin they could not be found, so the squad returned to the platoon. They reported that they had come upon twenty six doad Jap bodies arranged in a circle, their heads in and their feet out, making a pattern of the rising sun. Also that a Jap petrol of 30 men had passed them close by.

The company commander, seeing that nothing further could be done, ordered the platoon to return to the perimeter, and they arrived there at all reximately 2130 hours. On arrival, it was reported that Lt. Elsworth and already been evacuated to the hospital. One other man had a slight scalp wound and he was also sent to the hospital.

On the following morning, the Battalion Commander ordered the Iso platoon to be returned to base camp and a platoon of r company was sent to relieve them. No patrols were sent out because the men needed rest and the platoon from r company did not arrive until late in the day.

During the evening the company commander of Stompany and the two platoon leaders planned their attack for the next day. Also a message from the Bautation Commander stated that the remainder of Stompany would arrive early the following morning.

The three platoons with commanding officer of d company moved out early on the morning of the oth. The day was clear and visibility good. The route of march was very slow because 81mm Mortars and two hundred rounds of ammunition were being carried on the backs of the men.

The morturs were put in position on the reverse slope of a hill about 600 yards from the target; the observation post on to of the hill provided

### Narrative (Co. E) Cont'd:

excellent observation on the target below. Sure enough the Japs, approximately 50 months them, were still scattered there around a tree preparing their noon meal.

Communications were quickly established and the first round of registration was soon on the way. The data proved to be good occause the lst round landed squarely in the conter of the target. One hundred and twenty five rounds were rapidly expended on the target and amid the shell bursts built be heard the screams of the wounded.

Fore Japa were spotted on a hill a reximately 700 yards to the right of the target, and the mortars were soon registered on them. The remainder of the ammunition was expended on this target.

A patrol under the command of Lieutenant Mobley was soon under way to determine the damage done and also to search gain for the bodies of the two men previously left in the area. On the return of the patrol, Lieutenant Mobley reported that Ja, bodies were scattered over both target areas. Some of them blown to bits by mortar fire. He estimated 40 Jap dead. No trace was found of the two bodies.

March order was then given and the three platoons returned to the perimeter. Later in the evening the Battalion Commander sent a message to move all troops back to base camp. We arrived at 1900 hours tired and wornout and well ming a good shower, but meal and a nice cut to sleep to sleep on.

Company C was sent out the following day, the 7th, to complete the mission and to continue the search for Sergeant Troudel and  $T/sgt_{\bullet}$  Conners.

All day of patrolling ended with no contact of enemy and the search was futile.

The morning of the 8th, company C, operating with Guerrillas were patrolling the same area when, from about 50 yards from the flank patrol, a voice was heard in a ravino. Investigation proved the voice to be Bergeant Troedel. He was lying in a Caraboa wallow a downs in good spirits despite his two wounds. He was immediately put on a stretcher and was token to the hos it. On the way he tole his story.

was already dead. The Japs left and later that night they came back to him and he had 5 play "possum" arain. This time they took his watch from him. That night, using his one wood arm, he dragged himself about 350 yards down into this ravine nd took his clothes off and lay in the Caraboa wallow to keep the mosquitoes of him. He said that he heard Lieutenant Robiey's patrol come close to him but he was afraid it was Japs, so he did not try to attrict attention.

f/Sgt Conners! body was found the next day and was interred.

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# PANGATIAN PRISON RESCUE

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#### HEADQUARTERS 6TH RANGER INFANTRY BN APO 74

Subject: Ranger Mission at the Pangatian Prison Camp.

To : G-3, Sixth Army, APO 442.

On 27 January 1945 information from guerrilla sources revealed that approximately 500 American and Allied POWs were in a Japanese stockade at PANGATIAN just west of CABU and 4.9 miles east of CABANATUAN in east IUZON plain. Information also indicated that the POWs were guarded by a small force of Japs garrisoned there.

The 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion was detailed by G-2, Sixth Army, to proceed to Japanese Prisoner of War stockade at PANGATIAN with the mission of liberating the Allied prisoners interned there.

Situation on 28-29 January: American forces advanced reconnaissance had occupied GUIMBA with outposts as far east as the LICAB RIVER and south to La Paz.

Enemy Situation: Due to the rapid advance of American forces to the southwest, remnants of the enemy forces were with-drawing north and east along HIGHWAY #5 running through CABANATUAN-BALOC to SAN JOSE. Alternate route used by the enemy was the road CABANATUAN - CABU - RIZAL. Due to our air activity enemy troop movement was made during the night. During the day troops rested in concealed areas or transit camps. PANGATIAN was one of these transit rest camps. Heavy concentration of enemy troops were reported at RILAL and CABANATUAN while reports indicated 800 Japs at CABU with tanks. The road nets in this area was used regularly for enemy tank movement of which heavy concentrations were numerous.

A force consisting of Lt. Col HENRY A. MUCCI, Battalion Commanding Officer, Company "C", commanded by Captain ROBERT W. PRINCE, reinforced by 2d Platoon, Company "F" commanded by 1st Lieutenant JOHN F. MURPHY, left the 6th Ranger camp at 0500 hours, 28 January 1945, in truck convoy and proceeded to the guerrilla headquarters at GUIMBA. Company "C" reinforced left GUIMBA at 1400 and moved across country to the guerrilla headquarters of Captain Joson near LOBONG. Captain Joson's and 80 men were attached to our force and the advanced east continued (see sketch for route of march), crossing the National Highway approximately one mile south of BALOC into enemy territory. The TALAVERA RIVER was forded at 2400 and the RIZAL ROAD crossed at 0400 29 January without indident. We arrived at BALLANCARIN at 0600 the 295h where we bivouaced and contacted guerrilla Captain Pajota, the guerrilla area commander at CABU. His force of 90 armed and 160 unarmed men were attached to our elements.

At BALINCARIN we also met the Alamo Scouts who had not as yet secured definite information on the POW camp. Decision was made to wait for guerrilla scouts to return with their information.

Upon arrival at BALINCARIN Captain Prince made the following request to guerrilla Headquarters: That all around security in depth would be established and maintained by guerrilla troops; that all civilians in the area north of the CABANUTUAN - CABU road remain there and any persons entering this area will be held and not permitted to leave until our mission was accomplished; that all chickens be penned up and all dogs be tied and muzzled; that the guerrillas secure and organize and ox cart train of sufficient size to haul 200 men, at the same time provide food for 650 men to be distributed along the route of return.

We left BALICARIN at 1800 the 29th and went to PLATEROS to contact the guerrilla scouts. These scouts reported 500 enemy soldiers in the POW camp and approximately one division on the road moving north, and it was decided not to attack on the 29th. On 30 January, at 0930, Alamo Scouts guided by guerrilla Lieutenant Tombo left the bivouac to scout the prison camp and get definite intelligence concerning the enemy's installations in the POW camp. Lieutenant Tombo was invaluable for his services in obtaining information and gaining the active assistance of civilians during the operations.

The following information was brought back to PLATEROS at 1500 the 30th. All activity in the stockade was normal.

That the stockade was inclosed with three 6 to 8 ft. barbed wire fences about 4 ft. apart and that the interior was divided by single barbed wire fences.

The east west width of the stockade was 600 yds and the south north length of the stockade was 800 yds.

That one pill box was located at NE corner of stockade occupied by 4 Japs heavely armed. This pill-box has an opening in the top. Three 12 ft. towers guarding the stockade were also occupied. (see sketch for location)

The POWs were located in the NE group of buildings.

That there were four Jap Tanks and two trucks in the building as indicated on sketch.

The main entrance was closed by 8 ft. high gate locked with a heavy lock about 3 ft. from the ground. This entrance is guarded by a sentry on the west side of the gate who stands in a well protected shelter.

The enemy troops reported at the stockade on 29 January departed early the morning of 30 January trailing east toward CABU.

Traffic on the highway had been light during the day.

 ${\tt A}$  concentration of approximatly  ${\tt 800}$  Japs was at CABU with tanks and a number of trucks.

The decision was made to attack at dusk. The men were completely briefed on the action to take place and each man was assigned a job and thoroughly instructed as to all duties related to it. The element of surprise was stressed as being of primary importance to the success of the mission; all were cautioned to spare no effort to secure same.

Captain Joson's guerrillas would establish a road block 800 yards southwest of POW camp on the main road with the purpose of arresting enemy traffic or troops moving north from CAHANATUAN to CABU. A six man bazooka team under Staff Sergeant White, of 2d Platoon, Company "F", was assigned to him as anti-tank protection.

Captain Pajota's guerrillas would effect a road block 300 yds northeast (near Cabu bridge) of POW camp on the main road as a means of preventing the enemy force of 500 then in CABU from reinforcing the stockade garrison or attacking our column. The task of both guerrilla captains was to keep the enemy from breaking through before the prisoners were liberated and safely on their return trip. The guerrillas were to remain in position and keep enemy engaged until the POW column was clear of the reach of the enemy.

2d Platoon, Company "F" was given the mission of knocking out the enemy guards at the rear entrance of the stockade and prevent the enemy from moving into the section of the compand occupied by the prisoners. In addition, he was to detach a six man squad, under Staff Sergeant Millican, to destroy the pillbox at the northeast corner of the stockade.

lst Platoon, Company "C", commanded by lst Lieutenant wILLIAM J. O'CONNELL, was assigned the task of forcing the front gate of the stockade, to push through rapidly and kill enemy in known locations. The two assault sections of this platoon were assigned the following duties: lst Section, under Staff Sergeant Jensen, was to push across the road, kill the guards at the gate and in the guard houses at the gate. 2d Section, led by Sergeant Britzius, was to push across the road on the right of the lst Section, fire through the fence at enemy installations covering the lst Section's action. The Weapons Section, under Staff Sergeant Stewart, was to follow the lst Section through the gate, moving to the right of the lst Section, and then forward, to take under fire with a bazooka the corrugated tin building that housed the tanks and trucks. As the Weapons Section went in, the 2d Section was to lift fire and move in the gate and pass to the right edge of the stockade to prevent any enemy from escaping.

