## HISTORY

## 124TH SIGNAL BATTALION

THE 124TH SIGNAL BATTALION TRACES ITS HISTORY TO THE 4TH SIGNAL COMPANY, WHICH WAS ORGANIZED ON 1 JUNE 1940. DURING WORLD WAR II, THE 4TH SIGNAL COMPANY PROVIDED SUPPORT DURING THE NORMANDY INVASION AND THE BATTLES FOR NORTHERN FRANCE, THE RHINELAND, AND ARDENNES-ALSACE.

ON 23 FEBRUARY 1946, THE COMPANY WAS IMACTIVATED AT FORT BUCKNER, NORTH CAROLINA, ONLY TO BE REACTIVATED TWO AND ONE-HALF YEARS LATER AT FORT ORD, CALIFORNIA. ON 1 APRIL 1957 AT FORT LEWIS, WASHINGTON, IT WAS REDESIGNATED AND REORGANIZED AS THE 124TH SIGNAL BATTALION.

ON 7 AUGUST 1966, THE BATTALION DEPLOYED WITH THE 4TH INFANTRY DIVISION TO VIETNAM. THROUGHOUT THE FOLLOWING FOUR YEARS, THE SIGNALMEN PROVIDED UNINTERRUPTED SERVICE FOR UNITS OF THE 4TH DIVISION IN OPERATIONS PAUL REVERE IV, FRANCIS MARION, SAM HOUSTON, MACARTHUR, AND HINES. IN RECOGNITION OF ITS SERVICE FROM 1 JULY 1967 TO 30 JUNE 1968, THE 124TH SIGNAL BATTALION WAS AWARDED THE MERITORIOUS UNIT COMMENDATION FOR ITS EXCEPTIONAL SUPPORT IN THE 4TH INFANTRY DIVISION AREA OF OPERATIONS.

FROM THE BEACHES OF NORMANDY TO THE CENTRAL HIGHLANDS OF VIETNAM, THE OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE 124TH SIGNAL BATTALION HAVE WRITTEN A BRILLIANT CHAPTER IN THE ANNALS OF THE U.S. ARMY SIGNAL CORPS.

THE U.S. ARMY SIGNAL CORPS WAS FOUNDED ON 21 JUNE 1860.

THE 124TH'S MISSION IN VIETNAM WAS TO INSTALL, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN ALL 4TH DIVISION COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEMS. YOU HAVE NEVER FAILED TO PROVIDE THE RELIABLE EFFICIENT SERVICE WHICH HAS COME TO BE YOUR HALLMARK. NO COMBAT UNIT CAN SURVIVE MODERN WARFARE WITHOUT

INSTANT AND EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATIONS. YOU MADE IT YOUR BUSINESS TO PROVIDE THE 4TH DIVISION WITH JUST THAT, AND IT IS NO EXAGGERATION WHEN I SAY THAT WE COULD NOT HAVE ACCOMPLISHED OUR MISSION IN VIETNAM WITHOUT YOU.

AND NOW, BECAUSE YOU AND OTHERS HAVE DONE SUCH AN OUTSTANDING JOB,
THE 4TH INFANTRY DIVISION IS LEAVING THE CENTRAL HIGHLANDS. MOST OF YOU
WILL BE GOING TO OTHER UNITS—IN—COUNTRY. WEAR THE IVY PATCH PROUDLY ON
YOUR RIGHT SHOULDER AND SERVE THEM AS WELL AS YOU HAVE SERVED US. MAKE
THEM KNOW HOW LUCKY THEY ARE TO BE GETTING AN IVYMAN. SOME OF YOU WILL
BE GOING HOME, TO YOU I SAY CONGRATULATIONS ON COMPLETING A SUCCESSFUL
TOUR. TO ALL OF YOU, I SAY, THANK YOU, GOOD LUCK AND IT HAS BEEN AN HONOR
TO HAVE SERVED WITH YOU.
