




ABOUT THE COVER

There is nothing in front of the Infantry in battle except the enemy. The Infantry leads the way to attack and bears the brunt of the enemy's attack. The primary purpose of the Infantry is to close with the enemy in hand-to-hand fighting. On the side of a house, tommy gunners of this Infantry patrol, 1st Special Service Froce Patrol, one of the many patrols that made possible the present offensive in Italy by feeling out the enemy and discovering his defensive strength, fire from the window of an adjoining building to blast Nazis out. 

Retiring from Active Duty in 1947 as a Captain, a line Officer in the Infantry, George W. 

Germans captured in

I shall try to tell you about the capturing of those 33 Jerries. Now I will have to tell this in the first person for that is the regulation. My platoon and I were the point in the attack on this town. We moved out from the road block we were holding at 5:30 in the morning. After 1½ hours of walking, we approached this town and as we came to the outskirts, I spotted what I thought were three Jerry vehicles. As we came closer B Co., who was on a road parallel to the one we were on, opened up with automatic fire.

After advancing 200 more yards, I noticed men moving around these vehicles and I now could see six. I immediately put my field glasses to my eyes and I could see that these men were Germans. I reported this to the company commander over the radio, and asked for artillery fire on this point. I was refused artillery fire and was told to continue to advance. I called back and said that I would advance, but it would have to be around the left flank as this route afforded a little protection, and that advancing right down the road didn't appeal to me.

After a hasty reconnaisance, I led the first squad with the second and third, plus a light machine gun squad following around to the left. It was pretty tough going for the cover and concealment was very scarce, and we had to double time all the way.

We finally reached a point about 400 yards off the road and a mile down the road from where we started, when I spotted approximately 60 Jerries running down the road. I gave the first squad the order to open up on the Germans and signaled the other two rifle squads and the machine-gun squad to move up into position.

In a matter of a few seconds, all of my boys were in position and you should have seen them scatter those

_____, for our flanking movement had been so successful that when we opened up on them, they were so taken by surprise that they didn't fire a shot, but started to withdraw down the road toward the town.

I was afraid that they might try to outflank me so I immediately called for Pvt. McEllory, first scout of the second squad to go with me on a reconnaissance patrol to check a possible route of advancement for the platoon and to keep in contact with those Germans and to make sure that they didn't out-flank us.

After advancing about 1100 yards to the Northeast of the platoon's position along a gravel road and across a cornfield to a vacant French home, we halted to catch our breath and study the terrain. By this time the main column of the Battalion had moved several hundred yards up the main road and our tanks had moved into position and had begun firing, so I swung my field glasses into the direction of the tanks' target and just then I noticed 8 Germans sneaking out of a building the tanks had fired into.

These Jerries were using a dry stream bed for cover

early hours

and this route of withdrawal would lead them right by the house my scout and I were in, so I sent McEllory back to bring up the first squad, so that we could cut these Jerries off.

I stayed there keeping my eye on them as they advanced toward this position. McEllory returned in about 25 minutes with our men, and I immediately put them into position. By this time the enemy was only 600 yards away and we felt sure that they would fall into our trap.


I had placed my Sgt. to the left of me where he could see down the stream bed and also on the other side of a stone wall that ran along the other side of the stream bed. _We waited and waited, but no Jerries, and they should have been right in front of us by now.

I happened to glance over at the Sgt. just as he was drawing a bead on something and I looked across the stream bed and on the other side of the wall about 200 yards away, I saw three Jerries crossing the wall and several more going toward a house that was directly to our front. Just about that time the Sgt. fired. After he had fired giving away our position, I opened_up on the three Jerries with my M-1.

If the Sgt. hadn't gotten excited and fired, but first warned me, we would have gotten all eight of them, but as it was, we saw six of the enemy run out from behind the house into a group of pine trees. I called for my scout to follow me and told the rest of the squad to cover us as we worked our way over to a large house 200 yards to the left front and for the Sgt. to send a runner back to bring up the rest of the platoon.

We reached the house O.K., and this put us once again on the flank of the enemy. As I looked toward the road, I could see our column moving down the road, and I was afraid these Jerries were waiting to ambush the leading elements, so I began to search out the trees and houses in front of me and, about 400 yards to my left front behind a crop of pines, I spotted the six Germans, so I picked up my M-1 and fired a full clip at them rapid fire.

Well, you should have seen them come out from behind those pines and waving the biggest white flag I have ever seen. My fire had come as a total surprise and they were so confused that they ran right toward our tanks on the road waving the flag. This was only the beginning. My scout and I returned to the platoon and by now we had regained radio communication with the C.O. (company commander). He ordered us to continue down



a gravel road parallel to the main road and join the company at road Junction #...... So, once more we continued in the attack. We advanced carefully down to the first group of houses where we found no one, which made us very suspicious because the French usually stay in their homes.

I then advanced down the road to the next three houses. I found nothing in the first, but as I came to the second house, I peered through the iron fence into a large courtyard and much to my surprise, I saw three Germans sitting at a table eating chow. Then two men with Tommy Guns and myself crawled up to the gate, eased it open and quickly stepped in shouting "hands up." Well three very surprised Jerries got slowly to their feet, putting their hands behind their heads.

The rest of the squad came into the courtyard and started searching out the house and the rest of the yard. We got a total of 10 prisoners at this house and the yard was full of equipment.

There were three teams of horses hitched to carts which contained a little military equipment, but mostly things these men had stolen from French homes, two large Italian trucks, and a small French car.

The French people couldn't believe that we were Americans until we showed them our flag arm bands. The man of the house told us that there were many Germans in the houses ahead, and it was not safe for us to go any farther.

We talked him into going down the street to find out what houses the enemy was in. He preceeded us down the street and would ask the different Frenchmen he saw about the Jerries. Then he would point out the houses they were in and we would close in on the place.

When we had reached the point where we were to join the company, we had captured 33 prisoners. In this group of prisoners, we had real Germans, Italians, Poles, Russians and Czecks.

I know that this is poorly written, but hope you enjoy it.































