2d Platoon, Company "C", commanded by 1st Lieutenant Melville H. SCHallT, was assigned the mission of opening the prisoner of war section of the encampment, setting up supporting fire with the other two platoons, and starting the prisoners on the movement out. The 1st Assault section, under Staff Sergeant Harris, was to follow the 1st Platoon through the main gate, force the entrance to the POW enclosure, push rapidly to the rear of this enclosure, and open fire on the Japanese building then under fire by 2d platoon, Company "F". The 2d Assault Section, led by Staff Sergeant Butler, was to follow the 1st Section, push up to the right flank of the POW compound, and thwart enemy in any attempts to enter POW area. Weapons Section, under Staff Sergeant Stern, was to be in reserve and also to direct the rescued prisoners through the main gate to start the movement north.

The signal for the attack to begin was to be from Lieutenant MURPHY'S platoon. When he opened fire all attacking elements would move simultaneously. The telephone lines out of the concentration camp were to be cut by the guerrilla Lieutenant Tombo on the north and by Staff Sergeant White on the south. Individual rangers were assigned the job of searching for and destroying the enemy's radios in the camp.

When all prisoners were clear of the stockade and started back, Captain PRINCE was to fire a red flare as the signal for the Rangers to withdraw, from a rear guard for the column, and assist in carrying the invalid prisoners. The two guerrilla forces were to remain at their posts until the column was clear of the camp by at least a mile and Captain PRINCE fired the second flare. This would be the signal for the guerrilla groups to withdraw and form a rear and flank guard for the column.

All units left Plateros at 1700 on the 30th and moved to the assembly area one mile from the stockade. Company "C" reinforced at 1800 started moving into position across open terrain. Movement was dead slow due to lack of concealment. Company "C" was in position at 1925, 20 yards from the front gate and concealed by darkness and a small ditch. 2d Platoon of Company "F" opened fire at the rear of the camp at 1945, and the Rangers began the attack. All went exactly according to plan; surprise was completed and the enemy was unable to organize effective resistance.

The squad under Staff Sergeant Millican killed the enemy in the pill-box on the north corner of the stockade:

2d Platoon, Company "F" killed the guards at the rear gate, in the living quarters, and in the wtach tower on the north side of the encampment.

lst Platoon, Company "C", killed the guards at the main gate, moved into the enclosed area, killed the enemy in their living quarters, destroyed four tanks and two trucks with bazooka fire. The trucks were loaded with enemy troops about to move out. 2d Platoon, Company "C", opened the prisoner of war section and directed the prisoners to the main gate, searched the barracks and carried out the invalid cases. At 2015 Captain PRINCE, after satisfying himself that all prisoners were released, fired the first red flare, and the withdrawal began.


The Column withdraw towards Plateros and when it was a mile and a half from the enemy stockade, Captain PRINCE fired the second red flare to signal the two guerrilla forces to leave their positions. Captain Joson withdrew from the south road block, but Captain Pajota at the time was engaged with an enemy column at the north road block and since his orders were to continue fighting if the safety of the Ranger-prisoner column was threatened, he fought on for another hour before he disengaged the enemy and withdrew to form additional rear and flank protection for the retiring column. It was during the rear guard action and at the main gate and from the road block, that we suffered cast alties (two killed and three wounded) from mortar and tank fire.

Carabao carts had been requisitioned from the civilians, and they were ready to receive the disabled freed-men on the south side of the PAMPANGA RIVER. Rangers and the litter-bearers aided the released men across the swift-flowing, waist-deep river. The column halted in PLATEROS to reorganize, give water and food to the men, and gather more carts. Cots were set up in the schoolhouse by Doctor Layug, local guerrilla doctor, who treated the sick and the wounded. The ex-POW's able to walk were disptached in groups guarded by Rangers to the next Barrio, BALIGCARIN, as fast as they could be organized. The first group

left PLATEROS at 2100 hours the 30th. Captain PRINCE brought the last elements of the column into PLATEROS protected by the rear guard of 115 men were moved from PLATEROS to BALINGARIN in 25 carabao carts.

Food and water were provided to all in BALLINGARIN and 15 more carts were secured for the transportation of the released soldiers unable to walk further. The column left BALINCARIN at 2400 for MATAAS. A KAHOY, arriving there on 0200 31 January. Here 11 more carts were obtained, making a total of 51 and lengthening the column to a mile and a half. Again the civilians supplied all with food and water. The group left MATAASNA KAHOY at 0230 for the next barrio, GENERAL INNA, on the RIZAL BUAD. 1st Platoon, Company "C", under Lieutenant O'CONNELL, moved ahead behind guerrilla scouts to set road blocks on the RIZAL ROAD. One section with a basooka and anti-tank grenades set up a road block 400 yards NE of the point we entered the road. A second section moved 3000 yards and established a second road block south. The column took one hour to clear the road, for it had to pass a mile down the Japanese-held highway. The road was cleared at 0430 the 31st. At 0530 a halt was made in a small unnamed barrio and after a short rest we continued the journey back to our lines. Radio communication was attempted several times, but with no success. At 0800 the column reached SIBUL where 20 more carts were obtained to carry more of the former POW's who had become exhausted by this time. Food and water were again provided by the local civilians and the decision was made to push on to our lines after a good rest. Radio contacted us and announed TALAVERA to be in American hands. A convoy of ambulances and trucks was organized and sent to SIBUL, arriving at 1100 the 31st. The freed-POE's were transferred to the 92d Evacuation Hospital at Guimba, following which, Company "C" reinforced was given transportation back to the Ranger's base camp near Calasiao.

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# BAGUIO-TRINIDAD AREA

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## NARRATIVE OF "E" COMPANY IN THE BAGUIO TRINIDAD AREA

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On the 18th of March, the Commany Commanders of "D" and "E" Commanies were called to bettalion headquarters and informed that a mission has beed assigned to them. This mission was to recommoiter the Baguio-Trinidad Area, some 15 to 20 miles behind the enemy lines. It sounded interesting, but little did we realize how high the mountains were in this area.

The Commany Commanders alerted their commanies the next day, and then went to I Corp Headquarters with the Battalion Commander to get more information and details on enemy operations in this area. Very little information was given us, except Guerrilla reports, which were the only ones available. The reports of the Guerrilla's were highly exaggerated, and could not be depended upon. After obtaining maps and photos, we returned to camp. The next day was spend in preparation for departure. We were to travel light, and the men were instructed to avoid a fight, so only MI Rifles, grenades, and two BAR's were taken. The commany was briefed and all available information was given them.

On the morning of the 22nd of barch, the company was loaded into trucks and we began our long trip.

We arrived at I Corps Headquarters about noon and found that some changes had been made. One Platoon was to go to the 32nd Div. sector and overate from there. It. Nobley took his 2nd Platoon and departed at one o'clock. The remainder of the company, under the company commander left at 1330 and arrived at Aringay at 1630 and slent that night in a native schoolhouse which had not been in use for some time.

After a breakfast of "C" rations we left Aringay and headed north for San Juan, as we had heard that Guerrilla Headquarters was located there. After we had massed Bauang, we encountered a patrol of the 33rd Division made up of two tanks and a company of Infantry. We asked them if the road was safe on thru to San Juan. They said that they didn't know because none of there patrols had been any farther than Bauang. We also asked them for an escort to San Juan, but they had there orders, so it was no go.

We left the natrol and proceeded at top sneed down the road, expecting an ambush at every turn, and expecting the bridges to blow up under us as we passed over them. Nothing happened, and the reason we found out later was that the Guerrillas had control over the road since the day before.

We arrived at San Juan and located the Guerrilla Headquarters. However, final arrangements were to be made at GHQ of the Guerrillas so the company commanders of "D" and "E" commanies and Lt. Powell,

S-3, proceeded to Camp Spencer located near Luna.

When we got to Camp Spencer we met Colonel Volckman, Commander of all Northern Luzon Guerillas. We found out that the guerrillas had an air strip for cub planes near the CP of the 66th Infantry which was in the area of our operations, so arrangements were made to fly the two company commanders there on the 25th of March. We also found out that we could not get cargadores to carry our rations as we had planned. We returned to San Juan that evening.

The following day, Lt. Powell went to the 33rd Division Head-quarters to make arrangements for air drops of rations, and also get some photographs of the area. We were given guides and all the best trails and routes were marked on our maps. All our preparations were completed for an early start in the morning.

The troops left by truck the next morning for San Gabriel, and left from there for the longest march overland to the CP of the Guerrilla 66th Infantry. "The two commany commanders left for Camp Spencer, and from there by cub plane to the guerrilla airstrip.

The commany commander of """ Company arrived at the air strip at 1000 hours and went to the CP of the ooth Infantry to get information concerning the disposition of their troops and locations of enemy troops. Plans were made for guides and carriers, and also a CP was picked out from which we were able to operate.

On the 26th of March, the guerrillas brought in a Japanese civilian who was a construction engineer for the Jap Army. He spoke fairly good English, but had very little information to give. He had spent most of his time building tunnels in the Cagayan Valley.

The troons arrived at the air strip on th 27th and every man was completely exhausted and foot sore from the long march over the mountains. We decided to rest up the 28th of March and also wait for our rations to be dropped. The rations were dropped on the 28th but they missed our drop field and landed in Jap hands.

The same day the tuerrillas brought in another Jap civilian and a Chinaman. The Jap spoke English and Spanish quite well and said that he was out buying rice for the Jap Army. He carried two military maps on one of which was marked the defense of Baguio. When questioned about the maps, he said he used them to find his way over the trails. The maps were immediately sent to I Corp. He later broke down and said that he was a Jap Liason officer and that he wanted to cormit suicide. When handed a bolo he changed his mind and said he preferred a hand grenade. Neturally this was refused him.

On the 29th of March we moved to Ranayako, near the CP of the 3rd Battaion, 66th Infantry. From there we legan to operate our

patrols. One patrol was immediately sent to "K" and "L" Companies of the 3rd Battalion to observe the battle going on at the time, and estimate the number of enemy. From our CP we could see the fight taking place and could also see one 75rm mountain gun firing directly into the guerillas. Although the fight was only about 800 yards as the crow flys from us; it was a seven hour hike to there as you had to go to the bottom of the mountain we were on and up to the top of the ridge where the fighting was taking place.

On the 30th of March, two patrols were sent out, one to Kilometer Post #21, on the mountain road to observe enemy traffic, and the other to Alopang to locate the Jap Garrison there. However, the patrol to Alopang never reached there as they ran into one company of Japs, moving north, estimated at the strength of 200. The patrol shadowed the Jap column and when the Japs stooped for the night they began digging in on a hilltop. The patrol then dispatched a runner with the coordinates of the position, and this was immediately sent to I Corp. The next period to be observed and strafed the hill top with excellent results. The patrol returned on the 1st of April.

The potrol at KP "21 reported fifteen vehicles moving on the road loaded with ammunition; also, seven pushcarts pushed by Jap labor troops on the night of the 30th of March.

On the 2nd of April the ratrol returned from the battle of which "K" and "L" Commanies were engaged and reported one battalion of Japs estimated at strength between 750 and 800 troops. The guerrillas were fighting a losing battle.

By now we found that large patrols were undesirable and as many of the men had colds from the cold climate prevalent in the mountains, the CO selected six men and sent the remainder of the platoon back to San Juan to be returned to base camp.

When the C.O. learned from the guerrillas that they had agents in Baguio acting as air raid wardens for the Japs, he asked that one of them be brought to him. This was accomplished, and from a hill overlooking Trinidad and Luchan, and with photos of the area, this guerrilla began pointing out targets which were marked on the photo. Three ammunition dumps were located, two oil dumps, one truck park, one wireless station, three sumply buildings three-three inor guns, and numerous caves were located and marked. This photo was sent back to the air strip, and from there by plane to I Gorp. The next morning when the bombers came over it was a sight we will never forget. The camouflage was burned off the AA runs by belly tanks filled with fuel and then the guns were destroyed by lombing. There turned out to be four guns instead of three. The armunition dumps were blown up and the fuel dumps set on fire. The wireless and supply buildings were destroyed, and the truck park bombed. Then the smoke cleared away, there was a picture of utter destruction.

The patrol at KP #21 returned after three days and nights and reported that no more traffic had passed. They had also reconnoitered the mountain road down to KP #11 and returned. They reported 110 Jap MPS at KP #14 and at KP #18-34 Jap Infantry and 50 Jap MPS at KP #21. An interesting sight each morning was the Japs would have a formation and would all bow to the sun and then turn and face northwest and bow down again. We later learned that they were bowing to the emperor.

Another patrol had been sent out with a radio to try and cross the mountain road and proceed to the Gold River east of Baguio. However, each night the Jans posted sentries at each kilometer post and these sentrys each walked half a kilometer. For two nights the patrol was unable to cross the road, so the patrol was called back.

On the 4th of april a force of 500 Japs were reported driving towards the airstrip from the Maaguilian road. This force threatened to cut us off and surround us, so we moved back to the airstrip. We had requested a plane to fly us across the mountain road to another guerilla strip, near the Ambuclao road which was our next objective. We were unable to get the plane that day, and that about 2200, the guerrillas were forced to withdraw and we had the last strip. There was nothing left for us to do so we returned to Camp Spencer.

We arrived there on the 8th of April and found out that "D" Company had arrived the day before and alens had already been made for them to complete the mission. After resting up for a day, the trucks arrived to take us back to ur base camp.

We arrived back in came late at night, tired and dusty from a long ride, but glad to be back.

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## NARRATIVE OF THE SECOND PLATOON COMPANY "E" AT THE LAWICAN - KAYAPA

#### VILLA VERDE AREA

### 22 March 1945 to 8th April 1945

On the 22 March 1945 "E" Company left San Fernando with orders to proceed to I Corps at Rosario. Upon arrival, the 1st platoon was assigned a mission in the Baguio Area. The second platoon was dispatched to the Villa Verde Trail sector with the following parting words; "The roughest fighting on Luzon is taking place over there, and your chances of getting through are not too good. We know practically nothing of that area however, you will proceed overland behind the enemies lines, keeping your eyes open, and fill the blanks for us," unquote. With these reassuring words the G-2 of I Corps slapped the young Lieutenant commanding the 2nd Platoon (Joseph D. Mobley) on the back, handed him a map, and sent him on his way.

The Second Platoon went into a huddle and unfolded the map. A large sheet of white paper with the words, "Unexplored and unmapped" met their eyes so the map was quietly folded and put away with the remark "war is hell" from T/Sgt D.N. Wagner.

Forty eight hours later the platoon was resting at the last outpost on the 32nd Divisions from waiting for darkness and the order to move out. Two native scouts had been dispatched that morning, but these failed to return. Just before the moon rose the platoon moved out, passing the Jap outposts in the darkness. Soon after the moon rose they came down a canyon wall to a point where a vertical cliff dropped off. First scouts Joe Vilmir and Gene Richmond were looking down five-hundred feet at six fires burning on the canyon floor. "Shall we drop hand grenades on them Lieutenant?" Vilmir whispered. "No! One sound out there and we'll all be bayonet dummies", came thelikewise whispered answer. So the platoon proceeded on its way. About three thousand yards out they set up for the day along a river bed trail. Two men (Pfc Maichen and Sgt. McCann) socks filled with sand waited along the trail to silently take a prisoner. No eligible material appeared during daylight, and the platoon moved out of their gully hideout at dark. They proceeded up a long ridge toward a mountain with its peak hidden in clouds. During a break, Sgt Stevens thought he heard movement ahead. The men moved into the grass, guns ready, and a seven man Jap patrol walked by.

A mile or so further up the ridge the platoon passed a grassy area set afire by American Artillery. Scattered over the slope were Jap reserves huddled around fires cooking, sleeping and keeping warm, right out on the open slope, and the American lines were none the wiser.

An hour or two before dawn the platoon came upon a wide trail leading back to the Jap line. Sgt. Smith, Sgt. Force and Lt. Mobley watched the trail for 30 minutes before a column of Igorots carrying heavy packs passed toward the Jap lines. There were nine Jap guards. Shortly afterward four Igorots who professed to be headed for the American lines and safety stumbled into the platoon area. They were followed shortly by several Japs who were apparently

searching the area above the platoon. Pfc Kelton whispered, "Lets get the Hell out of here," and the platoon with the natives in tow moved back, and down to a river looking for a place to spend the day. Just before dawn the four natives left the platoon on a dead run toward the river. A moment later several bursts of Jap machine-gun fire came from the far side of the river. One native crawled back to the platoon and begged them to take him along. He had been shot in the leg. The other three were dead. Pfc's Seben and Faust helped him keep up while a search was made for a hideout. One was located just as the stars disappeared in the east.

The platoon posted guards and went to sleep. During the day, about 60 Japs who had apparently picked up the patrols trail, were busily searching the area around the patrol. Toward afternoon more Japs appeared and began beating the bushes. Toward evening, several Japs began searching the same gully the patrol was hiding in. Guards Huckaby and Schaar woke up the patrol and then left showing themselves to the Japs and leading them off. They slipped away as night fell and rejoined the patrol which left in the opposite direction. Huckaby and Schaar later received the Bronze Star for this bit of quick thinking.

After a consultation Lt. Mobley decided the area was getting too hot and turned back toward the American lines some nine miles away. A forced march lasting all night brought the exhausted men to a last ridge before the lines. They climbed the ridge hand over hand pulling themselves up by grasping bushes and clumps of grass, and slept on the top too tired to go further.

Soon after daylight they passed through the American lines uneventfull excepting for several wild shots fired by the disappointed Japs. Hot food tasted like a combination of ambrosia and nectar with a floor show thrown in for good measure.

Three days later the 2nd Platoon picked a quiet sector further up the Villa Verde Trail and prepared to "fill in a few more blanks." Foxholes were dug a few yards behind the front line, and a base for further operations set up. A few thousand yards to the east a terrific fight was taking place. Artillery whistled in both directions, and machine-guns chattered incessantly. Truck loads of replacements rolled up the Villa Verde Trail, and the ambulances rolled back down.

Just after darkness fell 31 March, the patrol checked out of the lines. The Japs saw movement despite precautions and apparently surmised a night attack. Artillery began falling like raindrops and the patrol hot-footed back to the lines and disappeared into some handy dugouts. The earth trembled for 30 minutes and since reconnaissance patrols are no longer useful after detection, the patrol was postponed till the following morning.

Early the next day, the patrol left by a different route, down a long steep ridge to a mountain stream. Along the stream were Jap positions set up to ambush our patrols. The second platoon slipped through this lightly manned line and located the main Jap bivouac area principally by smell. After crawling up to the

bivouac Sgt. Knaar and Lt. Mobley heard the Japs talking, and suddenly heard silence punctuated by a machine-gun bolt, clicking into place. A hasty withdrawal was made and the information radioed in.

The 2nd Platoon continued on its way after night fell for several miles finding only well used trails and old bivouac areas. No Japs:

The following day was spent by a river-bed trail, socks filled again with sand, but no Japs appeared. At 1900 that evening the platoon continued on its way and did not see anything worth while till a short time before dawn, some twelve miles behind the Japs lines. A trail was encountered and a hide out overlooking the trail established. As the sun rose it became apparent that the platoon was hiding out very near a Jap camp. Japs carrying water food and various articles came and went over the trail, leisurely bathing in the river down the trail and cooking rice for breakfast. Some very tempting sabers appeared from time to time. Jap patrols left occasionally toward the American lines, apparently to relieve the outposts by passed by the 2nd Platoon the day before. Shortly after poon a large well-armed patrol was organized and sent out in the direction the 2nd Platoon had followed the night before. They looked like they meant business. After pin pointing the Jap camp the platoon waited for darkness and another night march. Rations were low and water non-existent, due to the proximity of the Japs.

Shortly after night fall the platoon slipped away and began circling back to the American lines. Toward morning water was found and canteens filled. Fifteen minutes later Pfc McGuire came in from out post guard stating that someone was coming down the creek bed. The platoon pulledback in the bushes and a sixteen man Jap patrol walked down the creek bed moving slowly and quietly looking for something, probably trouble. They kept on going and we hot-footed for five hours steady coming at last to a small peak about three miles from the lines. Here the exhausted patrol slept till 1100. No food and very little water left. Since it is not healthy to go near the American lines at night, the platoon began the last lap about noon. A mile or so further in, American Artillery began falling. Too many Japs have worn GI clothing. Sgt. Picotte and Pfc Clowes manned the radio trying to stop the shelling while Lt. Mobbey out-guessed the gunners and kept the patrol one jump ahead of the next salvo. Sgt. Picotte finally made contact with the American lines, stopped the barrage, and the rest was easy. A two hour walk brought the platoon to an artillery mess hall behind our lines, and a kindly mess Sgt. made up the vitamin deficiencies.

#### NARRATIVE OF MISSION TO APARRI AND ADJACENT AREAS

Company "B", 6th Ranger Inf. Battalion left San Fernando, Pampanga Province, Luzon, P.I., on 30 May 1945 for Candon, Ilocossur Province, Luzon P.I. to assemble with a Task Force under command of Major Connolly, known as Task Force "B". The task force consisted of one company of Rangers, one company of Infantry, one platoon of 81-mm mortars, one battery of Field Artillery and attached service units. The task force had the mission of denying the use of Aparri to the enemy by seizing and occupying ground in the Cagayan Valley along the west side of the Cagayan River. Reports showed that Aparri was being used by the enemy to evacuate personnel and bring in supplies by use of submarine in an excellent port. Aparri is located on the east bank of the mile wide Cagayan River on the northern tip of Luzon. It contains a large airfield and well defended with emplacements for machine guns and artillery pieces.

The task force was assembled and on 4 June left Candon with a 169 truck convoy enroute to Ballesteros where the task force CP eventually organized. Engineers led the way putting in ferries, pontoon bridges and repairing roads. At points the roads were narrow and over mountainous terrain requiring considerable repairs. The force arrived in the vicinity of its destination on 11 June 45. Company "B" of the 6th Rangers moved into Linao point located across the river from Aparri. The point was being subjected to enemy artillery fire as it was a fair observation post to observe all enemy activity in Aparri.

Company "B" dug in a perimeter using coconut logs as top cover on all perimeter emplacements concealed in a coconut grove 200 yards from the point. An OP was established on the point for general ground observation by day and night, also for the artillery observer to direct fire on Aparri. A Japanese 47-mm Anti-tank gun was attached to the company. It was placed in a well camouflaged position to fire on Aparri and was manned by riflemen of the company. The Anti-tank team fired point blank at the enemy. A 24 power scope was used for observing and it was very easy to pick out enemy bunkers, docks and possible supply areas. Through our observation post, Aparri was shelled almost constantly,

Security patrols were sent out four and five miles from the perimeter but no enemy was encountered. For several days Aparri was subjected to heavy artillery fire, bombing and strafing by the Air Corps and nightly attacks by PT Boats which entered the mouth of Cagayan River at night and fired on the city. The PT Boats frequently drew fire from the Aparri Area. Orders then came through from headquarters for the Rangers to attack Aparri, seize and occupy the area and reconnoiter the Air Strip.

It was suspected that the enemy had withdrawn from Aparri as our Task Force had undoubtedly made the town an un profitable area to occupy. A plan was drawn up whereas the Rangers would send a four man patrol by bonca across the Cagayan River and land at the south edge of town. The bonca will be rowed down stream by a civilian and return immediately after landing the patrol.

It was 0200 hours and the moon had disappeared from the heavens, so the patrol could cross the black of night. They were to carry a 536 Radio to reach the remainder of the Rangers and one to an LCM boat lying out in the mouth of the river. The patrol will recomnoiter the town, go east to the air strip and upon return after an estimated hour, send a signal by flashlight to the LCM. They would send one of three signals: One was that all was clear and to bring the Ranger Company in to land, another for the LCM to pick up the patrol from shore, the third would be a distress signal. The radio was only to be used in grave emergency. If all went well the signal to the LCM carrying the company commander of the Rangers would pick up the rest of the company, cross the river, land and knock out any enemy resistance encountered, establish a perimeter and at dawn patrol the entire area. At the same time Guerrilla forces of the 11th P.A. were to cross the river at the Camalandugan Ferry, knock out enemy resistance and move up Route #5 to the south edge of Aparri where they would make contact with our force. This mission of taking Aparri was undoubtedly a tough mission for a 65 man Ranger Co., so the element of surprise in a night operation would play a big part.

On 21 June 45, one officer, three enlisted men and a civilian climbed into the native bonca at 0205 hours as the moon was waning, and headed for Aparri. It became very black and the river current was very swift. This meant that they would have to start upstream and allow the current to carry them down to their landing point. After twenty five minutes of sweating it out, they reached the shore, unloaded and started out in a column very quietly. The patrol circled the south edge of town scouting out each building and then turned north through the main part of town. As they started to enter one building enemy voices and movement were overheard—the patrol leader realized he must avoid a fire fight and being detected if possible, so they withdrew and proceeded on their recomnaissance east to the air strip and came back by way of the beach scouting out pill boxes. Indications now proved that the heavy and constant artillery fire had forced the enemy to withdraw from the town of Aparri. The patrol returned to its landing point and signaled to the LCM for the company commander to bring in the rest of the company. The LCM proceeded to the beach and picked up the company and safely landed all men on the beach of Aparri at 0530 hours. The Rangers moved out in the darkness to a building about 400 yards inland and established a strong point. By this

Patrols were immediately sent out to contact any enemy in the town. The patrols found no enemy left, but showed signs of recent enemy activity in houses having been used as barracks. The empty bunkers contained fresh bananas and enemy clothing. A patrol went through the air field and discovered that that the field was too badly damaged for use (thirty destroyed enemy planes and at least twenty-five dud American bombs of various sizes).

At 0730 hours the Rangers raised the American Flag over Aparri and had complete control of the town. By 0800 hours, Rangers and Guerrilla forces made contact south of Aparri and we now controlled from Camalaniugan Air Field north to Aparri.

On 23 June the Rangers watched a battalion combat team of paratroopers jump on the Camalaniugan Air Field. Task Force "B" now was under command of the gypsy task force with a mission to push south on Route #5 and contact the 37th Division coming north. At 1500 hours our company was to move down the Cagayan River by LCM to the Camalaniugan Ferry and set up a perimeter.

On 24 June a patrol of one platoon left Paruddun at 0800 and patrolled south east Paragat and returned at 1530 hours. No enemy was encountered but installations were sighted in the area. Many bunkers and fortifications were seen but had been evacuated by the enemy.


On 25 June the Rangers moved by vehicle to the forward elements of the paratroop Infantry which had advanced one mile south of Cattagan. The Rangers dug in a perimeter east of route #5 to form the left flank security for the advancing force and a position out of which to operate patrols in the valley. Two patrols were immediately sent out 6000 yards to the east. No enemy was encountered, although, very recent signs of activity was sighted. The patrols discovered a large ammunition dump, later destroyed by force demolition squads, unserviceable artillery pieces, enemy vehicles and a small track vehicle. These vehicles were in fair shape lacking only minor repairs.


On 26 June a twenty-five man combat patrol left the perimeter to work east four thousand yards and then turn north to the barrio of Basao. The patrol was gone only an hour when the scout sighted two enemy under a small shack sitting down with their weapons beside them, and very much unalert. As prisoners were needed by headquarters it would be worth the risk to try and capture them. All men spread out in a skirmish line and the patrol leader moved in very close unnoticed. He pointed his M-l toward them and yelled, "Do you want to surrender?" Had they moved for their guns, the Rangers could have easily cut them down before the enemy could have fired. The enemy threw their hands up in fear and were taken prisoners. Four men brought them back to Headquarters as the patrol proceeded on. As the patrol neared Basao at 1030 hours, five well armed, well clothed and physically fit Japs were contacted. After a five minute fire fight, all enemy was killed with two of our men slightly injured: one burned with his BAR and the other cut his hand as he was crawling to better his position. The enemy was first in a shack, and after firing a few shots had withdrawn to thick cover behind and tried to fight it out, but the Rangers overwhelming fire superiority and manuvering eliminated the enemy.


On 27 June a twenty-five man security patrol for an artillery forward observer moved to the vicinity of Basao and established a perimeter around their CP. For two hours during the morning artillery fire was directed on all caves and possible enemy bivouac areas where the enemy had been active.

At 1430 hours, a twenty man combat patrol left the perimeter to reconnoiter the area 2000 yards south of perimeter where reports of enemy activity had been received. The patrol sighted a number of Japs inside a house preparing evening chow. The terrain was fairly thick around the shack and the shack had caves dug in around it for perimeter defense. The patrol leader realized his best opportunity would be to pin the Japs down in the house with fire and assault it because if the enemy were permitted to get into their caves, it would be extremely difficult to get them out. The patrol moved in very quietly and made a semi-circle around the house. Each man was given a lane of fire so as not to allow the enemy to have an escape route and not to fire on our own men. The patrol leader fired the first shot. Some of the enemy decided to fight it out from the shack, others tried to escape out the windows. After ten minutes of firing, the house was assaulted with hand grenades. When scouts moved into the house, one enemy was still living and trying to throw a hand grenade but he was soon eliminated. A total of eight enemy dead were counted none escaped. Some were dressed in navy uniforms. We suffered only two slightly injured men who were cut on wire while crawling.







LUZON 1:50,000 SHEET 3566-II (APARRI)







Subject: Report of Night activities.

To : G-3 Sixth Army, APO 442.

1. This battalion has upon several occasion embarked upon night missions using night fighting tactics. The following is an account of two examples that resulted in marked success.

2. On 1 November 1944 Company B, 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion attacked the enemy garrison on Suluan Island, Samar, P.I. The enemy garrison was located in a lighthouse on the south end of Suluan Island. This lighthouse platform was on top of a 300 foot cliff with no means of entry except a trail leading to flight of 150 steps on approximately a 50 degree slope up the west face of the cliff. The entire stairway and the major portion of the trail were covered by the 60 foot lighthouse tower and 3 buildings on the platform that faced west. The trail itself was covered by Jap outposts 30 yards from the bottom of the stairway.

The east side of the cliff was more preciptious than the west side, had no trail and had a light covering of heavy vines and small scrub brush. Because of the tactical disadvantage of an attacking force from the west the Company Commander decided on a night attack using the eastern approach with a view of taking the garrison by surprise. A night reconnaissance patrol of five men was sent out on 31 October 1944 to cover the western side of the ridge, mainly for a terrain study. Each member of the patrol wore fatigues, fatigue caps, no leggings, shoes covered by heavy socks to deaden noise, a compass in pantspocket, a knife on pants belt, a 30 foot coil of blackened rope, no pistol belt, an M-I rifle and four clips of ammo. Faces, hands and neck were blackened, no lights of any kind were carried and watches were carried in pockets. No two articles were in any single pocket.

The patrol was briefed by the Company Commander and familiarized with the terrain and forcibly impressed with the importance of secrecy and absolute silence at rost.

The patrol returned at dawn 1 November 1944 with the report that ground was fairly open to the face of the cliff but that the cliff itself was very difficult and that only means of reaching the platform was to scale the cliff directly under the installation.

The attack plan in brief was for two assault squads and one LMG squad accompanied by Filipino guides was to start at 2115, cross the island under cover of darkness, proceed up the west coast, scale the cliff and attack the lighthouse proper before dawn on 2 November. The attack group was under the command of the Company Commander. The remainder of the company was to leave at 0200, 2 November 44, travel down the east coast of the island and deploy facing the trail that ran up to the lighthouse. At first light on the 2nd of November the bulk of the company was to attack across the trail and isolate the lighthouse from the security guard at the foot of the cliff, clear the stairway down the cliff to contact the rest of the company. The enemy were then to be forced to the extreme tip of the island and destroyed. In order to definitely establish the fazes of the attack flare signals were provided. red flare from the top of the cliff would mean that the attack group there had control of the lighthouse and a yellow flare would indicate that the stairway was under control of the troops on the cliff. An orange flare would be the signal for the troops at the base of the cliff to press the attack to the south as rapidly as possible.

Each five man squad was briefed in detail on the plan of attack, routes to follow and possible eventualities in case of discovery. Once committed the troops were to force the issue regardless of resistance.

Troops were equipped in the same manner as the patrol had been with the exception of ammunition. Each rifleman had one bandolier and the machine gun squads 600 rounds of ammunition. Clothing was identical. The attack group left at 2115, 1 Nov. 44 in single file 10 yards between men. Hand signals were used exclusively, and traveling was done from 2 to 3 yards off the trail. At 0100, 2 Nov. 1944 this group was directly under the lighthouse platform and started to move up the cliff. At 0200 the first man was on top of the cliff. The attack group started to move up into position 10 yards from the nearest building when a Jap approached a latrine 5 feet from the lead man.

The company commander was the first man on top of the cliff and he immediately signalled for the point guide to fire. The Jap was killed instantly and the fire fight started at 0210.

The buildings were rushed by the two assault squads and hand grenaded. All enemy resistance on the lighthouse ceased at 0240.

The remainder of the plan proceeded as scheduled and the action came to an end at 1100, 2 November 44.

Enemy casualties were 40 dead. Our casualties were 2 dead and 2 wounded.

- 3. On 11 March 45 Company "A", Company "B", and 1 platoon of Company "F" reconncitered the IPO-Metropolitan Road area to secure information on enemy strength, disposition and artillery positions.
- 4. Patrols were composed of eight (8) men and a patrol leader. All men wore fatigues, fatigue caps, rubber soled shoes, leggings, pistol and rifle belts with one canteen, compass, knife, first aid packet, and carried one bandaleer of ammunition. Each patrol was equipped with two (2) BAR's. All exposed skin was blackened and watches were carried in pockets.


Men were briefed in detail on information desired, routes to use and the importance of not becoming involved in a fire fight unless cornered.

These patrols operated between 11 and 14 March 1945 traveling only at night and putting out 2 man observation points during the day. They followed the course of marked trails but, when possible moved 3 to 5 yards to the side of the trail to break the stillhouette.

These patrols penetrated 5,000 to 8,000 yards into enemy territory and though picked up by outposts at times doubled back and so confused their trail that the enemy, except on one occassion never made a definite contact. Our patrols suffered no casualties.

These patrols carried one-third rations.

- 5. General observation.
- 1. Success of night action varies directly with previous training under applicable condition and fire control.
- 2. It is absolutely essential that so called "trigger happiness" be positively eliminated.
- Camouflage discipline must be automatic and all skin surface blackened.
- 4. All equipment must be muffled and a absolute minium of weight carried to increase mobility.
- 5. The enemy, despite previous indications and reports, is extremely noisy and careless at night. His perimeter, if carefully probed is weak and inflexible. Sentries are carless and panic-stricken when surprised.
- 6. Perhaps the greatest single factor in night movement is a psychological one. Our troops must be taught that darkness is a great protector if used correctly and that they are capable of outwitting the enemy at night more easily than during the day since his own movement at night tends to confuse the scene. The men must remain cool and, if possible an officer should personally lead the patrol or assault groups so that the men do not lose confidence when the unexpected happens.
- 7. The Jap is off guard at night to the extent that two eight man patrols walked directly through a Jap bivouac area at night passing fox holes within 4 feet and received no challenge or fire because the officer leading the patrol recognized the situation, calmy walked on and was taken for a friendly patrol by the Japs.



9. Rations may be cut to one-half or one-third for short periods extending up to five days. All patrols carrying one-third rations returned with part of the rations.

### SUMMARY OF MISSION TO PANGATIAN

First contact with the enemy was gained as our troops assaulted the Prisoner of War Stockade at PANGATIAN (87.5-74.6). Seventy three (73) Japs were stationed there as guards. During the morning of 30 January approximately one hundred and fifty (150) arrived at the camp which was apparently used as a rest many over place for troops moving north east out of CABANATUAN. At the time of our attack (301945) these troops were there. It is estimated that all Japanese in the stockade at the time of the attack were killed. Road blocks were established along the highway approximately four to five five hundred (400-500) yards NE and SW of the camp. Guerilla companies of approximately seventy five men had the missions of holding these blocks. Shortly after our liberation of the prisoners and the complete evacuation of the camp, an estimated Japanese force of 700-800 men with 8 tanks approached the road block at (88.0-76.7). The guerilla force held their fire until the bridge was reached. In the fire fight it is estimated that 300 Japs were killed . It wasn't determined whether any tanks were destroyed as our forces withdrew to PIATEROS (87.6-81.9). Within the stockade four (4) Jap tanks were reported in a corrugated building, also two trucks. Rockets were fired into this

- The following information was obtained by an eleven (11) man reconnaissance patrol of SANTIAGO ISLAND, P.1. -15-17 January 1940.
  - There are no "apanese on SANTIAGO ISLAND at this time. SIAPAR and TAGAPORO ISLANDS are slso free of Japanese.
  - b. From natives of the island, the patrol found out that at the beginning of the month there were approximately six thousand (6000) Japanese and some FOWs, presumably Chinese, on the island.
  - Reports indicated that these troops were part of an infantry Division.
  - Prisoners were employed in digging in defensive installations (See overlay for location of new positions).
  - Enemy carried one (1) unit of fire. Lany of the troops were casualties; however many men of the rifle squads were without weapons. No heavy weapons were noticed. They were poorly clot ed.
  - Matives report that these troo's moved to BOLINAO and thence to the hills about ALAMINOS. Swacuation commenced 3 canuary 1945. The bulk of troops had been moved by the 10th of the month. There are no Japs at BOLINAO according to the natives.

Shortly after our liberation of the prisoners and the complete evacuation of the comp, and the estimated Hapanese force of 700-800 men with 8 tanks approached the road block at (88.076.7). The guerrilla force held their fire until the bridge was reached. In the fire fight it is estimated that 300 Japs we e killed. It wasn't determined whether any attacks of tanks were destroyed as our forces withdrew to Flateros (87.7-81.9). Within the stockade four fired into this building destroying anything which may have been inside. No identification of enemy forces was obtained.

This gives indication that they intend to evacuate the CABARUAN HILLS which have become untenable for them due to our ratrolling of the area and hunting them down. Guerrilla forces, well armed with Japanese wearons, are also operating in this area and constantly keeping the Japs on the move.

The enemy objective may be to rejoun his forces in the mountains to the east. Considering the fact that he only gathered rice when other food was available does indicate that he wanted a supply of food to last bong enough to enable him to reach his lines without having to risk further observation. Report troop concentration (estimated strength 300), at ABLAN (24.4-95.8) also well dug in. No vehicle movement on NAGUILIAN ROAD between SABLAN and MANGLO. Observat ons were made over 24 hour period ending at mark 31 March 1345. dark 31 March 1945.
- The attached overlay of a map found on the person of a Japanese civilian picked up by members of the 66th Philippine Inf. in the area north of TRINIDAD on the morning of 28 March. This civilian was accompanied by a Japanese soldier. The map indicates the disposition of Japanese troops in BAUTO and vicinity. These Japanese were interrogated at the C.P. 66th Inf. and the following information revealed. The civilian would not state how he came into postion of enclosed map but that the defensive positions indicated on the map were those occupied by the ASAHIDivisoin (23rd Div.) and the MEI ivision (581 M.B.). However the individual positions occupied by these unit could not be established. He also scated that there were 3000 to 10.000 Japanese troops in the BAGUIO area. A number of independent units had moved to the east, their destination he did not know, he also stated that the caps were getting only a handful of rice in this area.







- 1. This information was secured from a Japanese Civilian construction engineer who hid been working for the Japanese Army. He was picked up by guerrilla forces of the 66th Inf. Captain Shearon, commanding one of BAGUIO was present when the Jap was interrogated by the regimental S-2.
- 2. The prisoner talked freely, spoke fair English and understood all puestions asked of him. He explained that he was disgusted with the Japanese Army as he hadn't been paid in recent months.
- 3. The prisoner stated that he saw Gen. YAMASHITA on the 15 March 1945 in BAGUIO.
- 4. Ont the 23 March 1945 the prisoner reported that a rumor was circulating in BAGUIO that Gen. YAMASHITA had left for BONTOC and from there he flew to JAPAN. His entire stall, with the exception of one General Random who refused to go went along with General YAMASHITA.
- 5. In the latter part of March Gen. HOMMA who had flown in from JAFAN took command of all forces in the F.I.
- 6. It is believed that the prisoner thought the rumor oreditable and that he was speaking the truth.
- Other information obtained by guerrillas tended to correborate this report.

- 1. This is a delayed report of reconnaissanse patrols operating north of 1 Corps sector. All information secured has been forwarded to G-2, I Corps.
- Additional and corrected information regarding report of 3 April 45, Paragraph 2. The Jap captured was a soldier. Originally he denied this this but later admitted being a Jap Liaison Officer. He had preciously stated that he had some to BAGUIO to but rice and that the maps in his possession were to be used in finding his way through the mountains. The civilian who accompanied his was Chinese.
- 3. On 30 March 45 a patrol observed approximately 110 Japs garriso ed at ACOPS PL ACE (40.2-93.6). No military installations were noted. The patrol moved on to AP 21 (Post -21 kilometers on road running northeast out of BAGUIO) and observed the road for two (2) days and nights. There was very little traffic and the garrison there was estimated to be 50 Japs. At night sentries are posted at each KF; during daylight sentries are posted on the ridges overlooking the road.
- Japs observed at other KF by our patrols during this period include:
  - KP 14 (ACOFS PLACE)
  - b. KF 18
  - ٥. KF 21
  - Enemy observed (110).
     Enemy observed (34).
     Enemy observed (50).
     Enemy observed (800-Infantry and KF 30 (48.5-00.4) d. artillery troops).
  - CAN'T HOLMES (North of TRINIDAD) - Enemy observed (50).

These observations were m de between 30 March nd 4 April. However, the number fluctuates from day to day.

5. On 6 April 40 enemy trucks were observed moving northeast from BAGUIO on the MOUNTAIN TRAIL with supplies. It is believed

that they were delivering supplies to LOO (KF 90) where guerrillas report two thousand (2000) enemy. They are preparing a rest camp and establishing a supply dump at that point.

- 6. Between KP 21 and BOKOD patrol report only small groups of Japs totalling between 300 and 500. One (1) mountain gun is located at ANBUCLAO (54.0-93.4) but no large concentration of artillery was observed. Observation made between 9 April to 11 April.
- 7. On 10 April and 11 April no traffic was observed on the MO NTAIN TRAIL or the ANBUCLAO-BOKOD Road.
- 8. On 2 April: 50 Japs were observed at NAYO-NO (31.8-98.0), 50 on the ridge to the north and another 50 at AMSALSAL (32.5-94.3). They were preparing food: at night they were not dug in but stayed in the houses. Continuing to observe from AMSALSAL the patrol reported that 65 Japs moved into SAYANGAN (32.6-98.4) on 3 April. These Japs h ad come from vicinity of CAMP HOLMES (north of Trimidad). On 4 April the Japs at AMSALSAL withdrew and moved towards BAL-IUAY (29.0-99.5) along the NAGUILIAN River bed. The Japs observed by this patrol were well-equipped with clothing and weapons and carried full packs and appeared to be in good physical condition. They carried no rations as they were living off the land.

- 2. A thorough search was made of the uniforms of each man and the only material found in the pochets was turned into v-2, Afis Section, SIXTH ARMY. This proved to be "lucky Charms" and of no military value. None of the uniforms had any insignia.
- 3. A total of seventeen (17) Japs were killed by the 6th RANGEA patrols and the rilipino guerrillas who were in the area.





- Patrols from the 6th RANGER INF BN have investigated several "Jap in the Area" reports and on two occasions contacted the energy.
- 2. At approximately 1430 hrs 26 Apr 45 one patrol moved northwest from SAN FERNANDO to vicinity of (37.4-23.9). Local guerrillas were contacted to locate the area where the Japs were last seen. The Japs were located in a stream bed concealed in a benboo thicket. In a fire fight which followed five (5) enemy were killed. No identifications were obtained. They were dressed in a keaki uniform. Fatrol withdrew with one man who had been wounded. No further contact was made.
- 3. Another patrol left for MEXICO (49.0-22.5) on 26 Apr at 23.0 to investigate reports that there were 100 Japs in the area. Fatrol drew sniper fire approx one (1) mile north of McXICO but was unable to locate the course. The local guerrillas reported that seven (7) Japs left toward SAN FERNANDO about 2300 hours. The patrol investigated the various reports turned in by the Filipinos in the various carrios, all of which were negative. No Japs were observed by our patrol in the area (MEXICO, SAN FABIO (52.4-23.5), FANTA ANA (55.0-26.3) Patrol returned 270430.
- 4. At 270100 Apatrol moved to the vicinity of Army Supply Foint \*16 (44.0-17.7). Engileer troops in the area had killed two (2) Japs and the KANGER patrol killed the remaining Japs. Enclosed are findings token from the clothing of the enemy.

- 4. At 115 hours another patrol of thirty men investigated a Military Police report that 25 Japs were at (38.4-25.4) and had killed four (4) Filipinos. They reached the barrio in the vicinity of (3:.4-25.4) where they were met by one of the regular ANGER motorized patrols who had checked the story but no one in the barrio confirmed the kiltings or presence of Japs. It is believed that the Filipinos in the area are a bit shak, as one who accompanied the 'riger patrol stated the Japs were just around the bend whereas it was only our motorized patrol. Athor ush reconnaissance was made of this area but no enemy were contacted.

Outpost orened fire and two Jars fell to the ground. About twenty minutes later the dogs in the barrio started barking so it is believed that the Japs though wounded, escaped.
- 3. At a, prox 1100 hrs 2 May a report came in from G-3, with army that 20 Japs were at SAN ISIDRO DE BACOLOG (40.-14.5). The army that 20 daps were at SAN ISIDEO DE DAGOLOR (#0.-14.0). The Filipino who had seen the Japs was picked up at the Frovost marshall and used as a guide. Upon reaching the area a thorough search revealed no enemy in that area. Later the Filipino confessed that at 02.330 an unknown individual was seen in his watermelon patch. Believing this person to be the Jap the local civilians sent the individual to the Frovost Marshal to request weapons. Upon being informed that no seapons could be issued he reported 20 Japs in the area in order to get pretection.



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

#### A - 3: 17 October 1944.

- 0930 Co. "A" ashore. No opposition. Beachhead established. Established left perimeter and set up two outpost. Black Beach One.

- O945 Co. "E" ashore. Moved thru Co. "A" north 300 yards. Set up road block. Reorganized and remained at Kanamong Point, awaiting arrival of Battalion Commander. Black Beach One.
- 1000 Co. "F" ashore. Black Beach One. Reorganized within perimeter established by Companies "A" and "C".
- 1015 Co. "B" 21st Regiment landed Black Beach One and relieved Charlie on perimeter. Co. "E" with Battalion Commander proceed 1500 yards north when Battalion Commander sited one Jap and fired at him. Jap escaped. Proceeded 500 yards to Jap position.
- 1200 Hq Co. landed Black Beach One. CP set up.
- Entered Jap position Four Machine gun emplacements and two pillboxes connected by communication trenches two barracks ammunition dump supply shed kitchens baths Position had been occupied by 30 Japs One officer one NCO Japs had hurriedly evacuated bivouac leaving prepared food on table. Supplies included eight cases beer, forty bags rice, small arms ammunition, two rifles, two American flags, one of which was destroyed, and a clothing supply. Search for documents revealed the following:

  - 2. Infantry tactics against aircraft.
  - 5. Living in the Tropics.
  - 4. Reports regarding guerrilla activities.
  - 5. Paybook and post cards.
  - 6. A paper with code card on unit.
  - 7. A message receipt book.
- 1400 "B" Co. 21st Regiment reported into CP with native claimed to live in hut within perimeter. Placed under guard and received little information from him.

"F" and "C" Companies arrive at Jap position.

All companies dug in for night.



- 0745 Raised captured American flag at Jap position.
- 0800 "E" and "F" Companies went on patrol to Desclation Point and one mile beyond. At Desclation Point found unoccupied lookout station accommodation for three men. Rough terrain. Sent out patrol and found well camouflaged pill box one mile beyond Desclation Point.

First contact with the enemy was gained as our troops assaulted the Prisoner of War Stockade at PANCATIAN (87.5-77.6). Seventy three (73) Japs were stationed there as guards. During the morning of 30 January approximately one hundred and fifty (150) arrived at the camp which was apparently used as a rest over place for troops moving North East out of CARANATUAN. At the time of our attack (301945) these troops were there. It is estimated that all Japanese in the stockade at the time or the attack were killed. Road blocks were established along the highway approximately four to five hundred (400-500) yards NE and SW of the camp. Guerrilla companies of approximately seventy five men had the missions of holding these blocks. Shortly after our liberation of the prisoners and the complete evacuation of the camp, an estimated Japanese force of 700-800 men with 8 tanks approached the road block at (88.0-76.7). The guerrilla force held their fire until the bridge was reached. In the fire fight it is estimated that 300 Japs were killed. It wasn't determined whether any tanks were destroyed as our forces withdrew to PIATEROS (87.6-81.9). Within the stockade four (4) Jap tanks were reported in a corrugated building, also two trucks. Rockets were fired into this building destroying anything which may have been inside. Estimate enemy losses were 523 killed. Our losses were two (2) killed, two (2) wounded. Twenty three (23) Filipino guerrilla's reported missing. Of this number all returned, nine were wounded none serious.

From enemy observed they appeared to be well equipped with new clothing and wearons, with an abundance of reserve supplies. The enemy was clean and presented the appearance of living under garrison conditions.





Delayed report from motorized patrol operating out of SAN FERNANDO 29 April 45 is as follows: At (30.2-21.4) patrol wounded one Filipino civilian dressed in Jap clothes. When patrol leader tried to halt him he acted suspicious, then started to run. Patrol leader halted him twice and he continued to run, then patrol opened fire, wounded said Filipino. Patrol leader took him to the 874th Pagineer Dispensary at POROC for first aid. After given first aid he was taken to the 24th Field Hospital.

It is the opinion of the patrol leader that victim was either Japanese or pro-Jap. Civilians who were at the scene first said he was a Jap then changed their minds when a civilian claimed victim as brother.

Observation by our patrols in INRAC Area indicate that even the the civilians may not be definitely pro-Jap they show indications of being friendly toward the Japanese.


Situation Maps - 6th Ranger Battalion













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
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
# RADIO NET PHASE 1. ALL UNITS AFLOAT





## RADIO NET PHASE III UNITS ASHORE

- d. Company "D" will land on the right flank of the beach, move rapidly to its assembly area, see Chart I, and be prepared to move to the bivous area when ordered by Battelion.
- c. Company "E" will land behind Company "A" on the left flank, move rapidly to its assembly area, see Chart I, and be prepared to move to the bivousc area when ordered by Battalion.
- f. Company "F" will land behind Company "D" on the right flank of the beach, move rapidly to its assembly area, see Chart I, and be prepared, when ordered by Battalion, to act as the advance guard of the battalion during the march to the bivouac area.
- g. Headquarters Company will lend behind Companies "B" and "C", move rapidly to Hq. Company assembly area, see Chart I, and be prepared to move to the bivouac area when ordered by the Battalion.
- h. The Med. Det. will land with Hq. Co., move rapidly to Hq. Co., assembly area, see Chart I, and be prepared to move to the bivouac area when ordered by Battalion.
- (A) (1) All companies will establish their own local security in their assembly areas.
  - (2) In the appreach march, companies will advance in a column of
  - (3) Upon reaching the bivouac areas, companies will organize the battalion perimeter (see Chart III).
  - (4) Location of Battalion Aid Station (see Charts II and III).

  - (d) PW stockade or area to be designated by Hqs Commandant, Sixth Army, or Beach Master.
- (7) Traffic.
  - (a) Troop movement and ammunition carriers will be accorded the first priorities.
- (8) Dumps.
  - (a) Supply dump of rations and material from LST's will be established on Blue Beach.
  - (b) A company, to be designated upon arrival of supply ships, will be assigned the mission of assisting second echelon personnel in unloading and moving supplies to bivouac area.

#### b. Reports.

- (1) Each company commander will report by Radio or Messenger as follows:
  - (a) Every hour when in contact with the enemy.
  - (b) At 1100 and 1700 when they are not in contact with the energy.
- (2) A daily periodic Intelligence and Operational report will be submitted each day by 1700 o'clock. (Forms for reports to be distributed from S-2-3 sections.
- (3) If reports are negative, so state.
- (4) Morning reports:
  - (a) Will be submitted by 0800 each day.
  - (b) If possible to deliver morning reports by normal channels, a Radio report will be made. The original report will be delivered as soon as practicable.

#### c. Billeting Detail.

(1) Immediately upon arrival on Blue Beach, a Billetine detail consisting of Hq. Co. Commander: Battalion Communications Officer and one (1) guide from each comeany will proceed to Battalion Bivouac and assign areas as prescribed by Battalion Billeting diagram. (See Appendix 1, Annex 3 to FO 2.

#### d. Kitchens:

- (1) The Hq. Commandant will be prepared to set up kitchens and feed two hot meals per day on or after S  $^{\prime}$  3.
- e. (1) Each company will detail one (1) guard and Headquarters Company two (2) guards at the beach supply dumps.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF MERCY SITUATION:

a. Ememy Activities in the Forward Area (CENTRAL LUZCE):

The forward area is defined by a line running South East from SAN FERRANDO (LA UNION) to Balkit BAY on the north and by a line running East - west through CAVITE SITY on the South.

- (1) Ground Forces.
  - (a) General Disposition and Identification: Disposed throughout LUZON are an estimated minimum of 234,500 troops, of which 107,000 are mobile combat and the remaindur are base defense and service personnel.
  - (b) See Appendix 1 for ground disposition of units identified,
  - (c) Meliable ground reports of large troop concentrations and movements from ports to inland areas, and of cumulative shipping to mages indicate strength in excess of definitely identified units. The fact that the enemy was able to move his lst and 8th Infantry Divisions and his 2nd armored Division from MancyURIA to the PHILLPPINUS without our becoming aware of the fact and the facility, dispatch, and surprise with which the enemy reinforced LayTh, give rise to the possibility that there may be major unidentified units present on LUZOM. It is possible that the INBS have been expansed into 8 Battalion civisional strength units.

(d) There has been progressively accelerated activity to strengthen the defense of LUMON since July. Intensified construction of defenses in the MINGAYEN GULF AREA has been carried on since curtiness to LUZON has become increasingly evident. Pill-bexes, tank traps, barbed wire, trenches, minefields, and artillery emplacements have been constructed in this area. Road nets have been improved.

(e) Sec Appendix 2 for detailed enemy defensive installations.

#### (2) Air Forces

- (a) Enemy air reaction to Blue Forces on S-Day will be limited to attacks on the convey and on ships covering the convoy. It is expected that the initial attacks will be made in force, using 40 to 50 dive, torpedo and medium bombers in vigorously pressed low level artacks employing suicide tactics. Strength for these attacks will be flown into Northern and Central LUZON airfields from HAINAN and FORMOSA, and possibly from BORNIO staging through PALACAN air strips. It is belleved his remaining serviceable cerriers will be used, but that they will not sortie beyond effective protection of FORWCSAN land based righters and bombers. The severity of the attacks will diminish in direct proportion to enemy aircraft losses, and to the Blue ability to deny the enemy use of staging areas in Central and worthern LUZOW from which he can strike. It is considered a possibility that from S-Day to S plus Day he may endeavor to direct air attacks on Plue warships and transports, using 8 to 10 torpedo and dive bombers, and coordinating these attacks with underwater attacks at dawn and dusk.
  - (b) An estimation of the number of aircraft that can be flown within effective striking distance of the invacion area is approximately 850 aircraft of all types.
  - (c) Located in CAWTMAL INTON area are 27 airfields the heavi- t contentration of fields in the PHILIPPINES. See terrain Manapooks for operational status of these fields

#### b. Enemy Activity in DECHITAN AREA:

(1) Enemy has concentrated many supply depots in this area.

Defensive installations are located along the DAGUPAN RIVER. The enemy has made use of the MANILA RR running through DAGUPAN. Reports indicate that the public buildings in the town are used by the Japanese for administrative purposes and as barracks.

- (2) LINGAYEN AIRFIELD is located an roximately 4 miles to the West.

  There are several hangars and a possible underground storage area, Administration and storage buildings are located at the Northwest end of the field.
- (3) AA and possible coast defense positions are found along the coast at many points between LANIGAS POINT and DAGUPAN.
- (4) See Appendix 2 for defensive installations.
- 2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION:
  - (a) Amemy Chemical Warfare Activities:
    - (1) The Jap LEYTE garrison was prepared both offensively and defensively for gas warfare when American forces landed. Munitions filled with tear gas (CM), vomiting gas (DC) and nerve poison (AC) were found in captured ammunition dumps. PWs stated that all units from companies up were supplied with toxic munitions, including 75mm blists ing gas (N or H-L) filled shells. Captured documents reveal that orders were issued, in July 1944, to all troops in the LEYTE areas to the effect that special smokes and other gas munitions would not be used without a special order and that in view of the Allies' preparedness to report to chemical warfare no excuse would be given them for rataliation. It may be inferred that a decision by the Japanese on whether or not to use gas will be based entirely upon strategical considerations.
    - (2) In the event of actual use of gas, a complete report will be submitted to this headquarters stating weather conditions, terrain features, amount and kind of war gases used, method of attack, number of projectiles, location of areas affected, length of attack, number and description of casualties and any other pertinent data procurable.
    - (b) Terrain and destner as they Affect the Enemy:
      - (1) The target area includes the CE TRAL LUZON PLATH from LINGA feb GULF Southward to LANGLA bounded on the West by the ZAIEALES FOUNTAIN RANGE and on the East by the morging foothills of the ILOGOS, CONDINGENA, and SIERGA MADRE FT. RANGES. The Northern section is drained by three principal Rivers the AGNO, BUED, and DAGUPAN all emptying into the LINGATAN GULF. The nature of the terrain is generally flat. In the LINGAYEN DAGUPAN vicinity, there is a low wet, swampy, fish pond area. The ninterland is

mostly given over to the cultivation of rice and sugar cane.

- (a) Rivers and cross chargeds create east-west and southern barraers to effective movement from the beach area,
- (b) Fish ponds are numerous in the LINGAYEN DAGUPAN area and constitute effective natural obstacles, to all types of movement.
- (c) Race fields, when wet, create effective barriers to feet and machanized movement. During harvest, when their fields are dry, movement is retarded by low dykes.
- (d) The high terrain cast and west of the corridor provides suitable sites for artillery emplacements and observation posts.
- Weather conditions during the January March months are dry with approximately two inches of rain fulling per month. (2)
  - (a) Ground fog during the early morning is not unusual,
  - (b) Under average conditions the area will be affected by - one typhoon a month,
  - (c) The west coast has a moderate swell from the North with generally light surf.

  - (1) Recent discoveries of new units in the PHILIPPINES indicate that the Japanese are bringing in troops from non-active CHINESE theatres to the PHILIPPINES for additional strength It is significant that the Japanese determination to reinforce the ISLANDS has not been deterred by formidable losses sustained by the troops and it is likely that he wil risk his all in defense of the Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere in the PHILIPPINES.
  - Then the enemy has determined the main thrust of our attack on LUZON, he can be counted on to resist with all the forces he can muster. Owing to the nature of our action it will be necessary for the reinforcements to come either from or through NOATH or SOUTH LUZCH. The lengthened lines of communication for our forces are a handicap while the chemy lines are materially shortened. However, this advantage is offset by his lack of suitable ports and avenues of approach to the strategic area. Weather conditions on the mastern coast of LUZO. make debarkation in that area improbable due to difficulty imposed by the North East monsoon. Reinforcement from the South would involve difficult in passage. However, the Japs precedent of bringing re-inforcements to LAYTE in face of our naval and air super-iority does not deter him regardless of his loss of both ships, supplies and troops. It must then be considered that the Jap command is capable of bringing in additional divisions.
  - (3) Defense and Counter Attack:
    - (a) Three divisions are reported along the forty mile beach front from PORT SUAL to SAN FIRE ANDO. (See Appendix 2 for defensive installations). The road net in the LINGAYER - DAGUPAR is suitable for quick cmployment of mobile reserves from either flank.

(b) From successive delaying positions the enemy may be expected to put up defensive stands holding with the maximum ton-city until compelled to withdraw or face annihilation.

There is no indication of the main Jap battle line but scant information suggests the AGNO RIVER which is a formidable natural barrier. It is likely that the bridges crossing the numerous rivers will be destroyed by a retreating enemy if they have not already been destroyed by our action.

- (d) Forces from Northern LUZON could counterattack our left flank. Barges might be employed in movement to the South.
- (e) Counterattack from the ZAMBALES RANGE on our right would be difficult due to the nature of the terrain. Localized attacks from SUAL and AGUILAR can be expected.
- (f) Counterattacks from the center by the 2nd Armored Division would be a threat to our forces. This division has 300 tanks. The Jap may employ this force piece meal in order to exploit local success. Movement over the level plain is subject to observation and destruction by our air force.
- e. Relative Combat Afficiency of Enemy Forces on LUZON:
  - (1) Of the identified major tactical units on LUZON, none has had thorough going combat experience. Most have been occupied with only garrison defense; a few have been on punitive expeditions against the guerillas. Many of the replacements have had less than a year of military training.
  - 12) Throughout the war the Japs have emphasized "SPIRIT" more than equipment. It can be expected that the military leaders have observed this to be a poor substitute for fire power. The LUXON troops may be the best equipped and supplied combat troops yet encountered as reports indicate plenty of equipment and supplies on the Island.
  - (3) The 26th Division is held to be one of the best in the Jap Army. A PN states that his division, the 26th, was engaged as stevedores while in PANILA. The question arises, why was this division sent to LEYTE where it was later annihilated; and were no other trained and equipped units available? That this 26th is a "crack" division is possible as shown by commitment of his fleet for a stand in LEYTE.
    - (4) After the fall of SINGAPORE, the Jap soldier was heralded as invincible in jungle warfare. His craftiness has served him well in the jungle terrain where fighting is left

to the individual or small units. Presumably we need not expect a super-soldier on LUZON, but we may expect a better coordination of effort and arms and the same fanatical willingness to die. It cannot be said that the Jap lacks spirit - it may be counted on to counterbalance many of the things he lacks.

#### 7. REPORTS AND DISTRIBUTION:

- A. Periodic Intelligrace (SOP) remorts will be submitted to S-2 by each combat unit engaged in operations. These written reports will close at 1800T daily and be accompanied by an operational sketch.
  - (1) Reports will include total enemy casualties for the period, cumulitive totals to date; Pas for the period and the cumulative total to date; any Japanese subjects classified as to nationality, for the period and cumulative totals to date.



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Report of Mess Inspection: 6th Ranger Infantry Battalion.

Date of Inspection: 23 May 1945. Place of Inspection: Luzon, P. I.

- 1. Organization: General Rating: Very Satisfactory.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) No food handlers' certificates were posted.
    - (2) Technical manuals were not being properly used by the mess personnel.
  - b. Deficiencies not fault of unit: None.
  - e. Remarks:
    - (1) The mess sergeant said that all mess personnel were examined on 20 May 1945 and that he had neglected to secure the certificates.
    - (2) The Battalion Headquarters Company is operating one mess for all the men in the battalion. About 450 men are eating in this mess. The personnel consists of a mess sergeant, 12 cooks and 4 bakers. The battalion has 12 reserve cooks.
    - (3) Two technical manuals were available for the use of the mess personnel. The valuable information contained in these manuals was brought to the attention of the mess sergeant and the bakers. It was suggested that more use be made of these manuals.
    - (4) It was suggested that more supervision be given the serving of the food. Not enough care is used in placing the food in the mess kits.
- 2. Physical Setup of Mess: General Ratting: Very Satisfactory.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) Garbage cans were not conveniently placed.
    - (2) A convenient wash stand and a nail file were needed for the mess personnel.

b. Deficiencies not fault of unit: None.

#### e. Remarks:

- (1) It was suggested that a small rack be constructed for the garbage cans next to the mess kit washing setup.
- (2) It was suggested that water be piped about 50 ft. making it convenient to the mess kit washing setup.
- (3) A new wooden mess hall, kitchen, and mess tables were under construction. The new mess tables were already in use. The new kitchen will be an improvement over the present one.

#### 3. Cleanliness of Personnel: General Rating: Very Satisfactory.

#### a. Deficiencies:

- (1) The personnel working in the kitchen were not properly clothed. Some were working without shirts or undershirts.
- (2) Some of the personnel were not clean shaven.

#### b. Remarks:

- (1) It was suggested that all mess personnel shave early in the morning each day.
- (2) Suggestions were given on the construction of a convenient wash stand with an appropriate sign for the use of mess personnel.

#### 4. Preparation of Food: General Rating: Very Satisfactory.

#### a. Deficiencies:

- (1) Cooks were careless in the slicing of bread.
- (2) Roast beef was prepared too far in advance and was allowed to cool before serving.
- (3) Soup is seldom served.
- b. Deficiencies not fault of unit: None.

#### c. Remarks:

- (1) The roast beef should have been kept hot in insulated containers which were available in the kitchen.
- (2) Suggestions were given on ways and means of preparing and serving soup in this mess.

- (3) Some baking is done each day.
- (4) The enlisted men who were questioned had no complaints on the mess.
- (5) Suggestions were given the mess sergeant on placing jam, peamit butter, salt and pepper on the mess tables each day.
- 5. Sanitation: General Rating: Satisfactory.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) Grills which have been constructed from angle iron were greasy.
    - (2) Range cabinets had grease baked into them and were not up to the desired standard of cleanliness.
    - (3) The water used for dipping and washing mess kits was not hot enough to do the job properly.
  - b. Deficiencies not fault of unit: None.
  - e. Remarks:
    - (1) It was suggested that fire units used for heating mess water be turned on earlier.
    - (2) Fly traps were used in the control of flies.
    - (3) Garbage was properly disposed of and the cans were clean.
- 6. Completeness and Maintenance of Equipment: General Rating: Satisfactory.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) The fire units were not properly cleaned.
    - (2) The flues on the immersion heaters were caked with soot and needed cleaning.
    - (3) The tool kits were dirty and disorderly.
  - b. Deficiencies not fault of unit: None.
  - c. Remarks: None.
- 7. Storage of Rations: General Rating: Excellent.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) The shelves on which part of the rations were stored were dusty and needed cleaning.

b. Remarks:

- (1) The rations were systematically arranged and neatly stacked in a room where they were protected from the weather.
- 8. Conservation of Food: General Rating: Satisfactory.
  - a. Deficiencies:
    - (1) A few men were throwing whole slices of bread into the garbage and a large number of men were throwing half slices of bread into the garbage.
    - (2) A few men were accepting portions of food which they did not touch.

#### b. Kemarks:

- (1) It was suggested that correct slicing of the bread, cutting the slices in half and offering half slices of bread, and the placing of jams and spreads on the mess tables would eliminate this wastage.
- (2) It was suggested that education through better supervision of the serving line and closer checking on the garbage would help to eliminate food wastage.
- 9. Aggregate Rating: Satisfactory.
